

CLÁR PROGRAMME

The CLÁR 2025 Programme closed for applications for Measure 1 to Galway County Council on May 15th 2025. Measure 2 and 3 are made direct to the Department of Community and Rural Development.

CLÁR is funding programme for small scale capital investments in community amenities in designated CLÁR area in the County. CLÁR covers extensive areas in four Municipal Districts and a smaller area of the Athenry-Oranmore District. It is proposed that the areas in CLÁR will be review in 2025 in advance of the 2026 programme.

The 2025 Scheme was advertised in local print media and GCC social media and via Galway County Public Participation Network and details circulated among Elected Members and Members of Local Community Development Committee (LCDC). A webinar was held on April 30th in collaboration with the PPN with morning and evening time slots and over 70 attendees.

- A total of 52 applications were submitted the Galway County Council SUBMIT grants further to verification eligibility and initial review 27 proposals were recommended for further detailed assessment. Galway County Council can put forward a maximum of 16 proposals including one from Gaeltacht community for consideration by the Department of Community and Rural Development in

advance of June 13th 2025. The maximum grant level has increased from 50,000 in 2024 to 65,000k in 2025. Of the sixteen projects Galway County Council can put forward two proposals if eligible for 100k in grant funding. Grant funding is at 90% with 10% matching funding.

- The facilities and amenities must be freely available (nominal fee acceptable) to all members of the community without any additional restrictions or requirements being imposed and applicants are asked to have relevant statutory permission in place.
- In line with other Schemes, in the case of capital works, the applicant must own or have a 15 year lease in place at the time of application.
- Decision on the 2025 Scheme are due from the Department by end of September 2025.
- Completion and drawdown date for successful projects extended by 6 months from 12 months to 18 months approximately to allow for a more substantial amount of time for procurement and completion of the works, given the increasing scale of the capital fund.

THE TYPE OF PROJECT ELIGIBLE FOR CONSIDERATION INCLUDE:

Small scale renovation works to community facilities open to the wider community such as community centres/sports centres/clubhouses of sporting groups/youth centres/men's sheds etc. This includes external works such as parking and accessibility enhancements

- Multi-use gaming areas (MUGAs)/Astro-turf facilities including upgrades
- Playgrounds/skateboard parks/pump tracks/cycling tracks/teenage spaces
- Walking/running /athletics tracks
- Handball alleys/tennis courts/basketball courts/cricket grounds/ outdoor bowling areas
- Community gyms/community cinemas
- Sensory gardens/Community gardens/ allotments/ biodiversity planting
- Access to unique local heritage sites / areas of natural beauty
- Enhanced outdoor toilet and changing facilities
- Car parking
- Improving access at sports grounds e.g. development/upgrade of spectator stands at local sports grounds with a particular focus on improving access for people of all abilities and ages

Men's Health Week 2025

Healthy Galway County is actively preparing to participate in Men's Health Week 2025, which will take place from Monday, 9th June to Sunday, 15th June, concluding on Father's Day. This initiative represents a significant opportunity to raise awareness, encourage conversations, and promote positive action around men's health and wellbeing.

This year's theme, "Shoulder-to-Shoulder – Connecting for Health," highlights the importance of community and connection in supporting men's wellbeing. Across Galway City and County, a diverse programme of events will offer men the chance to engage, learn, and take proactive steps toward better health.

The key aims of Men's Health week are to heighten awareness of preventable health problems affecting males of all ages, support men and boys in making healthier lifestyle choices and engaging in health-promoting activities and encourage early detection and treatment of health issues by promoting timely access to healthcare services and providing free health checks at events.

A wide-ranging programme of events will take place across Galway City and County, offering men opportunities to engage, learn, and take proactive steps toward better health. Healthy County Galway will be actively supporting and participating in several of these events, including the Men's Health Fair at T. O'Higgins Homevalue Hardware in Galway on Monday, 9th June; a Currach event on Inis Meáin on Tuesday evening; and the launch of an online seminar, "Men Supporting Each Other," on Wednesday, 11th June at 8pm. Also on Wednesday, a health information event providing free health checks will be held at Fursa's Parish Hall in Headford. Further activities include the Men's Health Symposium at the Wild Goat Café in Letterfrack on Thursday, 12th June; a community health event at Temperance Hall in Loughrea, led by GRD; and a Farmers' Health Event at Maam Cross Mart on Saturday, 14th June.

Healthy County Galway is proud to support and lead several of these initiatives, reinforcing our commitment to improving men's health outcomes and fostering inclusive, health-conscious communities. In addition to coordinating and participating in events, Healthy Galway is actively promoting Men's Health Week through a comprehensive communications campaign. This includes broadcasting key messages and event highlights on local radio stations within the county, publishing features in regional newspapers, and engaging audiences across social media platforms to maximise reach and community involvement.



DEMENTIA CAFES AND SOCIAL CLUB IN CONNEMARA

All three of our dementia cafes were launched in May in Leitir Mealláin, An Cheathru Rua, and Clifden in Connemara. Healthy County Galway will continue to spread the word about this welcoming and supportive space for people living with dementia and their carers in partnership with stakeholders from Alzheimers Ireland, HSE, Age Friendly, Creative Ireland, Carers Ireland and Forum Connemara.



The launch of the Dementia Café initiative in Connemara has also gained strong visibility, with coverage across several media outlets including Galway Bay FM, Connemara Community Radio, and RTÉ Raidió na Gaeltachta in addition to social media platforms



Looking ahead, we plan to expand support for both the cafés and the social club through a structured programme of activities. This will include scheduled guest speakers, craft and music sessions, and further distribution of dementia support packs—containing arts, crafts, and games—to foster connection, creativity, and community engagement.

AFRICA DAY IN TUAM – A JOYFUL CELEBRATION OF CULTURE AND COMMUNITY!

Healthy County Galway recently subsidised a new gazebo to further support Health & Wellbeing events, which was proudly used by the Galway County Integration Team during their vibrant Africa Day celebration at the Palace Grounds in Tuam in May.



The event brought together people of all ages for an afternoon of live music and dancing, face painting, entertainment, and a delicious array of food representing diverse cultures.

FURTHER COMMUNITY EVENTS SUPPORTED BY HEALTHY COUNTY GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL

The Community Health and Wellbeing Board initiative continues to raise awareness of local and national supports and services available to County Galway. This month, several boards were delivered to different localities to specifically highlight these supports and services, as well as to promote the Five Ways to Wellbeing: Connect, Be Active, Take Notice, Keep Learning, and Give.

Some of the clubs and community groups that recently received and displayed their community boards include GRETB, Outdoor Activities in Petersburg, Stuntworx Elite in Doughiska, St. Cuans Utd in Ahascragh, and the South Galway Special Olympics Club.

Clifden Men's Shed recently celebrated the conclusion of an 8-week Tai Chi and Mindfulness course with a Presentation of Certificates Ceremony, followed by a course evaluation and refreshments. Congratulations to the 21 shedders and family carers who completed the course, held at Clifden District Hospital. This was a great initiative organised by the HSE Carers Department and funded by Healthy County Galway. Thank you to everyone who participated and supported this journey towards wellness and mindfulness.



AGE FRIENDLY PROGRAMME

Galway County Council has submitted several projects under various award categories of the National Age Friendly Recognition and Achievement Awards, which close for applications on 12th June 2025, and has also encouraged partner agencies on the Age Friendly Alliance to submit nominations for the awards. Shortlisting will occur during the summer and notifications will issue to the successful projects of judging dates in early September.

The first draft of an Age Friendly Strategy 2025-2030 is due to be received from the Consultant in June and will be considered at the Older People's Council (OPC) Meeting on 19th June, following which further consultations will take place with the Age Friendly Alliance, Elected Members, etc., prior to the strategy being brought forward for adoption at a Plenary Meeting.

TIDY TOWNS

A second tranche of Tidy Towns Groups will be moved over to the local authority insurance cover package through Irish Public Bodies (IPB) which will offer a consistent and comprehensive insurance cover for their activities. This Insurance Cover has been agreed between local authorities and IPB as a "Thank You" to all Tidy Towns Groups for the valuable work they undertake across our towns and villages. Approximately half of the County's 40+ groups had been moved over in April, and further discussions were required with the groups in this second tranche prior to processing the changeover.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION NETWORK

The Department of Rural and Community Development have published the Annual Report 2023 for Public Participation Networks, for which all PPN's and local authorities submit reports and statistics for collation. The Report shows that Galway County PPN, with 1,268 Member Groups, is the second-largest PPN in the country, and is also in the top 5 nationally for the number of PPN Representatives which sit on various boards and committee structures, which correlates directly to the primary purpose of PPN's which is to increase input by local communities into decision-making at local government level. The PPN Support Worker also circulated notification of all local and national consultation opportunities, and all open funding and training opportunities, to all PPN Member Groups through the June Newsletter. The PPN Workers will also attend a national Networking Meeting on 10th June to discuss upcoming issues for the PPN's at national and local levels.

PUBLIC ART

The installation phase of Stephen Burke's Per Cent for Art Commission – OPW Flood Relief Schemes at Dunkellin River & Aggard Stream is now complete.

Delivery and install of the 5 stone artworks took place at Old Bridge, Craughwell on Thursday 05 June. Thank you to the Gerard Haugh and David O'Loughlin who supported the installation phase.

Stone Walls and The Grass is Green Per Cent for Art Commission, Baile Chláir is now open for applications. Deadline for Stage 1 applications is 21 July.

Baile Chláir has been awarded a Per Cent for Art grant of €41,000 and a Public Art Working Group has been established as guardians and community representatives of this process.

The Public Art Working Group would like to site engaging Permanent Visual Artwork(s) close to the Nine-arch road bridge in the centre of Baile Chláir that will both complement and enhance this historical bridge and provide interest and engage those who live, work and visit the town. Please note that artworks may not be placed on the bridge.

The Public Art Working Group are keen to commission artwork(s) that are permanent, contemporary, inclusive, meaningful and lasting in both material and context with an awareness of the local, historical, environmental, social and cultural context of Baile Chláir.

The artist(s) should be willing to interact with the local community during the creative process, this can be facilitated by the Curator and Arts Office. Elements of the artwork(s) may be further developed through that engagement process. This process should be at a level that will not significantly diminish the budget for this artwork.

The Cultural Growth Fund open call had a deadline of 04 April. 21 eligible applications were received. The assessment panel took place on 23 April. €20,145 was awarded supporting 7 projects in and around Tuam.

- Emily Walsh & St. Oliver's Special School. A sensory play programme for children with complex needs with artist Hande O'Keefe.
- Fiona Dempsey & Youthreach Tuam. Youthreach Arts Festival will engage and inspire learners through visual art and dance workshops and performances.
- Jennifer Cunningham & Tuam Tidy Towns. Jennifer will collaborate with participants to create a project investigating the River Nanny, local biodiversity and climate change.
- Karena Ryan & Tuam Sugar Factory. Karena will research a new textile project based on stories and lived memories of the factory and its impact on Tuam.

We also had Nature Art in Ros a Mhíl, Lego Coding in Scoil Naomh Ciarán Cill Chiaráin, Drumming in Moycullen and Headford, Cyanotype Printing and Eco Art in Gaelscoil Iarflatha Tuam, Drama Workshops on Inis Mór, a day of creative workshops and Irish language celebration in Drom Soccer Park, Yoga as Gaeilge in Leabharlann An Spidéal, and a whole lot more.

INCLUSIVE ON THE MOVE

Galway Sports Partnership launched the first Inclusive 'On the Move' programme in Ballinasloe on the 15th May. This program is an adaptation of the mainstream 'Men on the Move' and 'Women on the Move' programs. The 'On the Move' programme is aimed at adults with disabilities from the HSE Creagh Training Centre and there are currently 9 participants taking part in the 6-week program in Ballinasloe. This programme is funded through Galway Sports Partnerships grant funding from the HSE.



AUTISM IN SPORT TRAINING

Galway Sports Partnership facilitated an Online Autism in Sport workshop from Active Disability Ireland which took place on Tuesday the 7th May. There were 13 participants from various backgrounds such as teachers, coaches, students, SNA's and parents and the feedback from the course was extremely positive.

Galway Sports Partnerships were delighted to be invited to attend the Special Olympics' Swim Qualifying Event in Galway to present medals to the successful participants on the day. Clubs from across the west of Ireland took part in this event which was used to qualify for the All-Ireland competition. ACTIVE ISLANDS INIS MEAIN COMMUNITY MEETING

Galway Sports Partnership through the Dormant Account funded project Active Islands held an Information meeting on Inis Meáin on the 19th May. This was an introductory meeting to highlight the role of the Active Island's coordinator and the Active Islands Project. It was also to outline the information that has been collected to date from various surveys and consultations and to further see what the residents would like to see on Inis Meain to help them to be more active. It was a positive meeting and was well attended by the Inis Meain residents.

READY TO GO ORIENTEERING COURSE

Galway Sports Partnership in conjunction with Orienteering Ireland delivered a *Ready To Go Orienteering (RTGO)* course on 21st May. This is a practical training programme designed to equip primary and post-primary teachers, youth leaders, scout leaders, disability groups, and camp providers with the skills and resources needed to introduce orienteering to beginners and young people. The course was attended by 12 participants and covered how to teach basic orienteering skills in an engaging way, integrating the sport into school curricula or group activities, and prepare participants for local events.



NATIONAL PLAY DAY

Galway Sports Partnership is delighted to be bringing a pop up 'Play Day' event to Tuam Palace Grounds on 5th July 2025 from 12pm-2pm. WOMEN ON THE MOVE – TUAM

Over the past 12 weeks, we've had the absolute pleasure of running the Trinity Women on the Move programme — a vibrant, energetic, and empowering initiative designed to bring mothers together through movement and connection.

With a rich mix of yoga, aqua aerobics, and pilates, this programme provided a fantastic opportunity for a diverse and multicultural group of women to come together, get active, and most importantly — support one another. The sessions were about more than just physical activity; they created a space for friendship, fun, and wellbeing. This programme was a collaboration with the Trinity Primary School Home School Community Liaison Team and Galway Rural Development through their SICAP Programme.



WOMEN IN SPORT – MÍDE CONNECT EVENT

Míde connect held their second annual professional networking event in Farnham Estate, Cavan on May 7th & 8th at which Galway Sports Partnership was in attendance. The Míde connect network is still in the early phase of development whose working vision is *“To foster a community of professional women who are connected, supported, engaged, and empowered to create a better experience for more women in their work in sport, physical activity and health”*.

The network is closely aligned to [míde research](#), a new all-island, cross-institute consortium set up to conduct high-quality interdisciplinary research on women and girls in physical activity, exercise and sport which launched a national survey to help shape the future of research in women and girls’ physical activity and sport across the island of Ireland in collaboration with Galway and Donegal Sports Partnership funded by Sport Ireland . The survey is targeted at anyone aged 18+ who has a perspective, whether you’re involved in sport, active living, physical activity in any way (including athletes, coaches, teachers, fans, parents, professionals, and anyone else with an interest or insight!).



BALLINASLOE COMMUNITY SPORTS HUB

On 13th May Spraoi Games took place on the Ballinasloe Recreational track for over 80 1st Year students from Garbally College Post Primary School in collaboration with Athletics Ireland and Ballinasloe and District Athletics Club. A wonderful sunny day of relays, javelin, long jump and sprints was enjoyed by all involved.

On 25th May in collaboration with Mini Athletics Galway a free taster was held in Scoil Ui Cheithearnaigh for children aged 3–6-year-olds to meet a hub need identified in that there was very few activities available for this age group due to club insurance stipulations. The taster sold out with 27 children availing of the taster opportunity. This has led to a Mini Athletics 6-week programme being rolled out from 8th June with the Hub Dormant Accounts funding supporting 16 children identified by Ballinasloe’s Family Resource Centre and Parent Child + Connect programmes to partake.

Buggy Buddies with your Toddler in Ballinasloe started on Tuesday, 20th May 2025 at Shear Fitness. These classes are designed to help you make time for exercise and get back to fitness in a supportive and fun environment by our qualified tutor Alana Roddy. The 6-week postnatal-friendly exercise classes has 15 mothers registered and is supported by HSE and Dormant Account Hub Funding.



BALANCE BIKE PROGRAMME

Happy Days Pre-School Ballinasloe were the first to pilot Galway Sports Partnership's Wibbly Wobbly Balance Bike 6-week Programme funded by HSE. The programme is aimed at pre-school children aged 2 ½ to 6 years old and is the fundamental starting point for children's cycling and an excellent opportunity to promote active lifestyles at the earliest possible age. The programme will incorporate fun activities to help children develop gross motor skills, spatial awareness, bilateral coordination, and enhance their physical literacy. Upon completion of the programme, children will more easily transition to riding a pedal bike in a safe environment. The programme combines balance bikes with a variety of fun activities that build confidence, spatial awareness, and dynamic balance skills, enabling young children to cycle without ever needing stabilisers.

Balance is important to achieving success in almost every sport or physical activity and is fundamental in the process of learning to ride a bike.

Galway Sports Partnership loan Balance Bikes, Helmets and a programme plan for 6-weeks free of charge.



INTEGRATION



The Integration Team worked with the Africa Day Committee to deliver a fabulous community event for the County in Tuam. Residents of County International Protection Accommodation centres attended alongside locals to hear African, Irish, Ukrainian music, to taste African food and enjoy the entertainment, which included face painting and puppetry.

In the lead-up to World Refugee Day on Friday June 20th 2025, we have been publishing a poem from a different country each weekday at noon on our dedicated Instagram page – @poetry.of.place.



The aim of this project is to highlight the cultural richness that people from other countries have brought to Galway. A range of community members in Galway have volunteered to read a poem that means something to them – from their home country, in their home language. Some of the poems reflect the refugee experience, including themes of peace, conflict, resilience, home, belonging, language, and compassion. The one thing every reader has in common is a connection to Galway. The lineup includes well-known Galway poets Louis de Paor and Elaine Feeney as contributors, both of whose poems are now live.

SLOWDOWN: PROMOTING SLOW TOURISM FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

The Tourism Officer – John Neary – was in Romania the week of 2nd June 2025 to take part in the Slowdown Interreg European meeting. From April 2024 to June 2028, the SLOWDOWN project, supported by Interreg Europe, aims to address the diverse impacts of tourism across European regions. Acknowledging tourism's significant economic contribution to the EU GDP and its employment opportunities, the project seeks to mitigate issues arising from overtourism and underexploited tourism potential. Through intensive inter- and intra-regional learning, stakeholder involvement, and policy improvement, SLOWDOWN aims to foster sustainable development while promoting a deeper connection with destinations, cultures, and communities. A full update on learnings from this initiative will be showcased in next month's report.

CALENDAR OF FESTIVALS AND EVENTS 2025

The Tourism Department is dedicated to supporting festivals and participative events by grant funding and promoting a range of events across the County that will provide a great visitor experience and support the social and economic contribution of tourism to the County.

In 2025, The Community Support Scheme will be facilitating festivals and community groups with an overall funding allocation of €87,250. This was cofunded by Galway County Council Community Support Scheme Grants (€69,250) and Fáilte Ireland Regional Festivals and Events grants valued at €18,000. INTERCOUNTY NETWORKING EVENT 'COLLABORATION CRUISE'

110 new and existing Sustainable and Regenerative Tourism Operators took to the waters of Lough Ree and the River Shannon, to kick off a series of networking and peer-learning events. An initiative of Fáilte Ireland's EU Just Transition Regenerative Tourism and Placemaking Scheme, the event was organised by the Just Transition Activators of East Galway, Westmeath, Roscommon, and Longford.

Participants on the "Collaboration Cruise" had the opportunity to learn from both peers in the region and successful tourism operators in Cork, Sligo and Galway. The event took place over two days, the 26th and 27th May and a panel discussion on each day at the Hodson Bay Hotel was followed by a cruise on the Viking Ship around Lough Ree. This event highlighted the enormous potential for tourism growth in the region and participants were encouraged to meet and identify opportunities to work together.

The networking events marked the beginning of a series of similar opportunities being offered to tourism businesses across the region. The initiative aims to combine the wide variety of assets and tourism offerings, including both those which are established and new, to build packages and multi-day experiences that will attract and retain visitors.

The JTF Activator continues to create further opportunities for connection and collaboration across East Galway.

DOG CONTROL

672 licences were purchased during the month of May, with 502 purchased at the local post office with the remainder online. At this stage of the year licencing compliance remains on par with that of 2024.

6 fines were issued for offences under the Control of Dogs Act 1986 As Amended during the month of May. 36 fines have been issued under the Act year to date with 12 fines paid in full and 7 partially paid through agreed payment plans. The remainder are still being processed through the system.

The dog warden service had one case before Gort District Court in regard to a prosecution under the Control of Dogs Act 1986 As Amended. The matter was in respect of sheep worrying and failure of the owner to keep dogs under effective control as per the Act. The matter was adjourned to the 24th July for finalisation as per Judge Gabbett.

73 stray/abandoned and surrendered dogs have come through the dog warden service year to date.

BLUE FLAG AND GREEN COAST AWARDS



CÉIBH AN SPIDÉIL - WORKS COMPLETED PRIOR TO THE AWARDS CEREMONY IN MAY

CONNEMARA BEACH REGAINS PRESTIGIOUS BLUE FLAG AFTER 12-YEAR ABSENCE

In a major boost for the local community and tourism in Connemara, Céibh an Spidéil beach has regained its coveted Blue Flag status after losing it in 2013.

The announcement was made today (Friday, 16 May) at the national Blue Flag and Green Coast Awards ceremony hosted by An Taisce at the Ravenport Resort in Curracloe, Co. Wexford.

The beach is among eight locations in County Galway to receive the prestigious Blue Flag for 2025, with a further six beaches recognised with Green Coast Awards.

The Blue Flag is an internationally recognised symbol awarded to bathing areas that meet exceptional standards in water quality, safety, environmental education, and beach management. Alongside Céibh an Spidéil, this year's Blue Flag recipients include Long Point at Loughrea Lake, Portumna bathing area, Trá Inis Oírr, Trá an Dóilín (An Cheathrú Rua), An Trá Mhór (Indreabhán), Trá Chill Mhuirbhígh (Inis Mór), and Traught Beach (Kinvara).

Six beaches were also honoured with Green Coast Awards, which recognise clean water and pristine natural environments in more remote or less developed areas. The Green Coast awardees are Trá Inis Oírr and Trá Poll na gCaorach (Inis Oírr), East End and Dumhach (Inishbofin), Aillebrack (Ballyconneely), and Renvyle Beach (Tully).

“County Galway’s beaches are renowned for their clean environment, excellent water quality and natural beauty, and we are delighted that once again so many of them have received the coveted Blue Flag and Green Coast Awards,” commented **Cllr. Martina Kinane, Cathaoirleach of the County of Galway**. She continued, “These awards are a testament to the hard work and dedication of those who clean our beaches. I am particularly happy to see that the beach at Céibh an Spidéil has regained its Blue Flag which will be very much welcomed by the local community.”

Liam Conneally, Chief Executive of Galway County Council, stated, “These awards let our citizens and people around the world know that County Galway is a wonderful place to live in and to visit and that our beaches are clean, well-managed and safe to enjoy. We are grateful to the staff in Area Offices, Community Wardens, and all the volunteers and beach clean groups for all their hard work and dedication in ensuring our coastline is kept clean. Galway has some of the best beaches in the country and we are proud to maintain them.”

Kieran Coyne, A/ Director of Services, Environment Section, said, “These awards are a credit to the collective efforts of Galway County Council staff, volunteers, residents, and businesses who have worked tirelessly to maintain, protect, and improve some of our best-loved and most popular beaches. Visitors to a beach flying a Blue Flag can be assured the beach will be clean, safe, and meet the highest environmental standards, as well as international bathing water quality standards and visitors to a beach flying a Green Flag can be assured that the water is of excellent standard.”

COASTAL WALK BY THE SE

An event celebrating nature and music took place on Saturday 24th May 2025 at An Trá Mhór, Indreabhán as part of Biodiversity Week. The beauty of the beach was a central part of the walk as we celebrated this pristine blue flag beach. A guided walk commenced at the car park at An Trá Mhór, and it followed the coastline where Aedín Ní Thiarnaigh and Ríona Ní Aodha, experts on plants and birds give the participants an insight into the rich biodiversity of Conamara. The event was organised by the Environment Section with support from our Biodiversity Officer, Rosina Joyce, Cumann Gorbatha Chois Fharráige and Fóram Chois Gharráige um Pleanáil Teanga Biodievent and was delivered as Gaeilge.



CATCHMENT MANAGEMENT

Further sampling was carried out in the Truskey Stream, Bearna after a dry period of weather. This was the second run of samples taken, and a report on the results is being drafted at present. The report when finalised will detail the work required by the relevant stakeholders to reduce pollution inputs into this waterbody.

An on-site meeting took place at a development near An Spidéal with a proposal to replace a malfunctioning wastewater treatment plant with a new system. The proposal also incorporates a plan to decommission two older septic tanks which formed part of the first stage of development at this site and treat the wastewater instead in the new system. The

whole development would then only have one treatment plant. On-site were the owners, project engineer, hydrogeologist, and council staff.

Work continued during the month on finalising the beach posters and water sampling plan for this year's bathing season. Pre-season samples were taken on the 26th and 28th May at all 28th bathing areas in County Galway. An EPA audit was carried out on the 20th May on our sampling procedures. EPA staff accompanied council staff while carrying out river sampling to ensure correct procedures are being followed.

A Western Local Authorities Liaison Meeting took place on the 19th May with updates from the previous meeting given by each member. The main topic discussed was the Local Authority Action Plans which are being developed at present. These plans will outline specific tasks that the local authorities will be required to do each year in order to implement the National Water Action Plan. Action timelines will also be included.

The Western Regional Operational Committee meeting took place on the 22nd May in Castlebar. Topics covered included:

- Estuarine issues in the Western Region
- Nitrogen concentrations in selected major rivers
- Challenges and Opportunities – Bord Iascaigh Mhara

AGRICULTURAL INSPECTIONS

Council staff attended National Agricultural Inspection Plan working group meetings in Portlaoise on the 8th and 28th May. NAIP training took place in Sligo and one member of our technical staff attended. Our agricultural inspector attended a court appeal regarding a conviction and fine to a farmer for the discharge of effluent to an open drain. The previous conviction was upheld, and the farmer gave an undertaking to the court to complete works by the next court sitting in June 2025.

Environment and Housing staff carried out inspections in Tuam relating to waste collection services and dog licensees at Council owned properties.

COURT CASES

The Environment Section had several cases in the District Court for prosecutions under the Waste Management Act. 2 cases were adjourned.

One case was a prosecution for non-compliance with a Section 55 Notice. In this instance, the defendant failed to remove a large collection of mixed waste from his front driveway. The defendant pled guilty and agreed to remove all waste before the next court date. Prosecution secured under the Waste Management Act.

A second case involved the stockpiling of household waste at the rear of a house. This was a repeat offence, Prosecution under Section 32 and a Section 58 Order was secured directing individual to cease the stockpiling of waste at the property.

In another case relating to an unauthorised end of life vehicle site, a Section 58 Order was secured directing the site owner to clear the site.

CONSTRUCTION & DEMOLITION WASTE

The Environment section is currently processing an application for a Waste Facility Permit, the main activity of this site will be the recycling of C&D Waste. This site was inspected as part of the application process in May

WERLA

Staff attended a site visit arranged by WERLA of a Construction and Demolitions recycling site in Wicklow. This was of benefit as there are several similar sites in the planning phase in Galway County. These sites will be applying for end of waste status under the EPAs Article 28, this will allow the recycling and reuse of construction waste that was previously destined for landfill.

Staff attended training for Waste Collection Permit Holders in Tullamore. Staff also attended online training provided by the NWCPO for validation of annual returns.

LITTER

9 fines were issued for offences under the Litter Pollution Act 1997 as amended, during the month of May.

The Environment Section had one case in the District Court for prosecution under the Litter Pollution Act which was adjourned for hearing for the 5th June 2025.




IRISH CLASSES.

Events on the 24th September will be focused on 6th class National school pupils and will consist of Music, talks, a guided tour of Pearse's cottage, Theatre show and workshop along with Arts and crafts workshops aimed at this age group.

Events on the 25th will be focused on transition year students/adults and will consist of Poetry, a Debating competition, panel discussion, a guided tour of Pearse's cottage and will finish off with music from Johnny Óg Connolly who won the 2025 TG4 music composer of the year.

All events will take place through Irish.

LIBRARY SERVICES



Galway Public Libraries provide an extensive array of services to the community and fulfil the key actions set out in national policy on the provision of an inclusive library service.

Over 38, 000 books were issued during the month of May along with 29,985 visits to libraries throughout the County. Utilization of services continued to increase with a particular interest in the ePress platform which provides access to National and International Newspapers and Magazines.

The programming of the Bealtaine Festival, which celebrates creativity in older years provided opportunity for members of the public to experience creative writing workshops, art exhibitions from some of the older members within our communities along with poetry workshops exploring the theme 'Music of our Generation with Irish Poet, Meave McKenna. These opportunities were in addition to fibre crafting workshops in Tuam Library with the focus on creating worry worms to deal with anxiety and fear.

The programme for Bealtaine was kindly funded by the Creative Communities Team in Galway County Council.

Right to Read is a nationwide initiative aimed at promoting literacy and reading development for people of all ages and backgrounds. As part of



this effort, four dedicated programmes focus specifically on encouraging children's reading and literacy skills. Libraries play a key role in supporting this mission by celebrating reading and preparing for the Summer Stars Reading Programme, which kicks off in early June and runs through August 31st. Children are invited to keep their reading habits alive over the summer and continue their journey with books in a fun and engaging way. This initiative will encompass events, workshops and activities throughout the summer all free of charge.

HEALTHY IRELAND AT YOUR LIBRARY

Healthy Ireland, a government-led initiative, is the national strategy to improve health and wellbeing, place a focus on prevention, individual awareness and keeping people healthy for longer. Public libraries are currently delivering the nationwide Healthy Ireland at Your Library programme and this is a valuable resource within the community for health information.

The initiative includes a comprehensive collection of books on health and wellbeing, extensive online resources incorporating eBooks, eAudiobooks and eMagazines. In addition to this remit there is an extensive programme of events, workshops and talks with a focus on physical health, mental health, and health literacy.



The Galway City library hosted a series of bilingual (Gaeilge & English) breathwork and meditation sessions in May. These sessions were run by trainer Marian Ní Chonghaile, a native Irish speaker, and certified breathwork specialist.

BALLYBANE LIBRARY

RIGHT TO READ:

Every second Thursday our Creative Writing group meets in the library to mentor each other in their creative endeavours, assisted by staff member Zara.

On two Saturdays of this month our teenage readers met to discuss this month's book "Bite Risk", whilst our 8- to 11-year-old readers met to discuss "The House of 100 Clocks", in all nineteen children attended.

Music Generation supports our youngest patrons and their parents with a new Rhyme Time on Wednesday mornings, and Lisa and Joanna continue to support our local parents and toddlers with a Song time on Friday mornings.

As part of Galway Public Libraries' Summer Stars programme author Lucy Kelly Desmond facilitated a workshop in Ballybane Library's Maker Space.



The children of the ACE Afterschool from the Ballybane Resource Centre attended and enjoyed designing their own Barrel Top Caravans with Lucy, indeed two of the children told us their Granddad still has one and so this really enlivened the chat.

On Friday 23rd of May ATU Children's Studies Artist in Residence Monica Monez entertained parents and children in the library with two interactive dance sessions.

The ATU sponsored this in recognition of Ballybane Library's diligent efforts to encourage the use of the library by young families.



These sessions were attended by 33 adults and 45 local children including a group from the local playschool based in Radharc na Mara school.

CREATIVE IRELAND

Every Tuesday morning, up to 16 local women gather at the library to sew and embroider vibrant banners that will be featured in the **Eastside Arts Festival** this October. These creative workshops are guided and supported by local artists **Helen Flynn** and **Rowena Carr**, who provide mentorship and inspiration throughout the process. Funded by **Galway City Creative Ireland**, the initiative celebrates community, creativity, and collaboration. The beautifully crafted banners will be proudly displayed in the library as part of the festival's October showcase.

BIO-DIVERSITY WEEK

This year Executive Librarian Caroline Rowan kindly organized a visit by author and bird conservationist Susan O' Donoghue whose successful book "Golden Wings" will be reprinted due to its success.

She gave a fantastic interactive talk in our library which was attended by thirty-five 4th class children from Scoil Caitríona in Renmore.



ART EXHIBITIONS:



During this period, **Galway City Library** hosted two captivating art exhibitions.

Nishanth Sugathan, an artist originally from Kerala in South India who relocated to Galway three years ago, showcased a collection of his work featuring both tech-inspired pieces and still-life paintings, reflecting a blend of innovation and tradition.

Meanwhile, **Anna Rozanska-Batra**, a talented quilling artist, exhibited her intricate paper art. Using rolled strips of paper, Anna creates detailed and delicate designs—some of which require over 100 hours to complete—highlighting the patience and precision behind this unique and labour-intensive craft.



EARLY YEARS PROGRAMMING:

Baby Rhyme Time took place on its new date and time of Thursdays at 11. These sessions are in collaboration with



GRETB and Music Generation Galway. 132 people took part in these sessions.

Age-Friendly events included weekly Scrabble for Seniors and the Creative Crafters meetings. These continue to be popular with over 80 people attending throughout the month.

BIODIVERSITY WEEK IN GALWAY CITY LIBRARY

Author Susan O'Donohoe gave a presentation to 40 students from Mercy Primary School about owls. Susan is an ornithologist and the author of the book *Golden Wings*. Each student received a copy of the book to take home. This event was sponsored by the Biodiversity Office of Galway City Council.



FORÓIGE COLLABORATION

Galway City Library hosted a variety of engaging events in collaboration with **Foróige**, offering creative and interactive experiences for young people.

- The **monthly Anime/Manga workshops** provided a space for 13–18-year-olds to explore their passion for Japanese pop culture through art and storytelling.



- The **monthly tabletop role-playing game sessions** invited teens aged 13–18 to dive into imaginative worlds, build characters, and collaborate through gameplay.



- On **7 June**, an **animation workshop** for 10–13-year-olds gave participants the chance to get hands-on with both traditional and digital techniques, blending creativity with technology under the guidance of Foróige facilitators.



ORANMORE LIBRARY

The period May 12th – June 7th has been dominated by events for our older generation through the Bealtaine Festival, our Leaving Cert students using the library to prepare for their exams, (each day every study space (20 spaces) has been filled and a quiet studious atmosphere has prevailed.), preschoolers collecting their “Little Library Bags” and our celebration of Cruinniú na nÓg at Oranmore Library.

TRAVELLER ACCOMMODATION PROGRAMME

The 5 year Traveller Accommodation Programme 2025 – 2029 was adopted by the plenary Council in November 2024. Work has commenced and is ongoing on the programme, with funding provided by the Traveller Accommodation Unit (TAU) of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage:

WORKS COMPLETED:

Cloonlyon Road – 6 properties underwent major refurbishment including installation of Part M and adaptation of 2 properties.

Cloonlyon Crescent – 6 properties underwent major refurbishment, 1 demountable property was demolished and removed from the site.

WORKS ONGOING:

Athenry – Property refurbished and extended. Part M bathroom installed and energy efficiency upgrade completed. Cloonlyon Road, Ballygar – 6 houses – Major Refurbishment completed

Castleblakeney – 2 properties refurbished internally and externally to include upgrade of sewage facilities, works substantially completed

PLANNED WORKS:

Cartron, Ballgar – Property to be reroofed and refurbished. Procurement completed, works to commence Summer 2025. Funding approved by TAU.

Gortbride, Loughrea – 6 properties are to be refurbished and upgraded. Design and procurement underway. Funding approved by TAU.

Ballydavid, Athenry – 6 houses to be refurbished and upgraded with energy efficiency works, submission for funding with TAU for consideration.

Rahard, Athenry – property to undergo major refurbishment – proposal to be agreed and submitted to the TAU for consideration.

Mountbellew – property to be refurbished and extended to facilitate multi-generational living. Proposal to be agreed and submitted to the TAU for consideration.

Tuam Halting Site Redevelopment

CENA were commissioned by Galway County Council, with the support of Dormant Accounts Funding, to prepare and submit a feasibility study and a proposal for the re-development of the 10 bay Tuam Halting Site into Traveller Specific Accommodation. Both reports have been received by the Council and are being considered. The Council will meet CENA representatives in the coming weeks to progress the redevelopment further.

DORMANT ACCOUNTS

An application for Dormant Accounts Scheme funding for two projects related to Traveller Accommodation has been successful. Mediation training has been provided to a Social Worker and a Feasibility Study and Development Proposal for the re-development of Tuam Halting Site has been commissioned and completed by CENA.

INFORMATION SESSIONS

Information Sessions were held recently in Ballinasloe and Tuam by Galway County Council, with 23 Community Healthcare Workers (CHWS) in attendance from Galway Traveller Movement and Brú Bríde. Information and advice was given on completing and submitting



housing applications and responding to the annual Summary of Social Housing Assessment. This useful advice will enable CHWS to assist the Traveller community in applying for Social Housing Supports. It is intended to provide these information sessions twice a year, as noted in the Traveller Accommodation Programme 2025 – 2027.

DISABLED PERSONS GRANTS

A Disabled Persons Grant is available to assist in the carrying out of adaptation works/extension in local authority owned properties, which are reasonably necessary for the purpose of rendering the dwelling more suitable for the accommodation of a person with a disability who has an enduring physical, sensory, mental health or intellectual impairment.

THE TYPES OF WORKS ALLOWABLE UNDER THE SCHEME INCLUDE:

- Access ramps
- Bathroom adaptations
- Stairlifts/Hoists -OT report required from applicant
- Accessible showers,
- Adaptations to facilitate wheelchair access,
- Extensions– OT Report required from applicant
- Any other works which are reasonably necessary for the purposes of rendering a house more suitable for the accommodation of a person with a disability

Galway County Council received funding notification this week of the 2025 allocation of 777,481 for Disabled Persons Grants/Improvement Works in Lieu/Extensions. This funding (90%) is matched by a contribution towards the works of 86,387 from Galway County Council (10%), a total of 863,868. This is an increase of 15% on the 2024 allocation.

The status of the 2025 DPG programme of works, which are carried out on Galway County Council owned properties is as follows:

- 23 properties – DPG works completed
- 24 properties – DPG works underway
- 15 properties – DPG works to be completed in 2025

The works completed included the provision of wet rooms, ramps and rails and associated adaptations.

In addition to the above works, extensions to meet the needs of households are progressing as follows:

- 3 properties – extensions completed
- 2 extensions – extensions underway
- 2 extensions – design completed and procurement underway

PRIVATE HOUSING GRANTS

Three types of housing grants are available for older people or persons with disabilities to make necessary adaptations or improvements to their homes to improve their housing conditions:

- 1) The Housing Adaptation Grant for People with a Disability (HAG) is available to assist in the carrying out of works which are reasonably necessary for the purposes of rendering a house more suitable for the accommodation of a person with a disability who has an enduring physical, sensory, mental health or intellectual impairment.
- 2) The Scheme of Housing Aid for Older People (HAOP) is available to assist older people living in poor housing conditions to have necessary repairs or improvements carried out.
- 3) The Mobility Aids Housing Grant (MAG) is available to cover a basic suite of works to address mobility problems, primarily, but not exclusively, associated with ageing.

A total of **452 applications for grants** for adaptations for private houses have been received in 2025:

LOCAL AUTHORITY HOME LOANS

A Local Authority Home Loan (LAHL) is a Government backed mortgage for first time buyers and fresh start applicants, available from the local authority. It can be used to purchase a new or second-hand property or for self-build. A Local Authority Home Loan provides up to 90% of the market value of the property. The maximum value of a property which can be bought/built under this scheme in the County of Galway is 330,000.

The Local Authority Purchase and Renovation Loan (LAPR) is also available. The loan, which is an expansion of the Local Authority Home Loan supports both the purchase and renovation of homes which are eligible under the existing Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant (VPRG).

It is a Government backed mortgage and loan for the purchase and renovation of derelict and non-habitable homes. The property must be eligible for the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant, whether derelict, non-habitable or simply vacant.

Under the Local Authority Purchase and Renovation Loan, a first-time buyer or Fresh Start applicant who wishes to purchase and/or renovate a Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant eligible home but cannot get sufficient funding from commercial lenders are now able to apply to the Local Authority for a Local Authority Purchase and Renovation Loan.

Twenty applications for a local Authority Home Loan have been received in 2025. A number of enquiries have been received regarding the Local Authority Purchase and Renovation Loan, with one application received to date. One application has also been received from a person applying for Affordable Housing.

HOMELESSNESS

In May 2025, 49 adults and 29 children who are housing applicants with Galway County Council were residing in emergency accommodation. This accommodation includes supervised hostel accommodation (one male and one female hostel), private emergency accommodation (B & Bs) and an addiction treatment centre.

All emergency accommodation is provided in Galway City and is sourced and monitored on behalf of Galway County and City Councils by COPE Galway. The emergency accommodation is currently at capacity. It is intended that Galway County and City Councils will seek Expressions of Interest in the provision of additional emergency accommodation in the coming weeks.

It is recognised that clients are presenting with increasing complex needs and that one housing solution does not fit all. Galway County Council provides supported shared housing options to eligible housing applicants with 22 occupants in 10 Community Based Houses and 8 young people, aged between 18 and 25 years of age, in 5 designated Youth Houses. Support is provided to the occupants of these properties by Galway Simon to enable them to develop skills necessary to sustain a tenancy.

The development of medium-term supported housing and a Cold Weather Response facility is ongoing with a recent closing date for submissions on the Part 8 planning proposal.

PART 8 PLANNING PROPOSAL ST BRIDGETS ROAD, PORTUMNA

Part 8 planning for Partial demolition of 11 no. detached dwelling houses and complete refurbishment and extensions to provide 11 No. 2 Bedroom single-storey detached dwellings at St. Bridget's Road, Portumna, Co. Galway was applied for on the 2nd of May. Submissions for the development closing on the 24th of June.

The aim of the proposal is to create an inclusive residential community that respects the existing character of the village of Portumna but acknowledges the sustainable growth of the village with an appropriate development for a fully serviced residentially zoned Site.

The proposal seeks to respect the existing residential development pattern of the area by aligning the new development. The proposal will be connected to the locality by the use of materials sympathetic with the locality and adapting to the location of the existing Streetscape.

PART 8 PROPOSAL FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF 38 HOUSING UNITS AT ST JOSEPH'S ROAD PORTUMNA

On Friday 23rd May 2025, housing capital lodged a Part 8 application under the Planning and Development Acts, 2000 (as amended) and the Planning and Development Regulations 2001(as amended), for a social housing development on St. Joseph's Road, Portumna.

The development consists of the construction of 38 no. residential units comprising:

- 6 no. single storey two-bed dwellings,
- 1 no. single storey three-bed dwelling,
- 25 no. two-storey three-bed dwellings,
- 4 no. two-storey two-bed dwellings,
- 2 no. two storey four-bed dwellings.

Proposed site works include provision of an electric substation, landscaping and boundary wall construction. It is proposed to provide an access connection to the site via the adjacent regional road, R352, together with all service connections, ancillary siteworks and services.

WORK TO BEGIN ON NEW PHASE OF ATHENRY NORTHERN RING ROAD

Construction of the western section of the Athenry Northern Ring Road will commence in the coming weeks with a completion date of late 2025.

On Monday 16th of June 2025, the Local Authority signed contracts with Tower Plant and Civil Engineering to deliver the scheme, located in the townlands of Ballygarraun North and Ballygarraun South.

The Athenry Northern Ring Road is identified in the Athenry Local Area plan as a key infrastructure project to support the economic development of the town and support housing growth. The project is funded under the Department of Transport and the first section of the road, from Raheen Road (L3103) north



to a roundabout junction with Ballydavid Cottages and the R347 was constructed and opened to traffic in mid-2013. This next phase includes the connection between the Presentation College and the of the Raheen Road (Ballygarraun North).



N6 GALWAY CITY RING ROAD

On 14th April 2025, Galway County Council, in collaboration with Galway City Council and Transport Infrastructure Ireland, submitted a comprehensive response to An Bord Pleanála's Request for Further Information concerning the proposed N6 Galway City Ring Road. The submission included updated environmental surveys covering ecology, geology, traffic, and climate compliance, aligning with the latest Climate Action Plan.

On 6th June 2025, An Bord Pleanála issued a letter acknowledging that the additional information constitutes significant further details regarding environmental impacts, proper planning, and sustainable development. Consequently, the Board has formally requested that this information be made available for public inspection and purchase, allowing written submissions in response.

Galway County Council will publish newspaper notices later this month outlining:

- The process for public access and purchase of the information.
- Guidelines for submissions or observations to the Board.

GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL SUBMISSION TO THE NWRA FOR THE NDP REVIEW

Galway County Council has made a submission to the North West Regional Assembly that has outlined a strategic and balanced set of priorities to inform the ongoing review of the National Development Plan. The submission has reaffirmed the critical importance of the N6 Galway City Ring Road as a priority project to address long-standing transport issues, enhance regional connectivity, and enable sustainable economic development.

In addition, the Council has highlighted the urgent need to progress the Galway East Main Drainage Scheme to address wastewater capacity constraints and facilitate planned housing and population growth. Strategic emphasis has also been placed on rail infrastructure upgrades including the double-tracking of the Athenry–Galway line and the proposed Tuam rail link, alongside investment in rural and urban regeneration, active travel infrastructure, and essential utilities.

Key proposals in the submission include:

- Delivery of the N6 Galway City Ring Road
- Implementation of the Galway East Main Drainage Scheme
- Double-tracking of the Athenry–Galway rail line and reopening of the Athenry–Claremorris line
- Development of the Tuam Quarter and associated rail infrastructure
- Regeneration initiatives in towns such as Tuam, Gort, Ballinasloe, and Portumna
- Investment in national and regional roads (e.g., N59, N84, Baile Chláir Bypass)
- Completion of the Galway–Athlone Greenway and expansion of walking/cycling networks
- Upgrades to harbours (Rosaveel, Aran Islands, Cleggan) to support marine services and offshore wind
- Flood relief works in priority areas (e.g., Clifden, Oranmore, Ballinasloe, Gort Low lands)
- Upgrades to fire services and electricity infrastructure to support growth and resilience

FOOTBRIDGE OVER THE OWENRIFF RIVER, OUGHTERARD, CO. GALWAY

Galway County Council’s intention to apply to An Bord Pleanála for planning consent under Section 177AE of the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as amended) for the construction of a new clear span footbridge over the Owenriff River in Oughterard, will be published in the coming weeks. A Natura Impact Statement has been prepared as part of the planning application, as the footbridge will be located in a Special Area of Conservation. Amongst other things, the Owenriff River is a highly important habitat for the Freshwater Pearl Mussel.

A compulsory purchase order will also be applied for, but it is anticipated that land acquisition will be negotiated by agreement with the landowners. The footbridge will be located approximately 150m downstream (east) of the existing N59 road bridge in Oughterard and will provide connectivity to footpaths through the provision of a pedestrian crossing on each side.

This is a long-awaited project by the community and aims to provide much safer passage for vulnerable road users, particularly school goers, from the town to Carrowmanagh Road where both the national and secondary schools are located.

COASTAL COMMUNITIES FUNDING

The government has allocated €4.33 million to fund 57 marine infrastructure projects across 11 coastal local authorities under the Local Authority Marine Infrastructure Scheme 2025. This initiative, led by Minister of State Timmy Dooley, aims to support the maintenance and development of fishery and aquaculture-linked infrastructure owned by local authorities.

Each project can receive up to 75% co-funding from the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, capped at €187,500, with the remaining costs covered by the respective local authority.

The full cost of projects is estimated at €477,000 for Galway County Council and grant allocation amounts to €357,750. These projects focus on improving safety, accessibility, and structural integrity of piers and marine infrastructure across Galway County.

JUNIOR SCHOOL WARDEN SCHEME CELEBRATES LOCAL HEROES

In a commendable initiative aimed at promoting road safety and civic responsibility, the Junior School Warden Scheme continues to make a meaningful impact in the communities of Ballygar National School, St. Mary's National School, Mountbellew and St. Patrick's National School, Moylough. This collaborative programme ensures that children can crossroads safely near their schools.

Sponsored by Galway County Council and the Road Safety Authority (RSA), the scheme equips young wardens with official uniforms, clear road markings, and prominent signage to enhance visibility and safety. The training, delivered by dedicated members of An Garda Síochána, instils both confidence and a strong sense of duty in these young volunteers.

On the 18th June 2025, the Junior School Warden final was held in Ballygar National School. Each Junior School Warden from the participating schools proudly received a Certificate of Achievement, recognising their commitment to keeping their peers safe and their contribution to the wider community.

Prizes were presented by Cathaoirleach Martina Kinane. This initiative not only fosters a culture of safety but also empowers students with leadership skills and a sense of civic pride; values that will serve them well into the future.



ISLANDS COMMITTEE MEETING

The Islands Committee, comprising representatives from the three Aran Islands and Inishbofin, convened on Inishbofin on 17th June 2025 for its quarterly meeting. The discussion focused on key issues affecting the islands, including infrastructure, planning, and public services.

Topics covered included pier maintenance, road conditions, housing, water supply, sewerage systems, public toilets, burial grounds, fire services, coastal erosion, waste management, and signage.

The Committee consists of two representatives from each island, nine Conamara Councillors, the Director of Services for the Infrastructure & Operations Unit, two Roads Senior Engineers, and technical staff from the Conamara Area Office. Meetings are coordinated by Administrative Officer Geraldine Byrne.

This committee plays a crucial role in maintaining regular communication between the islands and local authorities, providing guidance and support for various projects and funding opportunities.



WASTEWATER TREATMENT SYSTEM FOR CRAUGHWELL AND CLARINBRIDGE

This briefing is to update and inform Elected Members of Galway County Council on the Measure A8 of the Multi-Annual Rural Water Programme (MARWP) for the provision of wastewater infrastructure in the villages of Craughwell and Clarinbridge. The absence of public wastewater services in Craughwell and Clarinbridge continues to constrain sustainable housing delivery, creates risks to environmental protection, and limits the potential for economic and community development in both locations and this issue is a high priority for Galway County Council.

The Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage has recently written to the Council seeking confirmation that we are in a position to meet the required 15% co-funding contribution towards the overall project cost. The financial implications for the Council are significant. The estimated minimum contribution required from Galway County Council is €3.81 million, but the final figure is estimated to approach €5 million. This level of expenditure has not been provided for in the adopted 2025 budget. Any such commitment would need to be met from the Council's own resources under the 2026 Budget Process.

It is also important to highlight that the proposed investment will not generate any identifiable financial return for the Council. On completion of the project, the infrastructure will be handed over to Uisce Éireann, who will assume ownership and operational responsibility, including the collection of connection charges to the public that connect. As such, the Council will be making a substantial upfront investment without any subsequent revenue stream or retained control of the assets.

The Council will continue to liaise with the Department and with Uisce Éireann as we assess the financial and governance implications of this proposal and the council co-funding contribution towards the project will be considered under the 2026 budgetary process.

ACTIVE TRAVEL PROGRAMME - ACTIVE TRAVEL FOOTPATH AND INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

GCO/23/0015 ORANMORE ACTIVE TRAVEL SCHEME – PEDESTRIAN CROSSING, L4103, OLD LIMERICK ROAD (NEAR LIDL)

Construction works are now complete and pedestrian crossing is in operation near LIDL in Oranmore. The Road Safety Audit is scheduled for June to complete final Close-out, Phase 7 of NTA PAGs. This vital infrastructure project was initiated in response to a clearly identified need to enhance pedestrian safety and connectivity between local communities, schools, and the Oranmore town centre.



The project received strong support from elected members, reflecting a shared commitment to improving active travel options and fostering a safer, more accessible environment for all residents. The new crossing will serve as a key link in the local transport network, encouraging walking and supporting sustainable mobility.

Funding for the project was generously provided by the National Transport Authority (NTA), whose continued investment in community-focused infrastructure is greatly appreciated. This development marks a positive step forward in making Oranmore a safer and more connected place to live, work, and learn.

GCO/23/0021 TUAM ACTIVE TRAVEL SCHEME

Approval in principle was given by the National Transport Authority (NTA) to progress the identified emerging preferred option designs and develop the associated documentation for Phase 2 approval.

ROUND 1 SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL (ORANMORE AND ATHENRY SCHOOLS)

The schools included are Calasanctius College, Oranmore, Gaelscoil de hÍde, Oranmore, Scoil Iósaif Naofa, Oranmore, Scoil Chroí Naofa, Athenry & Athenry Boys National School.

We are nearing completion of Phase 3. Preliminary design workshop was held with the NTA and we are finalising Preliminary Design Report. We have engaged Road Safety Auditors ORS to carry out RSA's on all 5 schemes. Councillor briefing is being arranged for mid-June.

Schools currently being briefed on proposed measures in advance of Planning.

GCO/24/0004 - SRTS R1 ST PAULS OUGHTERARD

Works Completed, awaiting Road Safety Audit Stage 3. We are progressing to Phase 7 of NTA PAGS, Close-Out.

We are in Phase 2, the Design Consultants carried out site visits and are procuring necessary surveys before we can progress further with the NTA approvals.

ROUND 3 SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

There are 11 schools included in SRTS Round 3. An Taisce have visited all 11 schools to identify the issues pertaining to each location. 10 out of 11 Draft Delivery Plans have been received for information purposes. A workshop to discuss options for Milltown N.S. was held in April. All the TOPO surveys have been completed. The NTA have directly engaged with Active Travel Services Office (ATSO) to complete a design for all Round 3 schools.

GCO/25/0002 PEDESTRIAN CROSSING AT ST. JOSEPH'S ROAD PORTUMNA

Topographical survey was carried out in May. Approval in principle was given by the National Transport Authority for the location near junction with N65. We are developing the design in-house and arranging for Road Safety Audit 1/2 before we can seek the next stage NTA approval and proceed to planning.

CLIMATE CHANGE

COMMUNITY CLIMATE ACTION

OILEÁIN ÁRANN DECARBONISATION ZONE FUND

The three islands of Oileáin Árann form the Decarbonisation Zone (DZ) for Galway County. To support Climate Action in the DZ, Galway County Council launched the Pilot Oileáin Árann Climate Action Fund on 28th April 2025. The deadline for the fund was extended to 11th June. The €60,000 fund is open to organisations, businesses and communities of Oileáin Árann that are interested in developing Climate Action projects and initiatives.

COMMUNITY CLIMATE ACTION FUND

Communities are currently implementing projects which were awarded funding in 2024 under the Community Climate Action Fund. Seven of the thirty-two projects have been completed. Galway County Council is supporting the 2nd highest number of projects in the Country. Both East Galway & Midlands Cancer Support Ltd and Annaghdown GAA recently installed solar panels on their community buildings.

SUSTAINABLE ENERGY COMMUNITY PROGRAMME (SEC)

The SECs programme supports communities in the transition to a low carbon society. The Climate Action Unit works with SEAI mentors to support the completion of community level Energy Masterplans (EMP) through the provision of Bridging Finance and procurement support and then recoups the funding from SEAI. In May 2025, the Climate Unit provided funding to the Doon East SEC.

UPCOMING CLIMATE ACTION EVENTS

GREEN CLUBS INFORMATION NIGHT

A GAA Green Club Programme Information Night will take place on June 17th in Ballindeerran GAA Club organised by the Climate Action Unit. There will be presentations from Croke Park GAA Green Clubs Programme representatives, field studies from Green GAA Clubs, as well as presentations from Galway County Council staff. Denise Feeney, Community Climate Action Officer will provide information on the Community Climate Action Fund 2025, which we expect to launch in the coming months. GAA clubs will be able to apply for funding under the following themes: Energy, Biodiversity, Transport, Recycling and Local Climate Action.



ENERGY MANAGEMENT

The Climate Unit continues to work towards reducing energy use and emissions.

Project	Update
Building Audits	Codex Energy Consultants Ltd were appointed to conduct non-domestic BER assessments on four of our buildings to identify projects that can avail of 50% funding under the SEAI Pathfinder Programme. Site visits took place in May, and it is expected that the reports will be issued in July.
Energy Management System	A meeting of the cross-organisation Energy Team took place in May. Optien Ltd provided an update in relation to the recent Internal Audit and the Climate Unit provided a demonstration of the new Energy Data Management System. Documentation and procedures are being developed with a view to applying for ISO50001 certification in Q4 2025.

ADAPTATION

NATIONAL ADAPTATION COMMITTEE

The National Adaptation Committee held an in-person meeting in Galway / Inis Mór on the 27th/28th May. The Adaptation Committee was established by the Climate Change Advisory Council to advise on matters related to climate change risk. It includes representatives such as the Head of the Risk Management Division in the OPW and the Senior Meteorologist in Met Éireann's Climate Services Division. OPERATIONS

On the 13th May the West Regional Control Centre (as a hub of the National Mobilisation and Communications System (NMACS)) migrated and went live on the new Command and Control System. This migration offers a considerable element of resilience for each of the 3 regional hubs (Castlebar (west region), Limerick (South region) and Dublin (East region)), in that in times of spate calls in a region or a hub going offline, 999/112 emergency calls can be handled, and local resources dispatched by another regional hub.

The new system has resulted in monthly reports not yet being available to authorities, however NMACS has been requested to continue to provide the monthly/quarterly/annual reports as heretofore. This will enable fire authorities complete end of year KPI submissions and annual reports and monitor trends in incident types and numbers. The current unavailability of a monthly report unfortunately means that it is not possible to provide call types and numbers and mobilisation and attendance times in this current operations report.

PREVENTION

The information in the following is based on the May 2025 figures. The Fire Authority received 11 Fire Safety Certificate applications and issued decisions on 6 applications. 5 Disability Access Certificate applications were received, and decisions made on 10 applications. 5 new licences were issued in February and 21 inspections were conducted.

CIVIL DEFENCE

MEDC (MAJOR EMERGENCY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE)

The Civil Defence Officer (CDO) attended the May meetings of the MEDC for both Galway County Council and Galway City Council.

ACTIVITIES

Galway Civil Defence were tasked to assist with the search of a missing fisherman on Lough Corrib. A Boat crew, Drone crew and Control Unit responded to the search area near Cong. All were returned to their bases as the missing person was located safe and well on one of the Islands.

Crews from around the county provided medical cover for various events, particularly the Darkness into Light in which 6 of the walks were covered by members of Galway Civil defence in the early hours of the 6th May.





DESIGN MINGLE WITH RÓISÍN CURÉ

Róisín Curé will speak about her inspiring journey to success in CREW on Friday 20th June. Growing up on a mountainside in Wicklow, Róisín sold her first paintings at the age of 14. Her education included art in NCAD, a design HND in London and an MSc in Geology in Galway. Raising children and fielding endless rejections resulted in very little professional success for about twenty years. Thirteen years ago, while living in Mauritius, Róisín discovered urban sketching. She established Urban Sketchers Galway in 2014 along with two co-founders, which is going from strength to strength these days. She taught her first international urban sketching workshop in 2015 and in the ten years since she has taught across Europe and worked as a professional on-location sketcher for various government bodies.

Róisín Curé has represented Ireland on the world stage at USk Porto (2018), USk Amsterdam (2019), USk Switzerland in Bern (2021), and will carry the flag this year in Poznan, Poland and Geneva, Switzerland. Between 2019 and 2021 Róisín published three bestsellers with sketching as their theme: An Urban Sketcher's Galway (Currach Press 2019), reprinted as Galway In Sketches And Stories (Red Stripe Press, 2024); The Urban Sketcher's Handbook: Drawing Expressive People (Quarto, 2020) and Dublin In Sketches And Stories (Merrion Press, 2021 and 2024). All are in second edition and / or translation. Róisín started teaching sketching live online to her followers early in 2020. From 2022 to 2024 she hosted the Sketch Therapist podcast. She started broadcasting on YouTube in 2023 making videos about life as a sketcher. In 2023, frustrated by the shortcomings of sketching bags available,

she started designing a bag for sketchers, and in 2024 her cactus leather SketchPocket hit the market, selling out in a few weeks. The Róisín Curé Sketch Club is in full swing, with subscription-only live classes twice weekly broadcast to a global community. She lives in Kilcolgan in south Galway.

The Regeneration Team facilitated a site visit by the students and tutors where they walked them through the project outlining the aspirations and design ethos for the project. The Regeneration Team were on hand with ATU throughout the project and were delighted to be invited to their end of year presentation of works on 29th May 2025, where the Portumna Courthouse project took centre stage.



RRDF PROJECT – LOUGHREA TOWN HALL

Finna Construction are progressing with demolition works ongoing. Work has commenced on the construction of the new build three storey rear extension to the original structure.

Agreement has been reached with the landowner to purchase the adjacent derelict property on Church Street. The conveyancing process will commence over the coming weeks now that terms have been agreed. Future development plans for the property are currently being considered.

O’C & C Architects have been appointed to deliver the process through detailed design, tender and construction phases. It is the intention to investigate the provision of a meeting room facility to cater for meeting of the Municipal District as part of the project. The detailed design process has commenced.

Galway County Council have been informed that the Office of Public Works have appointed a contractor to carry out improvement works to the entrance threshold to Athenry Castle. Works are progressing on site and are expected to be completed in advance of the high tourism season.



TUAM

TUAM STATION BUILDING: REPURPOSING, RENOVATION AND EXTENSION

The renovation and extension of the Tuam Station Building has been designed inhouse by the Regeneration Team.

The Part 8 planning application was submitted on the 28th of March. A Meeting of Tuam Municipal District convened on May 29th to consider the Chief Executives Report on the planning file. The application was approved unanimously. A funding application to deliver the capital project has been made to the Northern and Western Regional Assembly under the European Regional Development Fund. The funding sought amounts to some €6.6 million euros.



TUAM STATION QUARTER MASTERPLAN (THRIVE FUNDING)

Galway County Council is working in partnership with Iarnród Éireann and to deliver a transformational masterplan for the Tuam Station Quarter. Reddy Architecture and Urbanism have been formally appointed to develop the masterplan. The first public consultation has taken place. The findings are being collated by the consultants to inform the draft masterplan. Engagement with Iarnród Éireann has progressed in the past number of weeks, further exchange of information is scheduled to take place.

It is anticipated that a workshop with Elected Members will take place in the coming months. Further public engagement will also be held.

Galway County Council has launched a landmark strategy for preserving and enhancing the county's rich built, natural, and cultural heritage over the next six years.

Unveiled at the Marine Institute in Rinvilla, the **Galway County Heritage and Biodiversity Plan 2024–2030** sets out a detailed roadmap to address challenges such as climate change,

biodiversity loss, and the need for community-driven heritage preservation and the safeguarding and protection of our intangible cultural heritage.

Developed in collaboration with Galway County Heritage & Biodiversity Forum and The Heritage Council, the plan is the only one of its kind in Ireland to fully integrate biodiversity and heritage under a single strategy.

Among the key priorities are conducting a comprehensive biodiversity audit of Council-owned lands, updating Galway’s Invasive Alien Species Strategy, and developing a countywide Tree and Hedgerow Management Plan. The plan also commits to protecting sensitive habitats such as peatlands and marine ecosystems, while expanding environmental education through the Heritage in Schools programme.

The built heritage aspects of the Galway County Heritage and Biodiversity Plan 2024-2030 aim to preserve, protect, and enhance the county’s built and archaeological heritage by promoting best practices, supporting community engagement, and ensuring compliance with relevant legislation. The plan also seeks to raise awareness, provide education and training, and foster collaboration among stakeholders to ensure the sustainable management and conservation of these heritage assets.

On the cultural heritage front, the plan aims to empower communities to actively engage with and safeguard their local heritage. This involves recording and digitising cultural heritage data, supporting community-led arts and oral history projects, and strengthening investment in both staffing and funding to grow the sector sustainably.

The Council’s last plan (2017–2022) delivered several notable achievements, including the award-winning **Digitising Galway’s Graveyard Heritage** project, which made more than 40,000 burial records accessible to the public online. Other successes included an **Audit of the County’s Holy Wells**, a **Barn Owl Conservation** initiative that showed the first signs of species recovery in 50 years, and a countywide masterplan for oral heritage collections. The Council also supported **Féile na gCloch**, or “Festival of Stone,” on Inis Oírr, which celebrates traditional stonework craftsmanship.

The Galway County Heritage and Biodiversity Plan 2024–2030 was shaped by extensive public consultation over the past two years. Engagement efforts included countywide consultation events, an online survey, and targeted workshops with the Traveller community, Brothers of Charity, primary and secondary schools, and active age groups. The plan, which received over 450 public submissions, was formally approved by Elected Members in December 2024.

Liam Hanrahan, Director of Economic Development at Galway County Council, said, "This plan demonstrates the powerful impact that collaboration between the public, community groups, and key stakeholders can have on shaping Galway’s future. BALLINASLOE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

During May 2025, roadworks programme projects have begun to be completed under the restoration maintenance grant allocation (surface dressing). It is expected that the restoration improvement grant works will begin in June. Direct labour crews have been undertaking preparatory works on all road sections in advance of the contracted roadworks. In addition, direct labour crews in Ballinasloe MD have undertaken road strengthening works in Ballinasloe South. Separately, at Ballinasloe Civic Offices, external repainting of the building and remarking of the carpark including pedestrian access routes and disabled spaces, has been completed. As part of the countywide bus stop upgrade programme, two new bus stops were completed in Ballymoe on the N60 Roscommon Road.

PRIMARY FOCUS OF ACTIVITY

Works on the Roads Programme are progressing well.. Surface dressing, in particular, was significantly aided by the unseasonably good weather in late May. The last two weeks have seen a return to a more typical “Irish Summer” and this has had the expected impact on progress. A high-level overview is as follows:

- 48 Restoration Improvement Grant projects - 13 Complete (27%)
- 22 Restoration Maintenance Grant (RMG) projects - 18 Complete (82%)
- 8 Local Tertiary Roads – 2 Complete (25%)
- 5 No Climate Change Adaptation and Resilience Schemes - 2 Complete (40%) and 1 On-going
- 3 No. Low-Cost Safety Improvement Works – 1 On-going
- 2 No. Former National Schemes – Yet to commence
- LIS and CIS Schemes – Yet to commence

ROADS PROGRAMME

The Roads programme commenced last Month in Tuam MD by both contract works and direct labour works. Currently the Tuam MD is ahead of schedule on all works.

- o Restoration improvement grants - overlay programme is 80% complete by Roadstone
- o Surface dressing contract is 70% complete by Colas Contracting
- o Direct labour roads jobs are 50% complete
- o Community Involvement schemes are being finalised with 5 projects with budget of €170,000 for the MD
- o Local improvement schemes are being finalised with 5 schemes with budget of €109,000 for MD

RIVER WALK DUNMORE

Dunmore River Walk is a Community Park located along the bank of the Sinking river and linking the town centre to some key community facilities such as playing pitches, numerous housing estates, and playground. This is a freely available public space within the town and is used by all members of the community on a daily basis, however, the basic infrastructure could be improved to maximise accessibility and safety for all members of the community. The projects to be undertaken have been identified through consultations with members of the local community and respond directly to their identified needs.

Dept. of Rural & Community, Integration and Environment allocated funding through Clar 2024 for this project and works commenced in the last month. The project will encompass 3 main elements:

- Safety Works to replace fencing along the boundary with the river which has become dangerously deficient in places and poses a risk to the public.
- Accessibility Works to improve the condition and width of walkways to ensure they are accessible, allied with the provision of age friendly benches and accessible picnic tables – these works will be underpinned by a Walkability Audit conducted with older people to maximise accessibility for all. Additional works to improve the usability of the area for all will include provision of bins and signage at strategic locations.
- Biodiversity Works will also be undertaken as currently the area predominantly comprises of grassed areas, therefore, emphasis will be placed on additional planting of native species to improve biodiversity and the visual appearance of the amenity.
