A special guest on the night was Liam Sammon, an All-Ireland medal winner from 1966, and in the course of his interview with Martin he paid tribute to another man who had a long association with Creggs, the legend that is Mattie McDonagh.

CREATIVE IRELAND

November is a very busy time of year for Creative Ireland with many of our bursary funded projects coming to a close and recoupment winding up for the year. The projects are varied in scale and subject including sculpture trails, music festivals, literary launches and more.



On the 3rd of November **Newbridge Tidy Towns** unveiled their newly installed sculpture trail. This was a soft launch with an official community launch to take place in Spring 2024. Designed by Artfarm Collective, these sculptures are made of natural or recycled, locally sourced materials, and designed to work with their environment as they decompose. The invited artists were asked to consider the theme of environment and climate action. This project engaged local artists who worked in collaboration and

consultation with the local community and was funded under the Galway County Creative Ireland Bursary Scheme.

In late October musician Keith Wallace was awarded Creative Ireland funding to travel to Inis Oirr as part of **The Plassey Project**. While on the island Keith met with and interviewed locals who remember the heroic 1960 rescue of the crew of the M.V. Plassey. He also recorded sound scaping at the site of the famous shipwreck and will use these recordings, along with samples of his interviews to create an original piece of music. This innovative technique will preserve the sounds and story of The Plassey for generations to come as the shipwreck falls further and further into irreparable disrepair.







Sticking with music, mid-November sees the launch of Galway's newest festival, **Going Coastal**. This event is a celebration of contemporary original music featuring young, emerging, and established acts from Galway City and County. From the 15th to the 19th of November, Galway's West End plays host to a wide variety of live music performances by local musicians.

Funding from Galway County's Creative Ireland bursary scheme supported a song-writing workshop for That's Life, an award-winning arts and personal development programme for people with intellectual disabilities. This programme of the Brothers of Charity Services has seen the formation of the band Electric Dreams, a diverse band with a strong message of inclusion and community. Electric Dreams gave a free, family-friendly concert at the Nun's Island Theatre on Saturday November 18th. They were joined on stage by composer Anna Mullarkey and electro-folk artist Emma Lohan.

For members of Active Retirement Groups, Mens Sheds, Womens Sheds and individuals who work closely with older adults. 2-3 representatives from each group will take part and deliver what they have learned to their group. Support for starting sessions and equipment will be available from Gallway Sports Partnership and Healthy Galway Galway Sports Partnership is holding a 5-week training programme for Older Adult, Disability Groups and Organisations in Rossaveal Community Hall. This training aims to help these groups to increase their offerings and run sustainable activities by training up people within these groups to lead various activities. Over the 5-week training programme the course will cover topics such as;

- Functional Fitness (tips on how we can be more active during the day and how you can encourage your peers in your group/persons you support)
- Activator Poles (walking poles and how you can use these for exercise also)
- Social Games (Boccia, Scooch, Flisk and Skittles)
- Step2TheBeat (Folk and social dances)
- Seated Exercises (some revision over the previous weeks and ways we can make changes to include individuals who are sitting)



Participants can avail of equipment on loan from Galway Sports Partnership and Healthy Galway County to use with their groups. The idea being that if the groups enjoy the activities, they can then purchase their own equipment through fundraising of their members or through grants such as Age and Opportunity, Galway County Council community grants or Galway Sports Partnership grants.

This programme is supported through Healthy Ireland Funding.



TUAM STREETSCAPE ENHANCEMENT SCHEME TOWN AND VILLAGE RENEWAL SCHEME



Tuam Streetscape Enhancement Scheme Sample Before & After

A total of **€85,008.44** has been recouped from the Department of Community and Rural Development further to investment in the Tuam Town Centre Streetscape Enhancement Scheme funded by the Village Town and Renewal Scheme.

Over 40 Offers of Grant Funding were made to applicants within the Town Centre zone extending from Market Square in the 2022-2023 period. 32 Properties completed and successfully drew down grant funding of up to 80% of their costs within the Scheme deadline which ran to the end of October 2023.

The main type of work completed was façade painting, some lighting and general declutter works. High Street Businesses in particular, succeeded in completing a higher volume of adjacent properties resulting in a positive visual improvement. Stakeholders in the roll-out included Local Business Networks, Auctioneering Companies, Tuam Tidy Towns and Tuam Lions Club who contributed to the promotion and information on the Scheme further to Galway County Council Public Information Workshops and Advisory Clinics held regularly in the Tuam Regional Office. It is noted that the support of the Elected Members in promoting the Scheme and assistance of the Staff in the Tuam MD Office, as well as local business and community networks contributed greatly to the implementation of the Scheme.

TOWN AND VILLAGE RENEWAL SCHEME - LEENANE COMMUNITY PARK

Leenane Development Association (LDA) completed works and a successful claim to Galway County Council for their final draw-down of Grant Aid of €250,000 under the Town and Village Renewal Programme (2021 Scheme) at end of October 2023. The Park on the shores of Killary Harbour in North Connemara includes parking spaces, outdoor seating and completed assessable pathways in a circular route around a central open green space.

Future plans include provision of a community playground subject to funding. The desired aim of the project was to re-use a disused pitch to create an amenity for local and visitors as part of ongoing efforts to sustain the population of this small village and surrounding areas year-round. The project is a testament to a small resilient community working to match fund and oversee delivery of this large-scale project for current and future generations. Furthermore, it adds an additional amenity to encourage visitors and day trippers to stay longer in the area and to avail of local tourism and hospitality businesses. The Council will recoup the funding paid from Department of Community and Rural Development by end of November and the project is due to be launched in Spring 2024.

- · development of outdoor recreational infrastructure


For the following Measures:




- The proposed Galway to Athlone Cycleway project, which is being led by Galway City, and Galway, Roscommon and Westmeath County Councils, will
 complete the circa 270km Galway to Dublin Cycleway, and will be a world class amenity for pedestrians, cyclists and wheelchair users to enjoy.
- The emerging preferred route for the Cycleway has been selected and from Athlone it goes around via Portuma and Gort. In this area, it goes from Clarinbridge to Rinville Park and from there on to Oranmore and Galway City (as shown on the above extract from the route map). The proposed route crosses the site for the planned Renville Sports and Community Grounds, as shown above on the right (final route to be designed).
- This project will provide a safe cycleway for much of the catchment area of Oranmore Maree GAA to get to the new Renville Sports and Community Ground
 – these two projects will work in synergy to provide state of the art facilities and amenities to the whole community.






The expected continued rapid growth of the Oranmore Maree area is consistent with Government objectives and targets for balanced regional growth under the National Planning Framework which states that the target population growth for Galway by 2040 is 50-60%, or 40,000-48,000 people, bringing the population of Galway to 120,000.










The proposed car park is a key element to promote Maam as a hub for outdoor recreation activity.



The existing Beara Breifne Way stretches from Dursey Island in Co Cork to Blacklion in Co Cavan. It runs for over 700km and traverses the counties of Cork, Kerry, Limerick, Tipperary, Offaly, Galway, Roscommon, Sligo, Leitrim and Cavan. The Beara Breifne Way is made up of 12 existing National Waymarked Trails or long-distance walking routes and sections of trail that link these.

The legendary march taken by Dónal Cam O'Sullivan Beara and visits many of the places and communities shaped by his story. On New Year's Eve 1602, he led one thousand men and women, including four hundred soldiers, on the epic march north, hoping to join forces with rebel leaders in Ulster.

Glinsk Castle was an important stopping point for O'Sullivan Beare in the early days of January 1603.

RINVILLE PARK

Essential repair and maintenance works to the facia boards and rainwater gutters on the public toilet building at Rinville Park, Oranmore, Co. Galway. Significant deterioration of the timber facia had occurred at one of the old stone buildings at Rinville Park. This timber structure supported the rainwater gutter which was in a state of collapse. The Facilities Section procured a competent contractor to removal all the timber facia and replace with treated timbers and refix the rainwater gutters thus preventing potential injuries to the public using the toilet facilities.






DECADE OF CENTENARIES: 1923 RESPOND, REFLECT, REJOICE



Abandoned Goods Film Screening with talk by Prof. Clair Wills

J.J. Beegan was an artist and sculptor who made drawings repeatedly naming himself, his profession and Ballinasloe, as a long stay patient at Netherne Mental Health Hospital, in East Surrey, England, where he made drawings recalling home.

Screened in Ballinasloe Library for the first time, Abandoned Goods is a short film that explores the many artists making work in Netherne, including Beegan through archival and



35mm footage. Following the screening there will be a talk by Professor Clair Wills, who will share her extensive research into Beegan's life and his connections to Ballinasloe.

Abandoned Goods screened as part of TULCA Festival of Visual Arts curated by Iarlaith Ní Fheorais. An essay film exploring the journey of one of Britain's major collections of 'asylum art' containing about 5,500 objects (paintings, drawings, ceramics, sculptures and works on stone, flint and bone) created between 1946 and 1981, by about 140 people compelled to live in the Netherne psychiatric hospital in South London.

Abandoned Goods was awarded the Golden Pardino for the Best International Short Film in the Leopards of Tomorrow Competition at Locarno Film Festival. To date it has also screened at the Hamptons, London BFI Film Festival, Sundance, True/False, Full Frame Documentary Film Festival, Oberhausen, Festival International de Cine De Huesca, Janela International de Cinema Festival, Bucharest Experimental Film Festival, First Fortnight Film Festival, DocAviv, San Francisco Documentary Film Festival and Busan International Short Film Festival.

Edward Lawrenson is a Scottish filmmaker and writer based in London. His films have played at a number of festivals, including Sundance, BFI London Film Festival, Cinéma du réel, True/False, Open City; and cinemas, including the Museum of the Moving Image in New York and London's ICA.

Pia Borg is a Maltese/Australian filmmaker. Her non-fiction films that chronicle historical events and psychological phenomena have received numerous prizes, including the Golden Leopard at Locarno Festival for Abandoned Goods (2014) which she co-directed with Ed Lawrenson.




LOUGHREA LIBRARY

rendition of the song by Aisling Mitchell, accompanied by Gerry on the guitar.






SCIENCE WEEK IN LIBRARIES

VACANT HOMES OFFICE INCLUDING CROÍ CÓNAITHE

VACANT HOMES SURVEY UPDATE:

A survey is underway to confirm vacancy of 1727 properties in urban centres throughout County Galway. As of Thursday 16th November, 795 properties have been surveyed, 406 of which have been confirmed to be Vacant / Derelict. See Dashboard below.





Of the seven (7) main large settlements, six (6) have now been surveyed – Tuam, Oranmore, Loughrea, Ballinasloe, Clifden and Athenry. Gort will be surveyed by the end of November. Of the mid-size settlements, four (4) have now been surveyed – Bearna, Na Forbacha, Headford and Craughwell.

The following mid-size settlements have yet to be surveyed: Baile Chláir, Corrandulla, Lackagh, Turloughmore, Ballygar, Glenamaddy, Moylough, Mountbellew, Menlough, Williamstown, Ahascragh, Moycullen, Oughterard, An Cheathrú Rua, An Spidéal, Cill Rónáin, Roundstone, Rosscahill, Portumna, Kinvara, Clarinbridge, Kilcolgan, Eyrecourt, Woodford, Killimor, Dunmore, Ballinderreen, Corofin, Cluain Bú, Monivea, Milltown, Abbeyknockmoy and Dunmore.

All identified vacant properties are provided with information about the various schemes available to bring the property back into use as a dwelling and a poster showing that the site has been visited is placed on the front of the building.



CROÍ CÓNAITHE

There is a high level of interest in the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grants (Croí Cónaithe Scheme). The number of applications submitted in 2023 to date is 268 (124 In progress i.e. additional information has been requested etc, 130 applications have been finalised (88 approved, 42 rejected), and 14 applications have been withdrawn).

The scheme has also been updated in relation to agricultural buildings as follows:


The Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant is available for the refurbishment of a vacant or derelict properties for occupation as a principle private residence and for properties that will be made available for rent.

This includes the conversion of commercial or public use buildings that have not been used as residential heretofore. These buildings have to be compliant with Planning (i.e., exempt or with planning permission). Agricultural structures e.g., sheds and outhouses, are not eligible for grant funding.





SALE OF DERELICT PROPERTIES

The sale of derelict houses identified previously is progressing and there is a lot of interest in some of the properties. It is planned to bring a number of properties to the December Meeting under the Section 183 process for approval.

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT PROGRAMME



In November 2020 the Housing Section of Galway County Council was contacted by Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth requesting that housing be made available for the resettlement of up to 150 new arrivals to Ireland under the Irish Refugee Protection Programme 2 (IRPP) 2021 to 2023.

An Inter-Agency Working Group was set up to ensure necessary support was in place to enable families relocating to Galway from Emergency Reception and Orientation Centres access services and to integrate into their local communities. Some of the families had resided in these centres for 2 to 3 years.


GCC identified and allocated 31 houses, suitable for various size families, to the Refugee Resettlement Scheme in 6 towns across the County. These houses were fully kitted out with the essentials by the Department of Social Protection prior to the arrival of the refugees and were allocated to suitable sized families in line with the Council's Housing Allocation Scheme. The Programme Refugees are originally from Syria and Afghanistan, and speak Arabic, Pashto or Dari as a first language.



A Refugee Resettlement Support Worker Officer and Arabic Intercultural an Worker/Interpreter started with the Programme in 2022, joined by an Aghan Intercultural Worker and Interpreter in 2023. To date, they have supported 125 men, women, and children in 27 households, who have successfully relocated to County Galway. The designated staff will be working to the end of April 2024, thanks to a contract extension supported by the Irish Refugee Protection



Programme, to facilitate the relocation of the remaining 4 families over the next few months. The Programme is fully funded by DCEDIY and its success is largely due to the support of multiple organisations, including Government Departments and local Community supports. During the



Resettlement Programme events are organised by the Refugee Resettlement Support Worker to introduce and familiarise families in the Programme with each other and with their local communities. One such event held recently to celebrate World Food Day took place in Clarin College, Athenry in collaboration with the staff and some home economics pupils of the school. It was facilitated by Jess Murphy of Kai Restaurant with some of the refugee families who had been resettled under the Programme came together to create

and sharing their national dishes. Jess spoke about her experiences with refugees, as an active supporter of UNHCR and having spent time with Syrian refugees in Lebanon and Jordan prior to their resettlement in Ireland. The families said that they are delighted to have the ability to cook and eat their own food as it reminds them of home. This was not possible when they were living in the camps in the Lebanon and Jordan or whilst they were residing in the Emergency Reception Orientation Centres.

Some feedback from the students of Clarin College, Athenry:

"I enjoyed learning about the culture of Afghanistan and Syria".

"I enjoyed listening to the refugees talk about their traditional foods and their background in their home country".

"I learned about new cultures and tried new foods".





TENANCY & ESTATE MANAGEMENT

The Tenancy & Estate Management Unit was established in 2013 within the Housing Unit of Galway County Council to clearly show the Council's commitment to provide secure and lasting homes and the care and support to develop stable and sustainable communities, prevent tenancy breakdown and possible homelessness. The Tenancy Sustainment Strategy for the County outlines the interventions and supports available to assist our tenants in sustaining their tenancy and contributes positively to their neighbourhood and community.


An inter-departmental and inter-agency approach is adopted by the Housing Unit and its partners, in an effort to improve the quality of life for residents in our housing estates with staff regularly meeting with relevant staff from the HSE, An Garda Siochana, Galway/Roscommon Education Training Board and other agencies as necessary. Galway County Council's Anti-Social Behaviour Strategy recognises that anti-social behaviour can have an adverse effect on the quality of life of our tenants and the stability and sustainability of communities. The Anti-Social Behaviour Strategy acknowledges the importance of a multi-agency approach in preventing and reducing incidences of anti-social behaviour.

A new CRM system was rolled out in 2023 to collate all TEM cases and track assignments. A migration of data to the new system involved collating historical data from all the various sources and uploading to the new system. The screenshots below outline all TEM activity to date in 2023.

This one portal tracks all cases from start to completion and is also linked to a BI report which means an accurate update is provided which reflects the number of cases and their status.



OFFER A HOME PROGRAMME

The escalation of the international armed conflict in Ukraine has caused civilian casualties and destruction of civilian infrastructure forcing people to flee their homes, seeking safety protection and assistance. Millions of refugees from Ukraine have crossed borders into neighbouring countries and some have been forced to move inside the country. They are in need of protection and support.

In light of the emergency and the scale of humanitarian needs; an interagency response is being carried out in support of the displaced people from Ukraine; Galway County Council continues to work on the Ukraine response through the administration of the Offer A Home Programme.

Under the programme, local authorities are appealing for offers of houses, apartments, or holiday homes for use as temporary accommodation for those arriving from Ukraine. Ideally, properties would be available for at least six months. Property owners can offer homes on the website www.offerahome.ie

To date 65 homes have been registered and inspected on this programme; 47 of which are now occupied with displaced people from Ukraine, whilst a further 12 are in the process of being allocated.



RENT A ROOM SCHEME

The Minister, as part of Government's consideration of a range of Housing for All actions, announced on the 14th November 2023 the decision to extend access to the Rent a Room Scheme to local authority tenants from 1 December.

This initial rollout of the scheme will target potential student renters using the existing Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science (DFHERIS) 'Room for a Student' campaign. The Government has developed a dedicated <u>portal</u> for the Room for Student campaign that includes a range of information for those interested.

STORM DEBI EMERGENCY EVACUATION PLAN FOR TRAVELLER SPECIFIC HALTING SITES

In response to Storm Debi and the Met Eireann Weather Alerts for Extreme Weather (Wind) Status Orange and Red and a meeting of the Council's Severe Weather Assessment Team (SWAT) it was decided on Sunday, 12th November 2023 to implement the Galway County Council Emergency Evacuation Plan for Traveller Specific Halting Sites.

The Traveller Liaison Officer (TLO) arranged for the centres in both Portumna and Tuam to be made available as follows:

Capira, Portumna – Portumna Town Hall, Clonfert, Portumna

Tuam Halting Site - Western Traveller Intercultural Centre, Brú Bhríde, Churchview, Tuam

GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL PROJECT SHOWCASED

HOUSING DISABILITY STEERING GROUP (HDSG): MENTAL HEALTH SUBGROUP – GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL

A Galway County Council initiative was showcased by the National Oversight and Audit Commission and commended by Minister O'Brien at the recent NOAC's Good Practice in Local Government seminar, an annual event organised by NOAC, in collaboration with the Local Government Management Agency, to showcase a range of local authority innovations.

The 5th annual Good Practice in Local Government seminar, organised by NOAC, in collaboration with the Local Government Management Agency (LGMA) and the County and City Management Association (CCMA), held in Kilkenny Castle, included a presentation on the Galway County Council Housing Disability Steering Group (HDSG): Mental Health Subgroup.

Opening the event, Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD, recognised the "initiative, innovation and hard work of local authorities" while addressing attendees. Minister O'Brien further commented, "The variety and calibre of projects showcased today really brings the work of our local authorities to life and shows the positive impact being made across the country through our local government colleagues".

The Galway County Council Housing Disability Steering Group mental health subgroup uses a partnership approach between the local authority and HSE to progress mutual clients with mental health diagnoses. It offers a communication pathway and, for clients with additional needs, to



progress having their own tenancies, supporting vulnerable applicants in a way that is person-centred, allows for case discussion and progression of complex cases and vulnerable clients.

LIVING MY LIFE HOUSING DEMONSTRATION PROJECT



The initiative is a collaboration between Ability West and the Brothers of Charity, which will provide access to housing for adults with intellectual disabilities throughout Galway County.

The team will work with 32 individuals over the next five years to prepare them for more independent living by building on their life skills and assisting them to find socially valued, roles in the community.

Whilst the project is a collaboration between Ability West and the Brothers of Charity Services Ireland – West Region, it has also been identified as a Priority Action in the HSE National Service Plan 2022 – 2027 following the publication of the Disability Capacity Review 2032 in which the gap between service demand and service provision was clearly identified.





It aims to develop a Rights-Based approach to housing, supporting person-centred supports, community inclusion and enablement by establishing pathways into housing for the people supported and involves collaborating with Galway County Council to look at housing solutions under their Strategic Plan for Housing People with a Disability 2021 – 2026.



CAPITAL BUILD PROGRAMME

8 UNITS AT BALLYMOE

Finna construction Ltd. have mobilised and commenced construction of the 8-unit housing development in Ballymoe, further to contract signed with Galway County Council in October 2023.

The final phase consisting of 8 apartment units within the protected structure element of this development was completed this month.



WILLIAMSTOWN, SINGLE RURAL:



Contracts for the demolition and new build of a bungalow unit commenced on a derelict unit in Williamstown in November. Carty Construction were awarded the contract with a programme for delivery of 12 months.

58 UNITS, AN CEAHTRU BHAN, ATHENRY:

The final phase of the advance purchase of 58 units at An Ceathru Bhan, Athenry closed in November.



BUNDLE 7 OF THE SOCIAL HOUSING PPP PROGRAMME

A site in the ownership of Galway County Council at Ballygaddy Road, Tuam is provisionally included in Bundle 7 of the Social Housing PPP Programme. It is envisaged that approximately 60 high-quality energy efficient homes can be provided on the site under the PPP programme. The site also offers the scope for mixed tenure housing, to include affordable housing and the potential for cost rental housing, subject to design development and feasibility.



The Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage provisionally selected the sites for Bundle 7 following an initial review of the local authority (LA) site reports and the completion of site visits by the National Development Finance Agency. Bundle 7 will involve the construction of almost

650 social housing units across 6 sites and 4 local authorities. Dublin City Council has agreed to act as the lead for this bundle based on the number projects included for their area and also in view of their experience as lead LA for Bundles 1, 3, 4 and 5 of the Programme.



The site is located in the townland of Halfstraddle, off the R332 Ballygaddy Road, in Tuam, County Galway. It is located approx. 1km northwest of the town centre. The site for development is a greenfield site comprising 5.76 Ha (14.24 Acres) with vehicular access to be provided from the Ballygaddy Road (R332). The area is zoned Residential (Phase 1) with two perimeter strips zoned Open Space/Recreation & Amenity to the East and South of the site in the Tuam Local Area Plan 2018-2024.

The Council is committed to examining the potential to deliver a mixed tenure development on the overall site, to include the delivery of an affordable housing scheme and potentially the first cost rental housing for Tuam.

The social housing PPP model provides a delivery structure whereby social housing units remain in State ownership throughout. The homes are being delivered using an 'availability based' PPP model, in which a private sector company designs, builds, finances, maintains and operates (DBFMO) the social housing developments for a 25-year period, in return for a monthly payment ('Unitary Charge') from the State. The monthly payments only commence once construction is completed, and the homes are available for tenanting. Experienced tenancy management service providers such as Approved Housing Bodies (AHBs), provide the required management services for the PPP developments on behalf of the relevant local authority (who remains the landlord) over the 25-year operating period and the units are returned to the relevant LAs in a pre-defined condition at the end of the operating period.



RAPID BUILD HOUSING FOR UKRAINIAN PEOPLE DISPLACED BY WAR – PROPOSAL FOR POOLBOY, BALLINASLOE

As part of the State's Humanitarian Response to the Ukrainian Crisis, the Government is rolling out a Rapid Build Housing Programme to provide accommodation for families fleeing the war in Ukraine. Now in progress, the programme aims to provide short-term accommodation to 2,800 Ukrainians, in four-person family units, at several sites across Ireland, including rapid build homes proposed for a site in Poolboy, Ballinasloe.

A rapid build home is a small dwelling that is mostly built off-site from the planned location and then delivered and finished on site. This means they can be put in place quicker than standard accommodation and there is less construction disruption to the area. The Office of Public Works (OPW) has been asked by Government to develop the programme of rapid build homes needed to accommodate Ukrainian Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection (BOTP), on behalf of the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth (DCEDIY), which is the approving authority for the programme.

WHY RAPID BUILD HOMES?

The Government is obliged under EU law to provide accommodation to people under the Temporary Protective Directive (European Council Directive 2001/55EC).

The Government is providing temporary accommodation to all those fleeing the conflict and in need of accommodation.

However, as the crisis continues and more displaced persons arrive in Ireland, Rapid Build Homes will provide a means to increase the accommodation capacity available.

SITES FOR RAPID BUILD HOMES

The Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage, along with DCEDIY, OPW and Local Authorities have identified vacant sites located in or close to urban areas, including the site at Poolboy, Ballinasloe, Co. Galway. The OPW has assessed each site and deemed it suitable for use.

DOES THIS HAVE AN IMPACT ON SOCIAL HOUSING?

No. People on existing social housing lists have access to both housing available to Local Authorities and to related financial supports. Ukrainian Beneficiaries of Temporary Protection (BOTP) do not have rights to social housing.

Occupants of the Rapid Build homes will also be required to pay charges.

WHAT ABOUT COMMUNITY SERVICES?

The Department of Education is planning for the extra school places needed and alternative arrangements will be made to bring occupant children to schools close by where the local school is at



capacity. The Department of Health along with the HSE are planning for additional health service requirements.

The Community Forum coordinates the community-led response in the provision of assistance and support to Ukrainian refugees as they are accommodated around the county. The partner agencies and organisations who form part of the Community Response Forum will work through their individual remits to support the integration of displaced persons into local areas. The Government is also providing funding for community initiatives to support persons displaced by the war in Ukraine.

INFORMING THE COMMUNITY

DCEDIY, with the support of the OPW, is engaging with local representatives, Local Authorities and the communities where the sites will be located to provide full information about the plans.

An information session was held in the Shearwater Hotel, Ballinasloe on Wednesday 8th November from 7pm - 9pm for local residents to provide further information on this project.

In the context of the Galway County Council site at Poolboy, Ballinasloe being identified for a Rapid Build Modular Homes Development, as part of Ireland's response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the OPW offered to facilitate a site visit to a similar development nearing completion in Clonminch, Co. Offaly. The site visit is proposed for Friday, 24th November 2023 with an initial invitation extended to the Ballinasloe Municipal District and the Housing Strategic Policy Committee.

It is currently envisaged that a proposal to lease the site at Poolboy, Ballinasloe to the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth to facilitate the Rapid Build Modular Homes Development will be presented to the December Plenary.

INFRASTRUCTURE & OPERATIONS

WATER SERVICES CAPITAL WORKS

ATHENRY WASTEWATER NETWORK UPDATE

Coffey Construction commenced works in January 2023 and the contract is expected to be completed in Q3 2024. To date, approx. 80% of the network has been completed.

The works consist of:

- Approx. 3.9km of gravity sewer, which includes for 3 no. railway crossings and 4 no. river crossings.
- Decommissioning of the existing Caheroyn PS.
- New pumping station at Pairc na hAbhainn.
- Approx. 460m of rising main.



SPIDDAL WWTP

The new Spiddal WWTP has been fully commissioned and results to date have shown that the plant is operating and providing an effluent well within its emission limit values. Spiddal is one of the 39 priority areas identified by the EPA where Uisce Éireann must progress new treatment to prevent wastewater discharges negatively impacting bathing water quality. The plant is 1,000 P.E design capacity, providing secondary treatment via rotating biological contractor.

There are subtractors on site today finishing up tarmacking and the landscapers are tidying the green areas. Seeding of green areas will take place in March/April next year. The 12-month contractor (Coffey) operate phase has commenced.

AHASCRAGH

Flows have been diverted to the new WWTP since 27th October. A rising main from the Bridge Court estate is to be diverted to the new terminal pumping station this week and full flow will then be diverted to the new pumping station. There are some remedial works to be carried out on the Primary and Final Settlement Tanks, and it is envisaged that this will be completed before Christmas. The process proving period will then progress and be completed in January 2024. In the meantime, the effluent quality will be monitored, however.

The new plant at Ahascragh is 470 P.E. capacity and provides secondary treatment via rotating biological contractor.

KILRICKLE GWS UPDATE

- 81% of the pipework & 71% of valves and fittings have been installed.
- Pressure reducing valves will be installed in the coming weeks which will permit delivery of
 water to the area closest to the connection point. A supply of water to Kilrickle village is
 expected in early Q1, 2024. Drinking water will be progressively supplied into all of the
 currently installed mains network.
- The contractor is applying for a road opening licence for the N65 in Kilcooley and Boston areas, a separate road opening licence will be sought for the remaining local roads in Kilmeen and Kilcooley. This section of mains will complete the mains laying and will include the replacement of the entire Kilcooley network.
- The contractor is on target to complete the project by the end of March 2024.

HEALTH AND SAFETY UPDATE 2023

HEALTH & SAFETY SEMINAR



A health & safety seminar with the theme of 'Ownership of Safety' integrated throughout, was delivered to GCC employees who are in management/project supervisory roles in late October. It was held in the Raheen Woods hotel in Athenry and was attended by over 90 employees from a variety of sections including Roads, Rural Water, Environment, Corporate Services, ERCD & Housing. Speakers included the H&S section who reminded staff of the safety management system and how to

assess competency when outsourcing work including an overview of the competency assessment system. GCC's Criminal Defense Legal Advisor, Michael Lannigan and Ivor Heavy from IPB gave an overview of 'How to manage a Serious Incident' and remined staff of GCC's procedures for dealing with such an event. The keynote item of the day was an interactive drama by a theatre company called Theatre at Work that explored leadership styles, team dynamics & empowerment, system failure & psychological safety.

All speakers were received well, and the day was thoroughly enjoyed by all, while key health & safety messages were communicated to all.



HEALTH SCREENING

GCC launched the health screening programme in November. As part of GCC's commitment to promote and encourage good health for all employees and elected members, GCC are once again offering **free** and **confidential** health & lifestyle screening for all. This service will be provided by Medmark Occupational Healthcare. All employees/elected members are encouraged to avail of the programme. The health screening is made up of a combination of measurements, blood tests and questionnaires which provide a valuable overview of one's current health status. The health screening will take place in various locations across the county in late November, early December and early January.

NRPO UPDATE 2023

N6 GALWAY CITY RING ROAD

An Bord Pleanála have assigned new case numbers to the development consent and compulsory acquisition applications and have updated the status of the applications to "re-activated". Work is ongoing on Ecological and Traffic assessments in anticipation of a Request for Further Information from the Board.

N59 MOYCULLEN BYPASS

The N59 Moycullen Bypass mainline is complete with works on ancillary roads and testing ongoing. Substantial completion and the opening of the mainline is due in December.

N83 CLAREGALWAY

The advanced works Archaeology contract commenced in August 2023 and were completed this month with the construction of the drainage attenuation pond now to commence.

ACTIVE TRAVEL PROGRAMME - ACTIVE TRAVEL FOOTPATH AND INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

ACTIVE TRAVEL MONTHLY MANAGEMENT UPDATE OCTOBER 2023

The National Transport Authority (NTA) Active Travel Investment Team recently provided funding to Galway County Council's Roads and Operations Section to design and build a 200m section of new footpath and install public lighting on the Tismeáin Rd, An Cheathrú Rua. This new footpath connects the Fire Station, Údarás na Gaeltachta Enterprise Estate, a creche, a playground and the GAA sports grounds to the village. In July 2023, this project was successfully completed and huge thanks and credit to the GCC Roads Area Office team in Carraroe for their work. Padraig Folan Civil Engineering Ltd completed the civil works and Electric Skyline installed the public lighting. This project has enhanced the safety of pedestrians traveling to and from these amenities.



The Tender Assessment process has successfully reached its completion, resulting in the tender being awarded to PMCE Ltd.

FIRE & EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The information below is based on October data from West Regional Control Centre (WRCC). Galway Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS) had 188 turnouts to 157 Incidents. That is an increase of 49 incidents on 118 the previous month. 67 were fire incidents, 84 were special service incidents (road traffic collision (RTC), Automatic Fire Alarms (AFA's), flooding, storm damage, etc.) and 6 were standby in station. Of those incidents, 42.95% were attended by Fire Service resources within 10 minutes of alert, 40.94% were attended between 10 and 20 minutes and 16.11% were attended in over 20 minutes. The average turnout time for the Full time station in Galway City was 2.14 minutes and for county retained stations was 5.42 minutes.



STORM DEBI

During storm Debi GFRS responded to 10 incidents across the City and County and rescued 8 members of the public from RTC's, properties and stranded vehicles. Senior officers from GFRS participated in the Galway County Council Severe Weather Assessment Team (SWAT) meetings on the Sunday afternoon and Monday morning and the Galway City Council Local Co-ordination Group meetings on Monday morning and afternoon. GFRS provided a very effective response to Storm Debi.

MAJOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The West Region Major Emergency Management Working Group (WRMEMWG) conducted a training course for Media Liaison Officers in the event of a major emergency on the 9th November and for Controllers of Operations on the 10th November. Those training courses were each attended by 2 staff members from Galway County Council along with members of staff from the other Principal Response Agencies (PRA's) in the West Region. Galway County Council holds Major Emergency Committee meetings on a bi-monthly basis. The last meeting was held on the 26th October. There were no West Region MEM Working Group of Steering Group meetings held in November.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

ATHENRY FIRE STATION

Construction of the New Fire Station in Athenry is well underway with the project approximately 70% complete. It is expected that the building will be full enclosed by the end of November.

The proposal for the new fire station in Loughrea is currently going through the Part 8 Planning process.

FIRE APPLIANCE PROCUREMENT PROGRAMME 2023 - 2025

On 19th October Minister Darragh O'Brien announced the new allocation of Class B fire appliances for local authority fire services. GFRS has been allocated 2 new fire appliances under the programme. The Galway appliances are 4th and 5th on the manufacture schedule of Emergency One, Scotland (the supplier that supplied our most recent new appliance in 2023). It is expected that the new appliances will be on the ground in Galway in Q4 2024 or Q1 2025.

GREEN FOR BUSINESS & ENERGY EFFICIENCY GRANT

Green for Business is a FREE programme that helps small businesses take the first step towards becoming more sustainable, giving small businesses access to a green consultant to develop a 'greener' policy, which can offer many benefits to a business, including:

- Increased cost savings
- Improved resource efficiency (for example: using less energy, water, and materials)
- Reduced environmental footprint and greenhouse gas emissions
- Opportunities for higher and additional value on products and services
- Increased access to customers, improved corporate image and reputation.
- Increased resilience to climate change impacts

Businesses can sign up for the Green for Business programme via the LEO Galway website.

The Energy Efficient Grant is a new support delivered by LEO Galway which will enable small businesses to invest in technologies and equipment to make their businesses more energy efficient. The grant will be available to companies who, through participation in the Green for Micro, GreenStart or SEAI Energy Audit programmes, have identified the technology and equipment need & benefits. The grant will cover up to 50% of the costs to a maximum amount of €5,000. The scheme will reduce the impact of small businesses on the environment and may help them to reduce costs over time to enable them to become more competitive.

There were 10 Energy Efficiency Grants approved to date nationally with the first one approved in Galway at the end of September for EUR5,000.





CLIFDEN

Clifden Sustainably Sourced Timber Pilot Project: Cities4Forests in conjunction with Letterfrack ATU Connemara and Galway County Council.

Cities4Forests sourced the sustainably grown and harvested exotic hardwoods in central America and shipped these to Letterfrack. The GCC Regeneration Team identified 4 sites across Clifden (with due consideration given to the Public Realm Enhancement Project) which will accommodate the bespoke furniture designs. Twenty students submitted Stage 1 concept designs which will be developed further with input from the GCC Regeneration Team.







PORTUMNA COURTHOUSE

Tenders for the construction phase of the project have now been evaluated and it is anticipated the contractors for construction will be appointed in Q1 of 2024.

The Regeneration Team alongside Coillte held a public engagement evening in the Irish Workhouse Centre on Tuesday, October 24th, the evening was very well attended by the local community and the overall response to GCC's proposals for the public realm were very positive. The public consultation closes on the 21st of November, with 10 formal submissions received to date. GORT

The Town Regeneration Officer (TRO) has been working closely with the Gort Town Team finalising the content of the pilot Town Centre First (TCF) plan for Gort. The plan is now completed with an expectation to have a formal launch of the final plan in December. The plan has outlined 12 key themes, each theme having approximately 2 projects identified as short-, medium- or long-term proposals. The TRO has assisted in preparing the first funding application since the completion of the TCF plan, which is a TVRS application for streetscape enhancement for Gort.



The public realm project is in its final stages of detailed design in preparation for the submission of a planning application, environmental screenings of the project are currently being undertaken.



TUAM

The Regeneration team is preparing for the funding call for a Category 1 application under the RRDF. A call for applications was announced on 10th November, with a closing date for Cat1 applications of the 8th February 2024. The team are working towards resubmitting an application for the Tuam Town Hall which already has part VIII planning in place.



URDF

GCC Has secured €2,000,000.00 in funding for Tuam, Ballinasloe and Oranmore under the URDF. The award represents a rolling fund which will be used to purchase and bring to the market identified vacant and derelict properties across these settlements. A team is being assembled to manage the fund and work on reducing vacancy and dereliction in our towns and villages.

HERITAGE OFFICE

GALWAY AUDIT OF ORAL HERITAGE COLLECTIONS (EAST GALWAY)

The overall aim of the Audit of Oral Heritage Recordings in the Municipal Districts of Ballinasloe, Loughrea, Athenry/Oranmore and Tuam was to identify, locate and list oral heritage recordings and/or collections on East Galway topics, people, or places.

Across May to November 2023, Mac Conmara Heritage Consulting (MHC), identified and documented a total of 1035 recording items of both long and short form interviews within or relating to the East Galway Municipal Districts. These relate to thirty-four collections of oral heritage, with twenty-seven holding institutions or collection holders. Ten of the collections (27%) were generated by local heritage groups, or for the purpose of local history research/ documentation, within a community context. Eleven (30%) of the holding institutions are defined for this project as 'regional' and include both Galway County Council as well as University of Galway. National institutions, like the National Folklore Collection, Military Archives of Ireland, and National Museum of Northern Ireland (Ulster Folk Museum), account for six of the collections (16%) and contain 276 recording items, which amounts to 26% of recordings identified across the audit.

The Audit has resulted in the creation of a comprehensive digital database, reflecting the scope, content and detail of oral heritage collected in and relating to Eat Galway over the last century. It is clear from the findings that much of the local material identified, may not have been documented according to what may be technical agreed as the standards of oral history. Approximately 73% of items listed were not generated with an associated consent or clearance form. However, it is evident that most of the material generated relating to east Galway, was done so in good faith and that, as sound recordings of memory, have a profound importance for historical information and cultural understanding in the area. While many of the interviews are woven into publications and community group websites, approximately 40% of the recordings themselves are not always accessible to researchers.

Across such a range and time span of collecting, it is not surprising that a broad landscape of memory is enfolded within identified collections. Common to many collections are themes of local history, tradition, historical figures and episodes in east Galway, rural life, farming, the fair and electrification. Hurling, pastimes, folklore, storytelling, the Easter Rising of 1916, Irish War of Independence and Civil War as well as World War I, fieldnames, tracing, work life and ghost stories are also recurrent subjects. Given the positive response at public events and in consultation with holding institutions and collectors, it is evident that appreciation of the significance of East Galway's oral heritage collections is remarkably high. The desire to continue collecting and to upskill and receive training was noted within almost all local collection holders who participated in the audit.





THE AUDIT OF THE HOLY WELLS OF THE COUNTY OF GALWAY



CLOONCREE TOBAR CEANNACH

The Audit of the Holy Wells of the County of Galway is being undertaken in a series of phases. Phase 4 was completed in 2023 when the holy wells of the North Connemara area were recorded using the specially designed 'Galway Holy Wells Survey 123 App'. The aim of the Audit of the Holy Wells of the County of Galway is to collect and collate information which may be in danger of being lost due to a largely, older generational knowledge base and development pressures, including land clearance. The data being collected through the County-wide audit of each holy well includes location, infrastructure,



physical condition, access, protection status, ownership, archaeology, biodiversity, traditions, folklore, oral heritage, and customs associated with and connected to the holy wells. This information will be used to develop high quality promotional resources for this aspect of the County's Heritage in the longer term. All data collected on each well is entered onto The 'Galway Holy Wells Survey 123 App'. This allows for the uploading of written description, location co-ordinates and up to 20 photographs during field survey. This information is then added to through community consultation and published sources of information. The collected data for each well is then uploaded to the Audit of Galway Holy Wells web platform hosted by Galway County Council. General and specific reports can now be generated from the stored data, including text and photographs, through Galway County Council's map based GIS.

FIELD RESEARCH OUTPUTS

Written descriptions and photographic details for 35 holy wells were collected and uploaded to the Galway Holy Wells Survey 123 web-based platform during the 2023 audit period, bringing the total number of wells recorded to 167 to date.

During the development stage of the 'Galway Holy Wells Digital App' the primary aim was that the data collection, storage and dissemination approach used for all future phases of the Audit would be future proofed in terms of: \cdot its potential to be developed as a Citizen Science data collection tool for local communities \cdot its potential adaptation for other similar heritage initiatives data collection \cdot the dissemination of heritage information through the Galway County Council GIS structure \cdot and its transferability for use in other Counties through the Heritage Council's Heritage Officer programme.

The app has proved to be an invaluable field data collection tool. It's easy to use format provides a potential template for data collection for other heritage initiatives. It is readily transferable for use in other County Holy wells Audits.

The planned positioning of Phase V of the Audit in South Connemara and the offshore Islands, in 2024 will complete the Audit for the entire County.



GALWAY COMMUNITY ARCHAEOLOGY PROJECT

Galway Community Archaeology Project is funded by the Heritage Council and Galway County Council and is managed by the Heritage Office of Galway County Council. The Community Archaeologist, Bernadette Doherty provides support and advice to individuals, schools, organisations and groups. We have produced a variety projects and online events to promote greater awareness and appreciation of our archaeological heritage.

This year the Community Archaeologist contributed to a number of conferences, seminars and local heritage lectures. She dealt with numerous emails or phone calls from individuals and group representatives seeking advice or help in relation to archaeology or archaeological related matters and topics. She works with schools, community groups, societies, farmers and other individuals on an ongoing basis. She played a major role in assisting community groups apply for the Community Monument Fund and Heritage Council Community Grants, as well as promoting Heritage in schools, Heritage Keepers and Adopt a Monument Scheme.

ARCHITECTURAL CONSERVATION OFFICE

BUILT HERITAGE INVESTMENT SCHEME 2024

The Scheme is designed to assist the owner or occupier of a Protected Structure, or structures that contribute to the character of an Architectural Conservation Area (ACA) to undertake necessary works to secure the conservation of the structure or part of the structure, i.e. works necessary to extend the life of the structure. The scheme is not intended to assist in carrying out routine maintenance, alterations, or improvements.

The aim of the Built Heritage Investment Scheme is to assist with the repair and conservation of structures that are protected under the Planning and Development Acts.

It is also designed to leverage private capital for investment in a significant number of small-scale, labour-intensive conservation projects throughout the country and to support the employment of conservation professionals, craftspeople, and tradespersons in the repair of the historic built environment.

An application for a structure can be made under the BHIS and the HSF, but only one grant from either the HSF or the BHIS can be availed of per structure.

- a) projects proposed by local authorities on foot of applications from **private applicants who are the owners or custodians of historic structures**
- b) projects proposed by a Local Authority for works to **historic structures in public ownership**, where a clear heritage focus, and community or public benefit has been demonstrated

Stream 1 will offer grants **from €15,000** up to €50,000 and is aimed at essential repairs and smaller capital works for the refurbishment and conservation of heritage structures.

Stream 1, Historic Shopfronts sub-stream – To incentivise the conservation of historic shopfronts, eligible essential repairs and small capital works for the refurbishment and conservation of historic shop facades, windows, signage, and other associated details to safeguard them and keep them in use. Also, an additional application for Irish-language shopfronts.

Stream 2 will offer a small number of grants from €50,000 up to €200,000 for larger enhancement, refurbishment or reuse projects involving heritage structures, where:



a. A clear community or public benefit has been demonstrated, or

b. A clear residential benefit has been demonstrated (such projects must be advanced through the planning process as necessary)

Vernacular Structures Stream — In the context of A Living Tradition: A Strategy to Enhance the Understanding, Minding and Handing on of Our Built Vernacular Heritage (2021 to support conservation repairs and small capital works to vernacular structures that are not listed in local authority Records of Protected Structures or otherwise legally protected. Such structures may be located within an Architectural Conservation Area.; between €5,000 and €10,000 for eligible projects.

As communities around Ireland face challenges like vacancy, dereliction, traffic management and depopulation, the **Irish Architecture Foundation (IAF)** is calling for local architects and community stakeholders to propose collaborative projects to regenerate their town or village centre.

The project proposals are being called for under a new round of the Hometown Architect initiative that has opened for applications today (09.11.23). **Hometown Architect** is a key initiative of the IAF's **Reimagine** placemaking programme.

This is the second round of Hometown Architect, whose focus is supporting small and medium towns outside of major urban centres. Three projects will be selected for development funding of €10,000 each plus mentoring and practical support from the IAF's experienced placemaking team.

Project proposals for Hometown Architect 2024 must be made jointly by community stakeholders and an architect with a local connection. Proposals should focus on issues of particular concern, opportunities or innovations for town centre regeneration in line with the Government of Ireland's **Town Centre First Policy**. This policy aims to make town centres across Ireland viable, vibrant and attractive locations for people to live, work and visit.

Submissions will be assessed by a panel of experts, including the IAF team, Town Centre First Policy specialists and independent experts.

Hometown Architect 2024 builds on the success of the 2023 round of Hometown Architect, which is supporting **projects** in Aughrim, Co Wicklow; Belmullet, Co Mayo; Lisdoonvarna, Co Clare; Tipperary town; and **Tuam, Co Galway**. Hometown Architect is a catalyst for active citizenship in the built environment, encouraging creative connections between community groups and architecture professionals to deliver ground-up implementation of the national Town Centre First Policy.



The Environment Section of Galway County Council invited all Tidy Towns groups registered with the PPN to take part in a survey of the "Tidiness and Litter Control" and the "Sustainability - Doing More with Less" sections of the Tidy Towns competition in Co. Galway. This was an opportunity to highlight any issues the Tidy Towns group may have come across in their community in delivering these sections.



4 Tidy Towns groups returned the survey following an extension of the deadline. The environment section will be reviewing the surveys from these 3 communities and working with them in relation to their issues and queries.

BURIAL GROUNDS

BURIAL GROUND DEVELOPMENTS

The Environment Section has supported 170 burial ground maintenance committees throughout the county. In 2023, we allocated approximately €130,000, an increase of €30,000 from 2022. Previously, the grants allocated were 3 tiers - €300, €450 and €600. However, in 2023, we introduced 6 tiers - €200, €300, €450, €600, €900 and €1400 to cater for the increase in the maintenance costs and to acknowledge all the works that the committees do throughout the year. The grants cater for our small, closed burial grounds and our larger burial grounds and it is a credit to the committees for the fantastic work that they do. We will continue to work in partnership with the committees in 2024.

SEPTIC TANK INSPECTIONS

Planning commenced for National Inspection Plan (NIP) inspections of domestic wastewater treatment systems in the Clarinbridge area. This area is a priority area for action in the 3rd cycle river basin management plan. There are 3 different risk zones with inspections in Zone 1 (Environment) and Zone 2 (Human Health) being prioritized in this case. Figure 1 below is an example of the mapping used to locate properties for inspections. The inspections planned will be undertaken in November and December 2023.

DRINKING WATER

A Boil Water Notice was issued on the Kinvara Public Water Supply on the 9th of October 2023 and is still in place. The BWN was put in place after it came to the attention of UÉ that the Kinvara Public Water Supply was at risk due to mechanical issues experienced at the water treatment works. Following advice from the Health Service Executive, Uisce Eireann issued a Boil Water Notice to protect consumers in the Kinvara area affecting approximately 2162 consumers.

PROSECUTIONS UNDER WATER POLLUTION ACT

BALLINASLOE DISTRICT COURT



A case taken for prosecution non-compliance with a Section 12 Notice issued under the Water Pollution Act was to be heard in **Ballinasloe District** Court in October. As a result of negotiations at the court it was agreed that the requested work

would be done within a new timeframe which will deal with the source of pollution. A further Section 12 Notice will also be issued which encompasses all measures necessary. A further hearing date was set for December in Loughrea District Court.



WASTE MANAGEMENT AND ENFORCEMENT



Staff attended the quarterly Waste Enforcement Officer meeting of the Connaught Ulster WERLA.

Items on the agenda included the NEMIS complaints management system, Household waste collection, PTUs (pay to use), Commercial waste collection, CCTV and the Code of Practices, Waste data flows and Reverse Register for household waste collection.

CCTV UPDATE

The revised Codes of Practise for use of CCTV are now going through a final legal review before they are to be sent to the CCMA CATCEN Committee and the Board of the LGMA for approval. Once the Board of the LGMA has signed off on the CoP's, they will then be submitted to the Minister of Environment, Climate and Communications for approval.

WASTE DATA VALIDATIONS

The validation of data submitted by permitted waste collectors and facilities for waste movement during 2022 was completed in early October. The remaining waste facility permit sites, authorised treatment facilities and certificate of registration sites were also inspected.

WASTE MANAGEMENT NOTICES ISSUED

Two Section 55 Notices were issued in October. Both files related to the unauthorised storage of Endof-Life vehicles without authorisation by way of a waste facility permit. Both Notices issued require the operators to remove the waste ELV's to authorised facilities for proper disposal to prevent or limit environmental pollution within the given timeframe.

- Declaration of Roads to be Public Roads Section 11 Roads Act 1993 and Schedule 14A of Local Government Act 2001: Treanrevagh, House No 1 to 11 commencing at Point A at its junction with the N63- 336 and extending in an Easterly direction for a distance of approximately 70m to a point adjacent to Treanrevagh House No 1, then in a southerly direction for a distance of approximately 58 meters to a point adjacent to Treanrevagh House No 7 and then in a South Easterly direction for a distance of approximately 21 meters to a point adjacent to Treanrevagh House No 5 for a total distance of 151m (all in the Townland of Treanrevagh).

AN exhibition charting the development of Tuam's Twinning with Straubing has gone on display in the town this

Photographs and documents from the signing of the Twinning Charter in the Synod Hall in September 1991 form the centrepiece of the display that is located on the first floor of the council building.




HEADFORD NEWS

The TII funded Galway County Council to carry out a full overlay on a 300m section of carriageway on the N83 between Tuam and Claregalway. This is a busy NS route with approx 10000 AADT. A number of defects had been recorded on this section and patch repairs have been carried out previously. The existing surfacing was circa 10-15 years old. Some defects were previously repaired but are likely to deteriorate quickly again. These areas needed improvement to prolong the life of the pavement. Due to the porous nature of the pavement this material would deteriorate quickly under bad weather events. Roadstone Ltd carried out a full overlay on the N83 in early November.
