

# Lady Gregory and The Autograph Tree



PAGE 8 | GALWAY HISTORY

Just beyond the red gates of the Walled Garden at Coole Park stands a 200-year-old beech tree. The wind blows through the branches, animating the leaves. The canopy of the tree bends down and encloses visitors underneath, ushering them into this sacred tent of story and reflection. Etched on the soft bark of the magnificent copper beech are over a dozen signatures; some from artists and political figures, others from prominent Irish literary giants.

William Butler Yeats, John Millington Synge, Sean O'Casey and George Bernard Shaw are only a few of the house guests invited by Lady Gregory of Coole to carve their signatures into the trunk of the tree. A living guestbook of sorts, the tree has an incredible history that is deeply rooted in the story of Coole Park, as well as Lady Gregory herself.

An adamant and longtime patron of the arts, Lady Gregory was enamoured by the Irish Literary Revival of the early 20th century. Lady Gregory and a young W.B. Yeats met in the 1800s and later became lifelong friends and collaborators in the Irish literary community. Lady Gregory was an early supporter of Yeats. The two, along with others, co-founded the Abbey Theatre in an effort to write, produce, and perform plays for and about Irish people. Yeats was a regular guest at Coole House, drawing immense inspiration from the serene landscape.

# GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL'S TOURISM PROMOTION INITIATIVES IN THE GERMAN AND ITALIAN MARKETS

Galway County Council is actively working to expand its tourism reach into the German and Italian markets in collaboration with Tourism Ireland and the marketing team at Ireland West Airport. The objective is to leverage direct flight connectivity and targeted trade fairs to promote Galway as a premier tourism destination and increase inbound travel through Ireland West Airport.

Galway County Council has partnered with Tourism Ireland and other regional authorities, including Donegal, Sligo, Leitrim, Roscommon, and Mayo, to enhance tourism marketing efforts in Germany and Italy. This initiative is crucial to support Ryanair flights and foster stronger connectivity to the region.

# **TOURISM EVENTS IN 2024**

In 2024, Galway County Council participated in major tourism events in Milan, Italy, and Cologne, Germany. The objective was to present Galway as a compelling destination for German and Italian tourists, two markets that are ranked as Ireland's 3rd and 6th largest tourism sources, respectively.

- Milan Event (10th-11th June 2024):
- Attended by 50 travel agencies
- Focus on networking & showcasing Galway's unique tourism offerings
- Cologne Event (12th-13th June 2024):
- Similar format with targeted sessions for travel agencies & tourism partners



Galway County Council facilitated the participation of key tourism businesses from the region in the trade fairs, providing a platform for these stakeholders to directly engage with international travel agencies and potential partners. This support aligns with the strategic objective of building long-term tourism partnerships and increasing tourist inflow.

PROPOSED TRADE FAIR INITIATIVE \_ 2025 ===

During a recent meeting at Ireland West Airport, which included representatives from Galway, Donegal, Sligo, Leitrim, Roscommon, and Mayo, a proposal was made to conduct a trade fair to two new destinations serviced by the airport. This initiative, in partnership with Tourism Ireland, mirrors a successful event held in 2024 and represents a vital opportunity to solidify Galway's presence in key international markets.





Twenty-seven beaches in County Galway will be monitored during the upcoming bathing season which runs from 1st June to the 15th of September. 95% of bathing waters sampled during 2024 had excellent water quality.

Galway County Council have applied to An Taisce for Eight beaches for the Prestigious Blue Flag award and six beaches for the Green Coast Award for the 2025 Bathing season. A National Awards Ceremony will be held in May 2025 where all awarded bathing areas will be announced prior to the commencement of the 2025 bathing Season.

Blue flags are awarded to bathing areas that meet excellent water quality standards and provide various information provisions and amenities, including lifeguards and toilet facilities.

The award is for beaches which have excellent water quality, but which are also prized for their unspoilt environment. natural, Applicant sites must be managed in partnership with the local community to be considered for the Green Coast Award.

# LIFEGUARD SERVICE

Galway County Council operates a shared lifeguard service for both Galway County Council and Galway City Council during the bathing season.

A lifeguard service will operate during the summer months, lifeguard hours are **11am - 7pm**, times are subject to change depending on availability of lifeguards and resources at the following locations:

  (Parking, Permanent Toilets & Showers)
- Portuma
  (Parking, Permanent Toilets & Showers)
- Inis Oírr(No Parking, Permanent Toilets)
- Inis Mór
  (No Parking, Permanent Toilets)
- Gurteen Roundstone
  (Weekends Only, Limited Parking & Portaloos)
- Trá na mBan, An Spidéal (Weekends Only, Public Toilet in Village, Parking)





These beaches will operate as follows during the bathing season.

- For the month of June, the locations mentioned to the right will have a Lifeguard Service on weekends only (bank holidays included) from 11am until 7pm.
- These locations will then convert to a daily service for July and August with Lifeguards on duty from 11am until 7pm, except Gurteen and Spiddal Road, weekends only.
- A weekend service will commence for all areas for the 1st and 2nd weekend in September.

### **Galway City Beaches**

Galway City Beaches have a daily service for July and August with Lifeguards on duty from 11am until 7pm. There are four designated beaches in the Galway City area:

Obvious Dangers

Plan your escape

Outdoor activities are often a great way to spend your leisure time, but they have their own risks. It's easy to get distracted while cooking. These simple precautions will reduce the risks:

- Never BBQ on a balcony
- Make sure your barbecue is in good working order
- Ensure the barbecue is on a flat site, away from the house/apartment, trees or shrubs
- Keep children, garden games and pets away from the cooking area
- Never leave the barbecue unattended
- Keep a bucket of sand or a suitable extinguisher nearby for emergencies
- Never barbecue in parks, wildland areas or any site near vegetation, trees etc.
- Ensure the barbecue is cool before attempting to move it
- Gas cylinders should be used in accordance with manufacturer's instructions

They are all preventable and take up valuable resources which may not be available for other more serious incidents. Wildland fires also threaten homes. #### Wildfire Information for Farmers & Landowners

- It is illegal to burn on open ground for the control of growing vegetation between February 28th and September 1st.
- Farmers and landowners in breach risk prosecution and or penalties under the Dept. of Agriculture's support payments for farmers (Single Farm Payment, AEOS, REPS, Disadvantaged Area Scheme).
- Galway County Council will impose a charge on the owners or the beneficial occupiers of the land or property in relation to the attendance of the Fire Service.

#### Wildfire Information for the Public

- Avoid lighting fires outdoors when there are high winds or high temperatures
- Do not discard cigarette ends make sure they are extinguished completely
- Report anyone acting irresponsibly or carelessly with fire in the countryside.

#### Please Remember!

Wildfires are a serious drain on Fire Service resources. Fire crews may be delayed in attending life threatening house fires or road traffic collisions when fighting wildfires.

## **Palace Grounds**

Green Flag status had been retained in April 2025 for the Palace Grounds in Tuam from 'an Taisce'. Galway County Council were also successful in our application for 'Green Heritage Site Accreditation', a first for Galway County Council, this is awarded to public green spaces of historical and cultural significance.

Sensory Garden – the works in the Sensory Garden have recommenced. It's envisaged that the Sensory Garden will be opened in late June, and an official opening will take place Dog Park – works will recommence in the coming month once conditions improve. It is envisaged that the dog park will be opened in May, and an official opening will take place. Sports grant Galway County Council has secured funding from the Participation Nation Outdoor.

Fund for the installation of permanent sports equipment in the park. The Palace Grounds in Tuam has received funding for the installation of a 3v3 Basketball Court. Works for this installation will take place in the coming month.



# **R332 Kilbannon Scheme**

- R332 Kilbannon Department of Transport has given approval to proceed to Tender
- The scheme has been tendered and had a closing date in in early March.
- All tender documents have been assessed by Galway County Council and a winning contractor has been identified.
- Further sanction will be required from the Department of Transport in due course and all land compensation must be processed before any construction works commence.

# Marina, Portumna

Facilities are available year-round to users of the facility.

All bathing area Public Toilets have been fully reopened since Friday the 31st of May. Signage is in place to indicate to the public the opening times at all three locations i.e. Traught Beach, The Long Point, Loughrea and the Swimming Area, Portumna.

# **Traught Beach**

A seasonal caretaker is in position and will monitor and address any issues as required. Designated parking, toilets, picnic benches and cycle parking facilities are available. The Tawnagh Causeway which forms part of the access road to Traught Beach was badly damaged by Storm Debi. Restoration works will shortly be underway with a specialist conservation contractor currently being appointed.

# Swimming Area, Portumna

This location is maintained by a combination of a shared permanent caretaker and outdoor staff who will continue to monitor and address any issues as they arise. Designated parking, picnic benches and cycle parking racks are available.



# **Long Point**

This area is monitored and maintained by the Loughrea Town Gardener. When absent, alternative arrangements are made in combination with our outdoor staff. The toilet and shower facility are open throughout the day, and the location is also additionally monitored from a litter collection perspective each weekend. There are no obvious parking issues most times, except those all too rare periods of particularly good and prolonged weather. Solar powered compacting bins, cycle racks, a water dispenser and disabled friendly picnic benches are available. Additional seating and lake access ladders have been installed recently.



Summer is rapidly approaching and in the **Conamara Municipal District**, we are preparing for the arrival of visitors to the area.

In line with last summer, we are again rolling out an increased level of services to our beaches. This will include the provision of toilets and/or refuse bins at several of our most-visited beaches from 31st May 2025 as follows:

We are again expecting a flurry of outdoor leisure and sporting activities on land as well as at sea, such as wind surfing, cycling, boating, hill walking, paddle boarding, to name but a few.

Above photograph of **Céibh Nua, An Spidéal** where the local area office in conjunction with the Environment Section and Corporate Services (Water Safety Section) have been busy delivering improved facilities for universal access to the beach and to the temporary toilets that will be installed during the summer months.

Works comprised a new slipway to the beach for wheelchair users, footpaths to and from the lifeguard hut (where the beach wheelchair will be kept and made available to members of the public), new picnic benches and a clean-up of obsolete signage and poles. A new water connection has been provided for a public shower which will shortly be installed near the lifeguard hut. It is hoped that these works will strengthen the case for a successful application for Blue Flag beach status at this location.

Over the summer, Galway County Council carries out grass cutting of parks, public spaces, road verges, green areas in housing estates, (1st cut mid-March, last cut early October) while supporting nature and pollinators by leaving some designated area uncut.

In Laurencetown, the council's own Community Employment Scheme maintains the village with litter picking and grass cutting.

Galway County Council uses a mechanical brusher to remove weeds and vegetation on Ballinasloe Town's Streets as an environmentally friendly alternative to the use of pesticides.

Seven existing Disabled Parking facilities in Ballinasloe Town have been painted blue to highlight them on Dunlo Street, Society Street and Main Street.



The Fair Green in Ballinasloe hosted the Cyclocross National Series event in January 2025, hosted by Ballinasloe Cycling Club.





The 3rd phase of new footpaths is being constructed at Beechlawn which creates a new safe and accessible walking loop around the southern side of Ballinasloe Town, under NTA Active Travel funding. Elsewhere, footpath replacement upgrades have been undertaken on Bridge Street and Marina Carparks.

Recently, new **Bus Stop** facilities have been installed at Moylough, Mountbellew and Ballymoe.

# HIGH SPEED BROADBAND CONNECTION

### **Broadband Connection Points (BCPs)**

Under the National Broadband Plan, Broadband Connection Points (BCPs) serve as public locations offering High-speed connectivity. They were some of the first locations in the state to receive High speed broadband under the state intervention contract. The set up of BCP's is considered by the government as a long-term investment, which will help rural communities to fulfil their full potential. It is part of the 'Connected Communities Initiative' between the Government, NBI and Vodafone.

Currently, there are 21 live BCPs across the county, including the islands of Inishbofin, Inis Mór, Inis Meain, and Inis Oír. Some of these chosen BCPs are strategically placed in tourism destinations, such as the Portumna Irish Workhouse Centre Famine Museum.

Each BCP provides free external Wi-Fi access to the public, with several locations also offering excellent facilities for remote work, study, digital skill training, and promotion of arts and culture.

BCPs play a vital role in supporting their communities by emphasising digital inclusion, digital skills, community engagement, and various activities. Additionally, they offer a social space for in-person connections among community members, contributing to overall health and well-being. Access to these resources expands choices and opportunities for community members. Galway County Council leverages the PPN network to promote BCPs.

# BATTLE OF AUGHRIM VISITOR CENTRE

The award-winning Battle of Aughrim Visitor Centre in Aughrim, Co. Galway, commemorates the Battle of Aughrim, 'Ireland's Gettysburg', fought on 12th July 1691, during the closing stages of the Williamite-Jacobite War.

Experience the Battle of Aughrim Visitor Centre and learn of the fascinating story behind the epic battle between William of Orange, James II, and Louis XIV, where 35,000 soldiers took to the battlefield and helped shape European history.

The interpretive visitor centre has incredibly detailed displays giving great insights into each of the three kings and their armies. Relive the battle through intricate illustrations and large-scale models showing the various stages of the day. See what it was like for soldiers at the time thanks to the amazing 'Dalton's Letter' film and historical re-enactments.



After your self-guided tour, take a walk along the Historical Trail or the Battlefield Trail. The Battle of Aughrim Visitor Centre is open seasonally from May to September each year.

Since 2006, the **Athenry Heritage Centre** in partnership with Galway County Council has curated Athenry's Walled Towns Day.

This one-day festival provides a programme of events which displays the Anglo-Norman influences in the medieval town of Athenry. The event is held in the Community Park, Athenry Castle, the Heritage Centre and the Community Hall.

Athenry Walled Towns Day is designed to be inclusive, accessible, fun and free for all to attend. The programme reflects the medieval history of Athenry, and the event is a platform for local craft and artisan food producers to showcase their products.

The displays range from falconry, arts & crafts, have a go archery, battle reenactments, displays of weaponry, children's craft workshops, medieval music, storytelling, and puppet shows.

Athenry Castle is used for various lectures, children's craft workshops and music displays in the Great Hall. The event is usually held at the beginning of Heritage Week which is the last week of August and attracts up to 5000 people on the day.

The event is one of many Walled Towns Days held throughout Ireland and is supported by the Heritage Council and Galway County Council.




