





## LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTORAL REGISTRATION SYSTEM

The LGERS project is an initiative led by the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage to create a centralised, modernised electoral registration system for Ireland.

Ireland's electoral registers have historically been maintained separately by each local authority, leading to inconsistencies and inaccuracies. **Voter.ie** will become the new national registration system and is due to come into effect by the end of 2026 replacing the current checktheregister.ie.

## **OBJECTIVE**

The project aims to improve the accuracy, accessibility, and efficiency of Ireland's electoral register, addressing longstanding issues such as duplicate entries, redundant records (e.g., deceased individuals or electors who have moved away), and fragmented data management across local authorities ensuring a more reliable foundation for democratic processes.

#### LEGAL FRAMEWORK

The project aligns with the Electoral Reform Act 2022, which provides the legal basis for modernising the electoral process, including voter registration.

### **KEY FEATURES**

- Centralised System LGERS will transition local authorities to a shared national electoral registration system by the end of 2026, replacing separate local databases.
   This will streamline voter registration and updates.
- Identity Verification A significant feature is the use of Personal Public Service Numbers (PPSNs) to verify voter identities.
- Accessibility The LGERS system will build on the <u>checktheregister.ie</u> platform, allowing voters to register or update details online easily.



 Data Integrity - LGERS enables cross-checking with the Department of Social Protection to confirm identity details (name, date of birth, PPSN), ensuring the register's accuracy while protecting sensitive data like PPSNs from public disclosure.

### **FUNDING AND RESOURCES**

In 2025, the government allocated over €3 million to local authorities for LGERS, including €1.7 million for data quality improvements and funding for two additional staff members per local authority to address data issues before the 2026 transition.

The Electoral Commission's first "Oversight Report on Electoral Registers" in May 2025 noted that while LGERS will help centralise and streamline the registration process, it alone will not fully resolve legacy accuracy issues. Additional work is required to address data gaps and discrepancies between local authority registers.

Galway County Council's franchise team have intensified data cleanup efforts in recent weeks to remove duplicates, verify identities and prepare for the transition to a national system.

# THE FOLLOWING WORK IS CURRENTLY ONGOING IN THE REGISTER OF ELECTORS

- 1,500 letters have issued to potential duplicate electors in recent weeks
- Deaths recorded by the General Register Office are cross referenced against electoral register on a weekly basis to ensure deceased electors details are removed from the register.
- Preparing data from polling cards returned during the 2024 electoral events to identify and remove redundant entries from the register.
- All townland names (5,000 approx.) are being translated in advance of the transition to LGERS in line with the Official Languages (Amendment) Act 2021 and an Scéim Teanga.

Galway County Council are currently on track to have LGERS fully implemented by the end of 2026.



#### WATER SAFETY AND LIFEGUARD SERVICES - SUMMER 2025 UPDATE

County Galway boasts a stunning and diverse coastline that continues to attract water enthusiasts throughout the summer months. As schools break for the holidays and visitor numbers increase, ensuring a safe and enjoyable aquatic environment is a top priority.

With the bathing season now underway, Galway County Council is committed to promoting water safety and providing high-quality supervision at designated bathing areas. The Council employs a full-time Water Safety Awareness and Development Officer who oversees the management of bathing areas and coordinates the delivery of the seasonal lifeguard service across both Galway County and City.

Lifeguard services have officially commenced in line with the **Summer Ready Plan 2025**. Lifeguards are now on duty at **16 designated beaches**. It is important to note that **no flag displayed means no lifeguard is on duty**.





Cooperation for better sparsely populated rural, coastal and mountain focused governance.

On June 17–18, 2025, Galway County Council welcomed partners from Spain, Ireland, Estonia, and Bulgaria for an interregional workshop on the topic "Building on the steps required to Embed Rural Proofing at Local, Regional and National Level.

The workshop focused on embedding Rural Proofing in policy design and delivery at local, regional, and national levels.

The workshop brought together policymakers, technical experts, and rural development practitioners to test and refine a practical impact assessment tool designed specifically to make rural sensitivities visible in policy planning. The first day began with an overview of the assessment process led by Maria Hall (Hub Planning).

The goal: to ensure that rural voices and realities are considered from the earliest stages of decision-making. The workshop provided a valuable opportunity to assess whether this approach is clear, usable, and practical—and whether it can help policymakers identify risks and opportunities early, especially those unique to rural settings.

Rural communities face distinct challenges, but those challenges are often overlooked in policy planning. This workshop aimed to build a stronger foundation for evidence-informed, people centred policy design by piloting an impact assessment tool and examined a Structured, Hands-On Methodology which was Presented by Maria Hall, Hub Planning utilising existing Data and Consultation feedback and utilisation of Artificial Intelligence Bot.

Galway Ireland – 17 – 18<sup>th</sup> June 2025 Inter- regional workshop - Partners: Spain, Bulgaria, Estonia

This process was designed to test and refine a practical method for assessing the potential impacts of rural policy projects on people and places. By applying an Impact Assessment Matrix

to a case study policy scenario, (Case Study to test the impact of closure of Post Offices in Rural Areas) participants explored how structured evaluation tools can support better rural-proofed decision-making.

#### WHAT WE DID

Over two days, participants worked in small groups, applying a step-by-step method:

- Scoping Potential Impacts: Identifying possible social, environmental, and economic
  - effects of a policy scenario.
- Deepening Understanding:
   Using data and consultation findings to understand who might be affected and how.
- Assessing Significance: Rating the scale, duration, severity, and likelihood of impacts using a clear, structured matrix.





• Developing Mitigation Strategies: Identifying practical measures to reduce negative impacts and enhance benefits.

### **KEY LESSONS**

- Structured Does Not Mean Rigid: Using clear steps and rating tables allowed participants to focus on real impacts while maintaining flexibility to discuss what matters most for rural areas.
- Data and Local Knowledge Are Equally Important: The process highlighted the power of combining statistical data with lived experience and consultation insights.
- Data and Local Knowledge Are Equally Important: The process highlighted the power of combining statistical data with lived experience and consultation insights.
- Actionable Outcomes: The matrix helped groups move from identifying impacts to concrete mitigation and enhancement measures, ensuring that discussions translated into practical next steps.
- Early Assessment Helps Avoid Later Problems: Testing impacts at the design stage, rather than after decisions are made, can help prevent negative consequences for rural communities.

#### WHY THIS MATTERS

Rural proofing is not just a policy aspiration; it requires methods that are clear, usable, and useful for governments, local authorities, and communities. The workshop in Ireland showed that a structured Impact Assessment approach can:

- ✓ Identify rural-specific sensitivities early
- ✓ Guide practical mitigation strategies
- Build confidence in rural-proofed decision-making
- ✓ Ensure people-centred policies

A Structured, Hands-On Methodology

Our two-day workshop in Ireland piloted an Impact Assessment Matrix to see whether

structured tools could help surface these issues early and guide practical mitigation strategies.

The group brainstormed practical responses: what can be done to minimise harm, enhance positives, or make adjustments that reduce community risk?



Identifying any positive or negative social impacts that are likely to result from the development application with respect (examples could include):



**Community values** - potential implications to cultural and community wellbeing as a result of the project including impacts on residents and surrounding properties, social exclusion, social cohesion, community safety and health.

**Safety and amenity** - analysis of potential adverse impacts on local amenity (both short and longer term) including noise, air quality and visual impacts, with particular focus on the how the demolition/transition phase of the development would be managed.

**Aged care demand** - actual or projected population growth within the catchment and aged care demand

**Access and connectivity** – presence or absence of safe and accessible public transport for patrons, availability of car parking and time restrictions on car parking (if any)

**Community facilities** – identify if the increased demand for supports and services.

**Demand on services** – such as public transport, convenience food, medical centres and community services and identify if the communal facilities would have the capacity to service residents during the transition stages of the development.

**Suitability of type, mix and capacity** – nature and extent suitability.

## PRESENTATION BY MARIA HALL, HUB PLANNING

## Insights from Ireland: Participation and Policy in Practice

Provided a deep dive into the Irish experience with *Public Participation Networks* (PPNs). Maria Hall presented findings from a recent review of PPNs, which serve as formal platforms for civil society to engage with local authorities. Discussions explored their effectiveness in representing diverse groups—such as older persons, people with disabilities, and members of the Traveller community—and their role in shaping inclusive policy.

Later in the day, Sinéad Quinn, from Ireland's Department of Rural and Community Development, shared the national approach to Rural Proofing as outlined in the strategy *Our Rural Future*. Her presentation illustrated how over 150 cross-government commitments are being mobilized to foster economic diversification, reverse rural decline, and strengthen rural resilience.

Presentation by Sinead Quinn, Rural Strategy Unit, Department of rural and Community Development and the Gaeltacht outlined the following.

# Background - Framework for Rural Proofing in Ireland

- Government Decision in 1999
- Government Handbook amended
- Requires Memo for Government to indicate the impact on rural communities
- Rural referred to 'towns and villages and in smaller urban centres outside of the five major urban areas (Cork, Dublin, Galway, Limerick and Waterford)





## NEW APPROACH TO RURAL PROOFING

Government commitment: Our Rural Future 2021-2025 (Measure 148) to develop "an effective rural proofing model to ensure that the needs of rural communities are considered in the development of Government policies"

DRCDG commissioned research, including looking at the international experience, and developments by OECD and EU.

#### **KEY LEARNINGS:**

- Rural proofing has been difficult to successfully develop
- No 'one size fits all' approach

## PILOT ON RURAL PROOFING:

- Pilot exercise to apply rural proofing concepts to four key initiatives
- Led to an understanding that Rural Proofing is not a policy or a model
- Rural Proofing is a process to view policy development through a rural lens
- To help ensure government policies and services understand and take account of specific needs and capacity of rural communities

#### **PILOT LEARNINGS:**

- Early consideration to identify issues and capacities of rural areas
- Public consultations should systematically prompt rural communities to reflect and advise on policies/proposals
- Place-based approach to rural development can enable meaningful engagement with rural people and business
- Policy makers should be supported by guidance material to undertake Rural Proofing

#### GUIDE TO RURAL PROOFING FOR POLICY MAKERS:

- Pilot showed that a level of Rural Proofing is being undertaken within the current system, although not always expressed as Rural Proofing
- Any new approach needed to be practical and implementable
- Objective was to build on and strengthen those approaches

Developed a "Guide to Rural Proofing for Policy Makers"



Core aim is to clearly and simply explain what rural proofing is, what is meant by rural, and provide guidance and assistance.

#### RURAL PACT – WHAT IS IT

A framework for cooperation between public authorities, civil society, businesses, academia and citizens, at the European, national, regional and local level; the aim of which is mobilize stakeholders to act on the needs and aspirations of rural communities by 2040 (European Union, n. da). Rural Pact was launched by the European Commission in 2021 as part of the Long-Term Vision for the EU's rural areas (European Commission, 2021b).

## DIALOGUE, COORDINATION, AND NEXT STEPS

Day two of the workshop focused on refining the assessment results and reflecting collectively on the process. A partner Steering Committee meeting closed the session, offering space to consolidate learning and discuss next steps for integrating this methodology into real policy settings across regions.

By bringing together diverse experiences from Spain, Ireland, Estonia, and Bulgaria, the Galway workshop reaffirmed the power of collaboration in advancing rural-sensitive governance. More than a technical exercise, it marked a step forward in building policies that not only reach rural areas—but are rooted in their voices, knowledge, and needs.

**Next Steps:** Review Comparative Study, which incorporates feedback from Partner Countries through Questionnaires completed in April and Focus groups interviews held in May 2025.

Croí health checks were made available to farmers, providing on-the-spot cardiovascular assessments and expert health advice. The service saw strong engagement and uptake, highlighting the value of accessible health supports for rural communities.

The event provided an important opportunity to promote health and wellbeing among the farming population, aligning with Healthy County Galway's ongoing commitment to supporting healthier lifestyles across the county.

#### WOMEN'S HEALTH PROGRAMME

The Women's Health Programme has progressed into its second strand, with a focus on fostering social connection and wellbeing among women in island communities. This phase involves the rollout of community-based activities designed to provide opportunities for women to convene in supportive, social settings.

These initiatives aim to strengthen community ties while continuing to promote health and wellbeing among women in the local community.

#### **POSITIVE AGEING WEEK 2025**

Work is progressing on planning the Local Heroes Campaign to be delivered during Positive Ageing Week 2025 (29<sup>th</sup> September – 3<sup>rd</sup> October), to promote positive and healthy ageing and combat ageism. Positive Ageing Week is an annual initiative to emphasize the positive aspects of ageing and highlight the significant roles older people play in our families and our communities. The SICAP Programme Implementers – Galway Rural Development, Forum Connemara, Comhar na nOileán and Galway City Partnership, together with the HSE and COPE, are identifying older people to take part in the campaign. Galway will shine a light on 30 people from across the City and County who are wonderful examples of positive ageing with their biographies and photos on display during October. An event will be held on Tuesday 30th September 2025 @ 1pm (venue to be confirmed) to celebrate the exhibition, where the City Mayor and the Cathaoirleach of County Galway will present participants with a memento of their biography.

### FUNDING FOR AGE FRIENDLY COMMUNITY AMENITIES

Galway County Council's annual funding scheme to promote voluntary activity in economic, community and cultural development are the Community Support Schemes. In line with feedback from the Older People's Council, a priority area for funding was accessibility improvements at community amenities which resulted in funding for a variety of projects including age friendly seating, lighting at community amenities, accessibility improvements and repairs at community & sensory gardens.

Moreover, Galway County Council are in the process of establishing an interdepartmental team within the Local Authority and this group will be convened before the end of July. Lastly the Age Friendly Alliance are scheduled to meet on July 30th where the strategy will be presented to them.

## **CREATIVE IRELAND**

Drawdown of the Cruinniú na nÓg payments is at an end with recoupment occurring in mid-July. Valerie Kelly, Creative Communities Engagement Officer attended a post-Cruinniú debrief meeting in Dublin on July 16<sup>th</sup> where she presented to a gathering of Local Authority and Creative Ireland staff on building programmes in hard-to-reach areas, specifically focusing on Galway County Council's success on the Aran Islands.

Outside of Cruinniú na nÓg, there are a number of Open Call projects currently concluding, as well as a Creative Health and Wellbeing project which has just begun. Details are below.



### CUAN BEO - SHARING THE OYSTER

Sharing the Oyster celebrated and nurtured marine and freshwater health by bringing

together older generations from oyster fishing villages and school children. Through storytelling, archaeology, and art, *Sharing the Oyster* connected participants to the rich cultural and ecological heritage of oysters, fostering a shared sense of responsibility for the environment.

The project has involved a visit to a shell midden accompanied by an archaeologist to help understand the meaning of these sites as well as intergenerational storytelling where older members of the community spoke to school children about their experiences with fishing throughout their lives. A key creative component of *Sharing* 



the Oyster is the collaborative creation of a modern-day shell midden using clay. Working under the guidance of a professional artist, Claire McLaughlin, the older and younger participants are together crafting individual clay shells carrying a personal wish or message for the health of the environment. These wishes are being inscribed onto the clay, blending creativity with heartfelt intentions for the planet. This project is ongoing, and we are very excited to see the finished product.

## LIVING, CREATING AND LEARNING WORKSHOPS AT GALWAY'S LIVING BOG



Over the past several weeks, Galway's Living Bog has been running a variety of creative workshops inspired by the bog, its wildlife, and biodiversity. These workshops have been incredibly popular and have drawn attendance from a broad spectrum of the community in Mountbellew.





### MUSIC IN THE AFTERNOONS

Earlier this year, Galway County Council were successful in securing €25,000 of additional funding to run a series of live music performances in residential healthcare settings as part of Creative Ireland's *Creative Health & Wellbeing* pillar. The first of these concerts have begun in Inis Mór and Clifden, with upcoming sessions in Carna and Ballinasloe, as well as three sites in the city. Residents, performers, and staff alike have all responded incredibly positively to the concerts, citing the benefits of live music for elderly residents in combating loneliness and helping to raise morale. At the session on Inis Mór last Monday there were several residents who sang songs, put in requests, and enjoyed the original compositions as *Gaeilge* from local singer-songwriter Pádraig Jack. This is the third year that Galway County Council has delivered this project in partnership with Galway Music Residency.

The event was a collaborative success, involving multiple community stakeholders including Ballinasloe Lions Club, SICAP Galway Rural Development, Ballinasloe Credit Union, Involve Youth Services, and several local schools.




The Integration Team have been busy rolling out the One Million Stars Programme in Ballinasloe and Clifden. A display was left in Ballinasloe Library.

#### **ILLEGAL DUMPING AWARENESS**

Dumping continues to occur at several Bring Bank sites throughout the county. Several initiatives have been put in place to highlight this and to encourage users to use the bring banks correctly and to keep the Bring Bank area Litter Free.

#### These include:

- 1. Regular social media posts with images of illegal dumping and messaging to respect the service.
- 2. Adverts in Connacht Tribune, Galway Advertiser, and Tuam Herald to highlight the issue of illegal dumping at bringbank locations and to encourage users to ensure that they use the service responsibly.
- 3. VMS installed at the Bringbanks in Tuam asking the users of the service to use the amenity responsibility and to report incidences of illegal dumping to the Council's Environment Section.
- 4. Galway County Council's Community Warden service have commenced carrying out of hours monitoring of bringbanks at sites where incidences of illegal dumping has been reported.

# ILLEGAL DUMPING AT BRINGBANKS - PLEASE RESPECT THIS SERVICE

Bring Banks and Household Textile banks are a very important resource in helping Galway County do its part for the environment. Unfortunately, we are seeing an increase in illegal dumping at these locations across the county of late and we appeal to all users of the banks not to abuse these facilities by leaving rubbish or waste at them.

There is particular pressure on the textile bank service at present and we continue to see misuse of the service with unsuitable bulky items being regularly placed in these banks blocking the chute mechanism or dumped beside them. Often the Council area staff find that banks are not near full capacity but blocked due to the type of waste inserted into them.

Littering is an offence under the Litter Pollution Act and liable to an on-the-spot fine of €150 and/or prosecution. Please bring your bags/boxes home with you and reuse them again.

Bring Bank sites across the county will continue to be monitored by Galway County Council mobile patrols in an effort to catch businesses or individuals who are dumping at these sites.

Even when banks are full, it is illegal to leave your items beside the bank - go to another site or return when the banks have been emptied.

#### ANTI-LITTER AMBASSADOR PROGRAMME

Students from St. Joseph's NS, Kinvara, along with representatives from An Taisce Clean

Coasts, Galway County Council and Galway Atlantaquaria recently became Anti-Litter Ambassadors. Under this initiative Anti-Litter Ambassadors commit not to litter and to support the numerous anti-litter initiatives supported by Galway County Council, including National Spring Clean, the Gum Litter campaign, dog fouling campaign and the Picker Pals programme.



# DOG CONTROL

782 dog licenses were purchased during the month of June with 554 of those purchased at the local post office. Dog licensing campaigns were carried out in conjunction with the Community Warden Service in the following areas of the county; Turloughmore, Athenry town, Loughrea and Clifden.

1 fixed penalty notice was issued during the month of May for an offence under the Control of Dogs Act 1986 As Amended. 37 fines have been issued under the Act year to date. Of these fines, 14 have been paid in full, with 8 partially paid with the dog owners having entered a payment plan in respect of same. 1 file sent to Law Agents for prosecution under the Act for failure to pay a fixed penalty notice. The other fines issues are being processed through the system.

#### WATER QUALITY AND ENFORCEMENT

#### AGRICULTURAL INSPECTIONS

Galway County Council, with LAWPRO (Local Authority Waters Programme) and four other local Authorities, were selected to complete pilot inspections regarding farmers importing organic materials such as cattle slurry and farmyard manure. The new rules came into effect in 2025 and are aimed at combating the issues of slurry moving 'on paper' only. These inspections are to validate that manure is being moved as per notifications to the Department of Agriculture. Going forward, all local authorities will have to verify a percentage of slurry movements, with boots on the ground inspections. This will check to see the material is spread on fields of the importing farm as per notifications.

These types of movements are used by exporting farmers to remain within stocking limits and the exporting of these manures is to reduce pressures on water quality. Issues were identified on 3 farms inspected in June and feedback will be forwarded to LAWPRO and DAFM of the issues.



Galway County Council representatives attended two IFFPG (Irish farm film producers' group) collection dates in June. The aim of the inspections was to check compliance with the scheme and to verify that farmers were able to produce receipts for proof of purchase of plastic purchased with the recycling levy included. The contractor who organises the collection days carries out a clean up after the event within 2km of the centre to collect any lost plastic on public roads. Farmers were advised on the collection days of unsecured loads and to secure loads going forward to prevent material being lost.

Two staff from the water quality team are on the working group of the NAIP "National Agriculture Inspections Programme" and have provided feedback on proposed amendments to the Sewage Sludge and Good Agricultural Practice Regulations. GCC also attended a working group meeting in June regarding updates to storage requirements for livestock which will be used for NAIP farm inspections going forward.

A practical day was held in Gurteen College, Co. Tipperary, on the 18<sup>th</sup> of June. This was the final stage of a multi-day training program for Local Authority Farm Inspectors who carry out farm inspections under the National Agricultural Inspection Programme (NAIP). This day allowed novice inspectors to put the theory training into practice while in the company of many highly experienced inspectors. Prior to the practical day at Gurteen College, there was a two-day classroom-based theory stage and a follow up webinar which covered the relevant legislation, NAIP guidelines, common farm non-compliances and appropriate enforcement actions, including when to cross-report to the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine (DAFM), and an introduction to the EPA farm storage calculator tool.

Galway County Council attended court on the 22nd of June regarding a farm inspection conducted in 2023. The farmer was convicted in March 2025 but has not carried out works to stop the discharge of effluent to an open drain as well as to remove farm waste within the timeframe of the court order. The case is listed for hearing again in July.

#### SEPTIC TANK INSPECTIONS

30 inspections were carried out under the National Inspection Plan (NIP) within the Kilchreest river waterbody in June 2025. This region was targeted for inspections due to the dense concentration of households located in Zone 2, where bedrock is at or near surface, leading to elevated risks to Human Health through with contamination of groundwater wells. A compliance rate of 50% was achieved, with Advisory Notices issued to the non-compliant households.

7 open advisory notices were closed following verification inspections in June. 2 of these were west of the county (An Spidéal & Maigh Cuilinn) with the remainder east of the county, 1 near Clarinbridge and rest in Ballinasloe area.

#### CATCHMENT MANAGEMENT

Staff attended online at the annual EPA Water conference on the 11th and 12th of June. Some of the presentations are listed below:

- Implementing the Water Action Plan, Policy challenges and opportunities
- Tracking action a new approach for water
- Peatlands water quality benefits from the enhanced decommissioning, rehabilitation and restoration scheme
- Better farming for water campaign
- Behavioural insights ASSAP water quality measure uptake

A meeting was held in relation to an application for a wastewater discharge to surface waters. The applicant will be required to complete a hydrological assessment to show that the discharge will comply with the Surface Water Regulations. A screening for Appropriate Assessment will also be required.



#### **BATHING WATERS**

A temporary bathing prohibition notice for East End Beach, Inishboffin was lifted on the 6th June after a water re-sample showed bacteriological levels were at compliant levels again.

As part of the blue flag programme, the Environment Section hosted a Seashore Event





on Wednesday 11th June 2025. Tara Noonan from the Galway Atlantaquaria brought the local pre-schoolers to the Old Pier, Traught

and the pupils from St Joseph's National School, Kinvara to Traught beach on an exciting adventure which included a Seashore Bio blitz and a Scavenger Hunt. The event at Traught beach concluded with a beach clean by Ollie O'Flaherty, Clean Coasts and our Community Wardens. This event connected the local school children with nature and promoted the rich biodiversity of the beach and its crystal-clear waters.

Waste Management AND ENFORCEMENT

5 litter fines issued by our Community Warden Services for offences under the Litter Pollution Act 1997 As Amended. 35 Litter fines issued year to date with 13 fines paid in full and 7 referred to the Law Agent to commence legal proceedings for non-payment of fines. A further 10 cases are still being processed through the system.

# LIBRARY SERVICES

#### SUMMER AT THE LIBRARY: A SEASON OF CREATIVITY, LEARNING, & BELONGING

This summer, libraries have been alive with the sounds of storytelling, laughter, and creativity as people of all ages engaged in a wide range of enriching activities. From inclusive craft workshops and sensory experiences to music sessions and themed events, libraries have offered welcoming spaces where individuals could explore, learn, and connect.

Children participating in summer programmes enjoyed hands-on activities such as making windchimes, paper birds, clay sea creatures, and decorated stones—many of which now adorn library spaces, giving young creators a lasting sense of pride and belonging. Art workshops, including glass painting sessions, allowed children to contribute to community exhibitions tied to larger arts festivals, reinforcing the role of libraries as cultural hubs.



The Summer Stars initiative brought added excitement with themed events like Harry Potter-inspired workshops and storytelling sessions under the stars. Weekly rhyme time sessions continued to be a highlight for younger children and their caregivers, fostering early literacy and social interaction.

Libraries also offered a rich programme for adults and older generations. Weekly music sessions, including singalongs and rhyme time, provided opportunities for parents, grandparents, and toddlers to bond through shared musical experiences. Creative workshops, poetry readings, and bilingual storytimes welcomed intergenerational participation, while sensory resources such as interactive tables supported inclusive engagement for adults and children with additional needs.



Innovative events also made their mark, including a poetry reading where an AI-generated voice of a literary icon brought a modern twist to a traditional celebration. Puppet shows, author visits, and community art installations added to the vibrant mix of offerings.

Throughout the summer, libraries have demonstrated their vital role in supporting creativity, connection, and lifelong learning—making them essential spaces for joyful engagement across all ages.

# DRIVING DIGITAL TRANSFORMATION: GALWAY AND ESTONIAN LIBRARIES COLLABORATE UNDER ERASMUS 2025

Galway Public Libraries have successfully secured funding through the Erasmus Programme 2025 for a collaborative initiative with Estonian Libraries. This partnership is centered on the implementation of the EU Digital Strategy, examining its influence on library services and fostering cultural programming that promotes and celebrates native languages.

Estonia, recognized as a frontrunner in the digitalization of public services, plays a leading role in advancing the EU's digital strategic goals. Earlier this month, Galway Libraries hosted a delegation from the National Library of Estonia, whose focus was on cultural programming. Their visit included discussions on environmental and climate-related initiatives, the formation of strategic partnerships with academic institutions, and the use of local history to cultivate and celebrate cultural identity.

The second phase of this initiative will take place in September, when a further Estonian delegation will visit Galway. During this phase, public librarians will participate in a weeklong programme dedicated to exploring youth engagement, creative cultural development, and civic empowerment through language

# GROW YOUR IMAGINATION SCHOOLS PROJECT (APRIL – JUNE)

The Schools Library Service successfully hosted two engaging and educational events for 3rd class pupils from local schools. This nature-themed project began in April in Dunmore and Portumna libraries. The sessions began with a talk and readings by popular children's author Mary Murphy. Following the storytelling, the children took part in a hands-on planting activity. They sowed a variety of flowers and vegetables, including lettuce, leeks, celery, and



radishes. Herbs such as parsley, mint, and rosemary were also planted, along with strawberries and sunflowers, bringing a burst of life and colour to the library spaces and introducing children to basic gardening skills.

Each child received a custom menu card featuring simple, tasty recipes using the herbs and vegetables they planted. They also took home packets of wildflower seeds, sunflower seeds, and pea seeds—encouraging them to continue growing both at school and at home.

In early June a special story time session with library staff focused on themes of biodiversity, planting, and gardening. Children enjoyed stories, a themed crossword, and a word search—all designed to spark their imaginations and deepen their connection to nature. Harvesting the veggies and herbs began and the children were delighted to see how quickly all the plants had grown and blossomed and were happy heading back to the classroom with all their own fresh produce.

Before the schools closed in June for their summer break, local artist Maria Hitchcox led creative workshops where children crafted beautiful eco-friendly crafts. Using twigs, sticks, flowers, leaves, seeds, and wooden beads, the children created colourful suncatchers that can be hung in windows to catch the sunlight—or placed in gardens to naturally reseed when no longer needed indoors.

Overall, 52 children took part in the project. These events successfully combined storytelling, literacy, creativity, and environmental awareness. They transformed the libraries into lively, colourful welcoming spaces and fostered a deeper connection with nature. The Schools Library Service is proud to have delivered such a meaningful and memorable experience for local school children, kindly funded by Creative Ireland.

Galway County Council Archives processed (cleaned, listed & arranged) a small but interesting collection of Court material dating from c. 1907 to 1920 (GC/C).

It includes applications for Compensation for Criminal Injury to Property, ranging from the destruction of crops, livestock and buildings. An application for compensation following the destruction of a thatched house and crops, includes for instance an affidavit from Patrick

Connelly, Newtown, Mountbellew Co. Galway, a farmer's son, who stated that at 4 am

'I awoke from my sleep in an almost unconscious state, in my father's house at Newtown, County Galway. I occupy a room by myself fin the lower end of the house and feeling a queer sensation I called out to my mother, who occupies the room on the other end of the house, and when she entered my room, it was filled with smoke and I almost suffocated. My

mother helped me out of the room, and the fresh air outside revised me....' (1907, GC/C/1/47).

#### **BALLYBANE LIBRARY**

This means that each of these children will have a permanent footprint in their local library, and this gives them a sense of belonging and ownership.

#### LOCAL STUDIES

#### **VISITS**

There were approximately 10 drop-in visitors to the Local Studies Department, who had various queries, including how to gain access to the Irish news Archive, and the British News Archive. There were queries about graveyard records, and one person wanted access to a copy of "M'asal Beag Dubh," from our Páraic O'Conaire special collection. This person is



planning an English translation of the book. Another library patron requested the lyrics of an old Galway song, "Here's a toast to you Claddagh", which we were able to provide for him. He also needed information on the old Claddagh hurling team.

#### PHONE CALLS


Phone queries ranged from enquiries about the school's folklore collection, the map collection, and there was a query about the school catechism from the 1950's, which was referred to the Diocesan Archive.

#### **BOOKINGS**

7 Bookings for access to the Irish News Archive. There was a request for access to the Encumbered Estates court rental books, and access to a copy of "Galway Roots", which had an article on the Shee Rent Rolls. There was a booking to view the Killeely Graveyard headstone memorial book, and a request to view maps and any information on Cillíns in the Connemara area.

#### **EMAILS**

There were over 25 emails on a wide range of topics. These included several genealogy requests, including information requested on the Cunningham and Carlson families. There were requests for access to maps, and requests to forward links to the map collection. There was a request for information on St Nicholas Collegiate Church, and the Eyre family of Eyrecourt. A patron in the United States was looking for access to old Galway newspapers, which might throw some light on the tragic drowning of the Nevin family, the parents and




five children, from the Eyrecourt area, as they were on route to Australia in the years after the famine, when they were involved in a shipwreck, A search of the Old Galway Newspapers available on the British news Archive has not produced any specific information so far, though some information was helpful, and the search is ongoing.

This document pictured left and below, dated 1691, and of unknown provenance, is one of the significant items held by the Local studies section of Galway Public Libraries, and it dictates the terms of surrender of the population of Galway to the army of General Ginckle, one of the Generals who fought for the Williamites



during the battles of the Boyne and Aughrim.
Galway capitulated to Ginckle's forces; its garrison was permitted to retire to Limerick.
Ginckle, a Dutch General, was rewarded for his services by the English King, being made 1st Earl of Athlone, and Baron of Aughrim, and given large estates also, once the conquest of Ireland was complete. This unique




document gives insight into this sad chapter in the history of Galway City.

The Local Studies Section of Galway Public Libraries has recently re-added to our Special Collections the original 1907 copy of "Seanfhocla Uladh", by Énrí Ua Muirgheasa. This book was returned after being out on loan for 85 years. It was last borrowed in 1940, in the early months of World War 2, by a noted German Celtic and Gaelic Studies scholar, who was visiting Galway at the time, and who perhaps had to leave hastily due to the outbreak of war, though he subsequently spent much time in the West of Ireland in later years. His collection was donated by his family to a Galway Educational Institution after his death, and included this book, which was then returned to Galway Public Libraries. The earliest date on the label is 1934, and the last date stamped is 11th October 1940. The rules of the library beside the date label are rather strict and specify a loan period of 14 days only. The book has been kept in



great condition, and is bilingual, with Cló Gaelach script on one side, and English on the






other. The Gaelic proverbs themselves are delightful to read and contain many gems of Old Irish wisdom.

The second social media post on the book returned after 85 years, gained some media attention, and the Irish Independent included it in their online version of the paper for June 13<sup>th</sup>, 2025.

#### **GALWAY CITY LIBRARY**

Two new art exhibitions and a series of engaging events brought creativity and community



spirit to the library this month. Ukrainian artist Martisha Sea showcased "Portrait of Pain", a powerful collection exploring mental health, while Galway-based artist Elaine Cunningham presented her unique encaustic paintings—created by layering and blowtorching wax—at a launch event attended by 49 people.

Weekly Rhyme Time sessions with Music Generation Galway and GRETB continued to thrive, drawing 119 participants. On Bloomsday, June 16, the library hosted a standout poetry event where poet Michael Quinn read his *Rathgar Odyssey*, followed by an Al-generated

voice of James Joyce reading the same poem—an innovative tribute blending literature and technology.

The Summer Stars programme featured magical moments, including a Harry Potter-themed workshop with Professor Lori LeGrand on June 14, and a star-themed storytelling and navigation session with author-illustrator Lucy Desmond on June 21. Throughout the month, class visits and storytimes added to the lively atmosphere, making the library a hub of learning and imagination.





Artist Elaine Cunningham, a Galway-based artist who works in a variety of media had an exhibition of encaustic painting which is a unique artform creating by layering, and blowtorching, wax. Elaine had a launch event for her exhibition on Tuesday 24 June, which was attended by 49 people.

Rhyme Time with Music Generation Galway and GRETB continues weekly with parents and children enjoying the chance to socialise and learn. A total number of 119 participants took part in Rhyme Time in this period.

On 16 June, Bloomsday, the library hosted a poetry reading with a difference. Modern poet Michael Quinn, read his poem Rathgar Odyssey, a tribute to James Joyce. Then an Al version of James Joyce read the poem to the audience. The technology cloned Joyce's voice from a recording of his story Finnegan's Wake thereby enabling a dead writer to read the works of a live poet!

#### **WESTSIDE ARTS FESTIVAL:**

from July 8th to 12th, marking the festival's 21st anniversary. Developed by Westside Library in conjunction with partners, with a strong focus on community engagement, the festival continues to celebrate and strengthen the spirit of Westside through the arts.

In preparation, the library hosted two vibrant glass painting workshops with students from Scoil Chroí Íosa, facilitated by former staff member and artist Kitty Walsh. #### **VACANT HOMES**

#### VACANT PROPERTY REFURBISHMENT GRANTS

Galway County Council has received 589 applications since the start of the scheme with 379 approved to date to a value in excess of €21 million. 136 have been withdrawn or rejected due to ineligibility for the scheme, and 46 Vacant Property Refurbishment Grants have been paid to date to a value in excess of €2.5 million which represents a significant investment in local communities.

# LONG-TERM LEASING

Galway County Council is seeking expressions of interest for the provision of suitable properties for long-term lease for the delivery of housing in Galway County. Details and a briefing document are available on Galway County Council's website: <a href="https://www.galway.ie/en/services/housing/">https://www.galway.ie/en/services/housing/</a>.

The latest date and time for receipt of submissions is 4.00pm Thursday the 31st of July 2025. Under this call, lease agreements must be completed and in place by the 01st of December 2025 in order to qualify for funding from the Department of Housing as the long-term leasing scheme is being phased out nationwide.

#### AFFORDABLE HOUSING


All offers on the 44 houses in Phase 2 of the affordable housing development in Garraí na Gaoithe, Baile Chláir have been accepted. The sales of the 17 houses in Phase 1 are almost completed and the successful applicants have started to move into the properties.

Galway County Council are currently engaging with Studio PKA which are providing architectural and design services for two sites in Athenry at Raheen and Páirc Na hAbhainn. It is scheduled to lodge planning for these developments later this year.

Galway County Council are investigating other possibilities for affordable housing in Tuam, Loughrea and Kinvara. Some of these are on Council lands and others are Part V. It is planned to run a survey to gauge the demand in these areas.



#### HOUSING MAINTENANCE



The Housing Maintenance
Section has received a total of
3621 maintenance requests
within the first 6 months of 2025
of which 1116 were sanctioned
for action by Galway County
Council. The balance was either
refused and/or duplicate
maintenance requests. The type
of maintenance requests can be

#### PLANNED MAINTENANCE

Tenders for have been sought by the Housing Maintenance Section for the Conditional Assessment of Galway County Councils Housing Stock via a new digital platform Addjust. The closing date for receipt of tenders is the 24<sup>th</sup> of July 2025 and it anticipated surveys will commence in September 2025. The new Addjust system established by the Department of Housing will give a good insight into the conditional of GCC housings stock and establish a planned programme of works for the next 5 to 30 years.

#### SOCIAL WORK TEAM (HOUSING)

- Online Referral process for internal referrals, link available on the Intranet.
- External referrals can be discussed directly with Kieran Keon.
- Geographical areas of cover very busy with open cases and regular referrals.
- Currently, staff team of 3 with a high level of active/open cases.
- Additional posts have been identified and requested through the Workforce planning process.
- More complex cases being identified, and case managed.

### INTERNATIONAL SOCIAL HOUSING FESTIVAL

Joint presentation with HSE on Mental health and housing needs. Kieran Keon presented alongside a panel to discuss the supports and outcomes for people with mental health needs who benefit from having their own door accommodation with supports in place. The MyHome project was discussed.

#### HOUSING FIRST CONFERENCE

The Annual Housing First conference took place in Cork City Hall on June 19<sup>th</sup>. It was a very informative event focusing on the impacts of homelessness on women in particular, the difference between men and women who experience homelessness, the significant differences in terms of the journey to homelessness, in addition to the different



interventions that are required. A very informative day. There were also presentations by individuals who have benefitted from Housing First and Myhome type programmes, this was very inspiring and informative.

#### CHILD PROTECTION POLICY & PROCEDURES

The current Child Protection and Welfare Policy and Procedures were adopted in January 2023. Kieran Keon, Senior Social Worker Kieran Keon is the *Designated Child Protection Liaison Officer* for Galway County Council. He has reviewed the policy and procedures in January 2025 and confirmed that there are no legislative updates since that are required to be reflected in the policy at this time and therefore the policy continues to be fit for purpose. However, a review and updating under the Public Sector Duty in underway. Corporate services are leading out on this. <u>All staff must complete the online Children's First Training</u>.

#### SEXUAL OFFENCES LIAISON OFFICER (SOLO)

- SOLO role is attached to Senior Social Worker and Designated Child Protection Liaison Officer role.
- Changes to the Act in 2023, meaning additional responsibility for local authorities in this regard in terms of a 'single agency' response on some cases.
- Increase in cases identified in 2025. Complex Interagency case management is required with the Gardai, Probation services, Galway Simon, COPE etc.

# DISABILITY / SOCIAL INCLUSION / HOUSING AGENCY

- Kieran Keon, Senior Social Worker is leading on the implementation of the Galway County Council Strategic Plan 2021-2026 along with Ger Scully, SEO. The G.c.co plan is underpinned by the National Plan.
- Considerable level of stakeholder engagement with the HSE and all of the main Disability services providers in the region.
- The Housing agency have established a Social Inclusion Advisory Group to incorporate Disability. Kieran Keon is the Galway County Council rep on the group, who will advise the Housing Agency on Social Inclusion issues such as Disability, 'At risk' Youth, Aftercare, Child Protection and relates issues.

# CCMA - LOCAL AUTHORITY SOCIAL WORK REVIEW (NATIONAL)

Kieran Keon is one of three reps on the national review working group. The reports is almost complete and being brought by the chairperson Coilin Reilly, CEO Carlow Co.co to the Buildings & Land Use Committee who commissioned the report.

# PART 8: COLD WEATHER RESPONSE AND MEDIUM-TERM SUPPORT UNIT AT VICAR STREET, TUAM

An application under Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations 2001 (as amended), was lodged on 28<sup>th</sup> March 2025 for a Cold Weather Response and Medium-Term Support unit at Vicar Street, Tuam, with a closing date for submissions on 28th April 2025.

The proposed development consists of: demolition of an existing single storey extension, construction of a 2 storey extension to the rear of an existing 3 storey mid terrace unit and construction of a 2 storey mid-terrace infill unit together with all ancillary siteworks and services to provide a cold weather response unit consisting of 10 no. beds together with associated facilities and a medium term response unit consisting of 2 no. 3-bed apartments, 1 no. 2-bed apartment and 1 no. 1-bed apartment, reception/office, staff accommodation and storage at Vicar Street, Tuam, Co. Galway, which is within the Tuam Architectural Conservation Area.

An AA Screening Assessment was carried out by Moore Group – Environmental Services and it was determined that the proposal does not require full Appropriate Assessment and can be screened out. An EIA screening was also carried out by Moore Group, and it concluded that the proposed development works are not considered likely to have significant effects on the environment and consequently does not require an Environmental Impact Assessment Report.

No submissions/observations were received from the public within the allocated period.

Further to a planning review and report, a Chief Executive Report was issued to the elected



members of Tuam M.D. This report was considered at the Tuam MD Meeting on 16th June, and it was approved to carry out the development as recommended in the report.

## PART 8: RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT AT FARRANNAMARTIN, GALWAY RD., TUAM

An application under Part 8 of the Planning and Development Regulations 2001 (as amended), for a proposed 66 no. residential development at Farrannamartin, Tuam consisting of: 33 no. two-storey dwellings, 5 no. single-storey units, 11 no. duplexes, and 17



no. apartments to provide 11 no. 1-bed units, 10 no. 2-bed units, 43 no. 3-bed units and 2 no. 4-bed units, was lodged on 11<sup>th</sup> April 2025.

This proposal also includes for the provision of an electric substation, 2 no. bicycle shelters and ancillary parking, a playground, landscaping and boundary wall construction.

An AA Screening Assessment was carried out by Delichon Ecology, and it was determined that the proposal does not require full Appropriate Assessment and can be screened out. An EIA screening was also carried out by Delichon Ecology, and it concluded that the proposed development works are not considered likely to have significant effects on the environment and consequently does not require an Environmental Impact Assessment Report.

Twenty-nine (29) submissions were received from members of the public covering a variety of topics, with a lot of concerns relating in particular to overlooking/loss of privacy; overdevelopment/density, housing types out of character with area and environmental concerns.

Feedback was also received from both Councillors and the public that there were a number 'typos' on the Traffic and Transport Assessment submitted as part of the planning pack.

Further to a planning review and report, a Chief Executive Report was issued to the elected members of Tuam M.D. This report was considered at the Tuam MD Meeting on 16th June, and it was approved to carry out the development as recommended in the report, subject to the following two amendments:

### **AMENDMENT 1**

To reduce the following units from Two Storey to Single Storey, and where space is required for a larger ground footprint to use an area towards the rear up to 3 meters and as required adjust width.

- From units that are at the boundary of existing bungalows fronting the Galway Rd. (from 66C1.1 to 54D2 on planning maps).

Reason - The built environment consists of long-established single storey dwellings and the new construction will hold that built environment.

#### **AMENDMENT 2**

To ensure that the proposed units built shall not exceed two-storey units.

Reason - The built environment does not have any three storey units. Restriction to a maximum of two storey units would be in keeping with the built environment.

The two amendments are significant, requiring a re-design of the scheme at two locations and resulting in a decrease in bed spaces. A new Part 8 application is required to implement these.



#### SOCIAL HOUSING PPP BUNDLE 7 - BALLYGADDY ROAD, TUAM

The Social Housing PPP (Public Private Partnership) Programme is a partnership between the DHLGH, participating local authorities, the National Development Finance Agency (NDFA) and a specially formed Project Company.

Under this type of contract, the PPP project company (PPP Co), as the private partner, designs, builds, finances, maintains and operates (DBFMO) social housing developments for a period of 25 years in return for a monthly payment (unitary charge) from the State.

The Programme is being rolled out in bundles. Galway County Council was successful in its application to be included in bundle 7 with a proposed housing development at Ballygaddy Rd. Tuam.

The Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage recently advised that following an evaluation of the costs associated with the 486 homes which were to be delivered under PPP Bundle 3 they have decided not to proceed with contract award on a value for money basis.

The remaining PPP Bundles, including Bundle 7 which includes the Ballygaddy Road site in Tuam, are continuing but the delivery model may change. The Housing Capital Team are continuing to work with the Dublin City Council as the lead authority and the appointed integrated design team providing information as requested. GCC Planning have advised that the target number of units is 170 based on the residentially zoned area of the site.

# CIRCULAR: HOUSING 14/2025. REVISED ARRANGEMENTS IN RESPECT OF CAPITAL FUNDING FOR LOCAL AUTHORITY PART V ACQUISITIONS

The Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage issued Circular 14/2025 to update Local Authorities on the revised arrangements regarding the acquisition of new build housing by LAs under Part V agreement.

Under these new arrangements Local Authorities will no longer need DHLGH funding approval in advance of finalising their Part V agreements, but instead are now required to notify the DHLGH by submitting relevant information on agreement (with template outlined in Appendix to Circular).

Part V are to be administrated separately to any Turnkey opportunity that may arise within the same development. Local Authorities are required to continue to forward Turnkey proposals in the normal manner, as previously, and include how the Part V requirement will be dealt with.

A letter was subsequently sent by the DHLGH to each Local Authority outlining Acquisition cost guidelines for social housing – Q2 2025 which gave an upper, lower and average range



of prices for different house types, as current cost guidelines for Part Vs under the new arrangements.

## PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT, FIRE & EMERGENCY & CLIMATE CHANGE

#### N6 GALWAY CITY RING ROAD

A Response to a Request for Further Information was submitted to An Bord Pleanála on 14 April 2025. On 6 June 2025 the Board wrote to GCC advising that it considered that the Further Information contained significant additional data and that it required GCC to publish newspaper notices informing that the Further Information will be made available for inspection and inviting submissions/observations or objections to the Board in relation to the Further Information.

The latest consultation process commenced when newspaper notices were published in the Connacht/City Tribune (27 June 2025), Galway Advertiser (26 June 2025) and the Irish Independent (27 June 2025).

# ACTIVE TRAVEL PROGRAMME - ACTIVE TRAVEL FOOTPATH AND INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

## BEECHLAWN FOOTPATHS SCHEME, BALLINASLOE TOWN-PH3

Footpath construction works are substantially complete. The Road Safety Audit (RSA) Stage 3 is scheduled. Once these construction works are complete, this will fully complete the Beechlawn Footpath Scheme.

The Scheme, which was funded by the National Transport Authority (NTA) was completed in 3 phases over the last 4 years. The main feature is a wide footpath with designated and safe crossing points. It will provide a safe means for pedestrians to walk about their daily business in Ballinasloe and it provides a direct east-west pedestrian connection to the south of Ballinasloe.

#### BEECHLAWN FOOTPATHS SCHEME, BALLINASLOE TOWN-PH3



#### SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL ROUND 1

#### ORANMORE AND ATHENRY SCHOOLS

The 5 schools in SRTS Round 1 are in Oranmore (Calasanctius College, Gaelscoil de hÍde and



Scoil Iósaif Naofa) and Athenry (Scoil Chroí Naofa and Athenry Boys NS).
Stakeholder Engagement is currently

Stakeholder Engagement is currently ongoing and the GCC SRTS Engineer has met directly with the Principal from each of the schools in Round 1 to

provide an overview of the proposed measures and to get some feedback from the school around the proposals.

An online Briefing was also held for the Elected Members of the Athenry/Oranmore MD in June 2025.

The Design Consultant, Clandillon, is finalising a document package to bring to the NTA for approval to complete Phase 3, the Preliminary Design phase, of this project. This will include a Design Report, finalised Preliminary drawings including Road Safety Audits



Stage 1-2. It is intended to workshop the Preliminary Design proposal with the NTA and get



their approval to allow us to the next phase of the project, Ph 4 Planning. This is planned for July 2025.

#### SRTS R1 ST PAULS OUGHTERARD

These works are now fully completed, and we are awaiting Road Safety Audit Stage 3. This is the second only Safe Routes To School Scheme to be implemented in Co. Galway. It was funded by the NTA Active Travel Investment team, developed by An Taisce Safe Routes To School team and delivered on the ground by Galway County Council Active Travel team. The final total cost of the project will be in the region of €110, 000.





#### SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL ROUND 2



5 schools are included in Round 2 - Scoil Sailearna (Indreabhán); Scoil Na bhForbacha (Furbogh); Ballinderreen NS; Gort Community College; St Brendan's NS (Loughrea).

We are currently at Phase 2 Options Selection for this project. Preliminary designs for each of the schools have been workshopped with NTA and are being

finalised for inclusion with Phase 3 Preliminary Design documentation. A Surveying company (TST) have been appointed to carry out TOPO's for all 5 schools.

Stakeholder Engagement is currently ongoing. The GCC SRTS Engineer has met directly with the Principal from each of the schools in Round 2 to provide an overview of the proposed measures and to get some feedback from the school around the proposals. It is intended to extend this Stakeholder Engagement to other interested groups and persons by means of an online, non-statutory consultation in the coming weeks.

#### SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL ROUND 3

There are 11 schools included in SRTS Round 3. An Taisce SRTS team has visited all 11 schools to identify the issues pertaining to each location. All 11 Draft Delivery Plans have been received by the Active Travel team for information purposes. All TOPO surveys have been completed. The NTA has directly engaged with Active Travel Services Office (ATSO) to



complete a design for all Round 3 schools which we hope will be issued to GCC. Sometime in Q3 2025.

# ATHENRY ACTIVE TRAVEL DESIGN SCHEME - CHURCH ST TO TUAM RD (VIA STATION RD)

We are currently at Phase 2 Options Selection for this project. There is ongoing and active Stakeholder Engagement with key parties along the proposed Active Travel route in Athenry. Bus Stops requirements have now been added to the overall scope of the project and the design was approved by NTA Bus Team. Consultation material has been prepared for review by Irish Rail. It is anticipated that there will be a draft of the Emerging Preferred Route by July 2025.

# TUAM ACTIVE TRAVEL SCHEME - SEAN PURCELL RD TO SPORTS GROUNDS ON THE R332

We are now nearing the close out for Phase 2 of this project, the Options Selection phase. A draft Feasibility Study is in progress along with the Options Selection Report and associated drawings.

The Emerging preferred route has been identified and agreed in principle with NTA. It is intended that the Phase 2 Options Selection package will be made available to the NTA for approval in July 2025.

#### **HEADFORD FOOTPATHS**

The Active Travel team has been actively collaborating with Tuam MD Roads engineers to design, develop and resource the delivery of an Active Travel scheme on Church Rd, Headford. The scheme which has been proposed to NTA Active Travel team includes carriageway narrowing, widened footpaths, pedestrian crossings & junction tightening with areas of soft planting/ landscaping. GCC await NTA's decision to progress to the next steps of this project.

#### PEDESTRIAN CROSSING AT ST. JOSEPH'S ROAD PORTUMNA

A Topographical survey was carried out in May. Approval in principle was given by the National Transport Authority for the location near junction with N65. We are developing the

design in-house and arranging for Road Safety Audit 1/2 before we can seek the next stage NTA approval and proceed to planning.



## BUS STOP ENHANCEMENT PROGRAMME (BESP)

Two packages are being progressed: bus shelter installation locations and flagpole installation locations. The design has been substantially completed on both packages. Road Safety Audit briefs are being prepared to seek an RSA team. Locations included in the bus shelter package include:

#### LOUGHREA ACTIVE TRAVEL DESIGN SCHEME

A workshop was held with NTA on 15<sup>th</sup> May, where NTA agreed with the identified routes presented by the GCC Active Travel team. A Grant Application Form has been submitted to NTA and is awaiting approval, however, approval in principle has been given by NTA to progress the scheme. A tender design brief and associated package is currently being prepared by GCC.

#### LAUNCH OF KILCOLGAN / CLARINBRIDGE ENERGY MASTERPLAN



Under the Sustainable Energy Communities (SECs) programme the Climate Action Unit works with SEAI mentors to support the completion of community level Energy Masterplans (EMP) through the provision of bridging finance and procurement support. The event included EV test drives and several presentations including information on GCC funding and case studies by Tina Ryan, Climate Action Coordinator.

Preliminary information has been sent to the Planning Section for comment. It is hoped to submit the Part 8 planning application by the end of July 2025.



HEADQUARTERS AND GALWAY CITY FIRE STATION

#### **ACTIVITIES**

Volunteers provided medical support to 2 Triathlons, in Portumna Forest Park and NUI, Galway. Safety Boat cover was also provided on the swim portion of the NUI event.

Medical support was provided at community events in Bullaun, Kilreekill and at Galway Airport Vintage Car Classis Fest.

#### TRAINING

6 Volunteers completed Information Manager training under the Western Region Major Emergency Management Working Group training programme. The 6 trained volunteers can now provide valuable support to the PRA's Information Managers when requested.

5 Senior boat crew volunteers completed a Boat and PPE Care and Maintenance Champion Course in Dublin.

6 Senior boat crew attended and completed a Personal Safety Techniques & Casualty Handling Course also in Dublin. These boat courses are pilot courses being trailed for Civil Defence boat crews with the intention of rolling out training nationally. Galway was one of the 6 counties selected for the above training.

Safety Boat skills training was also provided to operational boat crews over 2 days this month, as more activity on the water may require immediate response for assistance from our crews.

2 Instructors have completed Food Safety and You training with the FSAI in Dublin. These instructors are now engaging in training volunteers throughout the county. This training is at the request of the Civil Defence Branch to be included in the training programme.

#### MAJOR EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

# MEDC (MAJOR EMERGENCY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE)

The most recent Galway County Council MEDC was conducted 26<sup>th</sup> June 2025. The next MEDC in both County and City is scheduled for August 2025.

The review of the joint Galway County and City Major Emergency Plan is well underway, and it is hoped to have a draft for the next MEDC in August 2025. The joint plan will streamline ME response in the county and city recognising the unique situation which exists with 2 councils in the one county.

#### TYNAGH ENERGY / TYNAGH POWER STATION

Tynagh Power Station is a lower tier COMAH (Control of Major Accident Hazards) site. Work is continuing on the finalisation of the external emergency plan. An inter-agency training session on-site was conducted on the 19<sup>th</sup> December 2024. In March 2025, the Site operator



provided revised Site details (Site Contents and Operations), and the draft External Emergency Plan is being revised to reflect same.

A multi-agency exercise is scheduled for early 2026 to test the External Emergency Plan.




TYNAGH ENERGY LOWER TIER COMAH SITE – TYNAGH, CO GALWAY

#### CIRCLE K FUEL TERMINAL - GALWAY PORT

The Circle K terminal is an upper tier COMAH site. Work has progressed on the 2025 review of the external emergency plan which must be completed by end 2025. An initial interagency meeting led by Galway FRS was held in December 2024. Further interagency meetings were conducted in January and March of 2025. A draft copy of the revised External Emergency Plan was circulated to the Principle Response Agencies and other relevant stakeholders in March 2025. A table-top exercise to test the plan and the readiness of the local competent authorities and the site operator was held on the 29<sup>th</sup> April 2025. The exercise participants included Galway City Council, Galway Fire and Rescue Service, the HSE, An Garda Síochána, Galway Port Authority, Irish Rail, the Site Operator, and other relevant stakeholders.

The revised plan will be advertised for public consultation in mid-July and will then be signed-off. A full practical exercise at the site is scheduled for October 2025 to fully test GFRS response.

# NUROP AND SEVERE WEATHER EVENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (SWEMS)

GFRS led an inter-county SWEMS exercise involving 7 local authorities on the 14<sup>th</sup> May 2025 in conjunction with the NDFEM and the Office of Emergency Planning. The exercise was conducted at the NECC Kildare Street and simultaneously in the 7 local authorities. Other



stakeholders in attendance were the HSE, An Garda Siochana, Met Eireann, the ESB, Irish Water, Civil Defence and a number of government departments.

GFRS were requested to repeat the exercise for the Department of Climate, Energy and Environment as part of their Storm Eowyn review, and this was conducted on the 23<sup>rd</sup> June 2025 at Beggars Bush. A number of government departments were represented and the Office of the Government Chief Information Officer.





# DESIGN MINGLE WITH RÓISÍN CURÉ

Róisín Curé spoke about her inspiring journey to success in CREW on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> June. Growing up on a mountainside in Wicklow, Róisín sold her first paintings at the age of 14. Her education included art in NCAD, a design HND in London and an MSc in Geology in Galway. Raising children and fielding endless rejections resulted in very little professional success for about twenty years. Thirteen years ago, while living in Mauritius, Róisín discovered urban sketching. She established Urban Sketchers Galway in 2014 along with two co-founders, which is going from strength to strength these days. She taught her first international urban sketching workshop in 2015 and in the ten years since she has taught across Europe and worked as a professional on-location sketcher for various government bodies.



Róisín Curé has represented Ireland on the world stage at USk Porto (2018), USk Amsterdam (2019), USk Switzerland in Bern (2021), and will carry the flag this year in Poznan, Poland and Geneva, Switzerland. Between 2019 and 2021 Róisín published three bestsellers with sketching as their theme: An Urban Sketcher's Galway (Currach Press 2019), reprinted as Galway In Sketches And Stories (Red Stripe Press, 2024); The Urban Sketcher's Handbook: Drawing Expressive People (Quarto, 2020) and Dublin In Sketches And Stories (Merrion Press, 2021 and 2024). All are in second edition and / or translation. Róisín started teaching sketching live online to her followers early in 2020. From 2022 to 2024 she hosted the Sketch Therapist podcast. She started broadcasting on YouTube in 2023 making videos about life as a sketcher. In 2023, frustrated by the shortcomings of sketching bags available, she started designing a bag for sketchers, and in 2024 her cactus leather SketchPocket hit the market, selling out in a few weeks. The Róisín Curé Sketch Club is in full swing, with subscription-only live classes twice weekly broadcast to a global community. She lives in Kilcolgan in south Galway.

#### LIFE SCIENCES PILLAR - WREP

As part of the Life Sciences pillar of the West Regional Enterprise Plan (WREP), the programme manager of the WREP, Kenny Deery, hosted an industry workshop in collaboration with colleagues in Enterprise Ireland, the IDA and Údarás na Gaeltachta. The purpose of this workshop was to understand if there is a need in Galway, for a Hub for Medtech/Life Sciences, and what other industry needs the sector has.

This event happened on the 26<sup>th</sup> June 2025 at CREW Digital Hub and was centred around the following six questions:

- Do you believe there is a need for a hub (physical building) for Medtech/LifeSciences in Galway?
- 2. What type of hub would you like developed and what general and specialist facilities should it have?
- 3. What additional supports, programmes and services would you consider are needed?
- 4. Where should this hub be located?
- 5. Would your organisation be open to providing support to develop this hub?
- 6. Is there anything else the sector needs to be successful in Galway and the West?

Following this industry workshop a report is being generated, which will then lead to a stakeholder workshop, at which industry needs will be presented and next steps will be agreed.



## REGIONAL ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND INNOVATION ECOSYSTEM (RE&I) - WREP

## TOWN CENTRE FIRST (TCF) PROGRAMME

#### **ATHENRY**

The Athenry Town team have been working closely with the TRO and Consultants LUC in the initial stages of evidence gathering for the TCF plan. The process of distilling the public feedback from the public engagement is complete and a further meeting with the town team has been arranged for June 17th. Dates for a further engagement evening where draft projects will be presented will be finalised shortly.



#### **BALLINASLOE**

The Ballinasloe Town Team continue to work with the Paul Hogarth Company in development the draft Town Centre First Plan. A further meeting of the Town Team will take place to reflect on the recent public consultation event and the feedback received. The process of drafting the final Town Centre First Plan will now begin.

## AN CHEATHRÚ RUA

The Town Centre First Plan for an Cheathrú Rua is being led by Údaras and supported by Galway County Council. Allies and Morrison have been appointed to develop the plan. The Town Regeneration Officer, Brent Mostert will continue to liaise on behalf of Galway County Council.

#### PORTUMNA PUBLIC REALM

The Portumna Public realm enhancement scheme part 8 planning application is approaching submission readiness.

Engagement is continuing with a view to purchasing 2no. town centre plots of land to increase the provision of off-street parking to support town centre businesses.

#### PORTUMNA TOWN TRAIL

OBFA Architects have produced a draft Town Trail strategy document following the successful public consultation event. The document is currently being reviewed and will be discussed with our partners in Portumna, Coillte, Waterways Ireland, and the Office of Public Works to determine appropriate funding streams.

# LOUGHREA

## RRDF PROJECT – LOUGHREA TOWN HALL

Finna Construction are progressing with demolition works ongoing. Work has commenced on the construction of the new build three storey rear extension to the original structure.



Agreement has been reached with the landowner to purchase the adjacent derelict property on Church Street. Future development plans for the property are currently being considered.

#### ORIS PROJECT – LONG POINT

The Regeneration team are working with Consultants Helena McElmeel Architects to deliver the redesign of the Long Point swimming area in Loughrea Town. An Bord Pleanála have issued a request for further information. The consultant team appointed by Galway County Council are preparing our submission in response to the issues raised.

# **ATHENRY**

# RRDF PROJECT - PUBLIC REALM ENHANCEMENT SCHEME

Following a detailed application by the Regeneration Team, Athenry was granted €6,075,518.40 Rural Regeneration Development Funding for the Athenry Public Realm Enhancement Scheme Phase1 and the redevelopment of Somers House Burke's Lane to provide a Community and Enterprise Hub.

The detailed design of the scheme (drainage, m&e, alignment, pavement) continues, led by Tobin Engineers.

Current programming forecasts construction to commence early-2026. As part of the contract a community liaison officer will be appointed to manage engagement with local stakeholders both prior to and during works.



The contracts have been signed, and a booking deposit has been paid to purchase a site at the bottom of Bridge Street from the OPW to provide off street parking. Initial estimates are that approximately 30no. off street spaces could be provided at the location.

#### RRDF PROJECT - SOMERS SHOUSE

O'C & C Architects have been appointed to deliver the process through detailed design, tender and construction phases. It is the intention to investigate the provision of a meeting room facility to cater for meeting of the Municipal District as part of the project. The detailed design process has commenced.

## OPW WORKS - ATHENRY CASTLE

Works are progressing on site and are expected to be completed within a couple of weeks.

#### TUAM

#### TUAM TOWN HALL

OC&C architects have been appointed as the design team that will deliver the process through detailed design, tender and construction phases. The detailed design process has commenced. It is expected that a contractor will be appointed for the project in early Q1 of 2026.

## TUAM STATION BUILDING: REPURPOSING, RENOVATION AND EXTENSION

The renovation and extension of the Tuam Station Building has been designed inhouse by the Regeneration Team.

The Part 8 planning application was submitted on the 28<sup>th</sup> of March. A Meeting of Tuam Municipal District convened on May 29<sup>th</sup> to consider the Chief Executives Report on the planning file. The application was approved unanimously. A funding application to deliver the capital project has been made to the Northern and Western Regional Assembly under the European Regional Development Fund. The funding sought amounts to some €6.6 million euros. A decision on funding is expected in September of this year.

# TUAM STATION QUARTER MASTERPLAN (THRIVE FUNDING)

Galway County Council is working in partnership with larnród Éireann and to deliver a transformational masterplan for the Tuam Station Quarter. Reddy Architecture and Urbanism have been formally appointed to develop the masterplan. The first public consultation has taken place. The findings are being collated by the consultants to inform the draft masterplan. Engagement with larnród Éireann has progressed in the past number of weeks, further exchange of information is scheduled to take place.

It is anticipated that a workshop with Elected Members will take place in the coming months. Further public engagement will also be held.



#### **CLIFDEN**

A Part 10 planning application has been submitted to An Bord Pleanála for the Public Realm project for Clifden Town Centre, Harbour Park and Beach Road Quay. Plans and particulars can be viewed online at <a href="https://consult.galway.ie/en/consultation/clifden-public-realm-enhancement-scheme">https://consult.galway.ie/en/consultation/clifden-public-realm-enhancement-scheme</a>. A request for further information has been issued by An bord Pleanala to Galway County Council. The design team appointed by Galway County Council are currently working on a response. It is anticipated this response will issue within 8 weeks.

**GORT** 

#### **GORT PUBLIC REALM**

The Gort Public Realm scheme is ready to be submitted as a part ten planning application to An Bord Pleanála. We are engaging with our Law Agents to purchase lands in the town centre for additional off-street carparking space.

#### SISTERS OF MERCY CONVENT

An application for funding under Category 2 of the Rural Regeneration and Development Fund to purchase the former Convent property has been submitted. It is anticipated that a decision will issue within three months.

## RINVILLE PARK SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT PLAN



Cunnane Stratton Reynolds have been appointed to develop a sustainable development plan for Rinville Park. An initial stakeholder workshop took place on July 3<sup>rd</sup> (2pm – 7pm) at Oranmore Library on Main Street. The design team were on hand to discuss the project with residents and local community groups.

#### BALLINASLOE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT UPDATE

During June 2025 Ballinasloe MD continued to deliver the primary elements of the annual roadworks programme, restoration improvement (RI) and restoration maintenance (RM).

An outline of the current status is presented here, along with photos of works completed below.

RI - Contract No.1 is approximately 20% complete, with works in Clonbern, Creggs and Newbridge expected during July. RM is approximately 65% complete. Due to saving achieved in the procurement processes, additional roadworks projects are likely to be undertaken, which will be communicated to Ballinasloe MD Councillors shortly.

Separately, roadworks projects granted funding in 2025 under LIS (6), CIS(6), Climate-Change(3), Low-Cost-Safety(1), are all being prepared by the MD technical teams and by MD crews on site.

Road markings have been renewed on several town centre pedestrian crossings, and new directional markings installed in the vicinity of Moher and Garbally Roundabouts adjoining the M6.





## PALACE GROUNDS

## KEY INITIATIVES AND DEVELOPMENTS:

## **POLLINATOR ZONES**

Purpose: These zones are established to provide habitats for pollinators such as bees, butterflies, and other insects. Pollinators are crucial for the reproduction of many plants and the overall health of ecosystems.



Implementation: The zones include a variety of native flowering plants that bloom at different times of the year, ensuring a continuous food supply for pollinators. These plants are carefully selected to thrive in the local climate and soil conditions.

#### **BIODIVERSITY INFORMATION BOARDS:**

Educational Outreach: Information boards have been installed, such as the one by the River Nanny near the swimming pool. These boards educate visitors about the importance of biodiversity and the specific species found in the area.

#### COMMUNITY EMPLOYMENT SCHEME:

Local community employment scheme is actively involved in maintaining and monitoring these biodiversity zones. This includes planting, weeding, and conducting biodiversity surveys.

#### INTEGRATION WITH HERITAGE PLANS:

Holistic Approach: The biodiversity initiatives are part of a broader Heritage and Biodiversity Plan launched by Galway County Council. This plan integrates biodiversity with cultural and built heritage, ensuring a comprehensive approach to conservation.

#### SUSTAINABLE PRACTICES:

Eco-friendly Maintenance: The maintenance of these zones follows sustainable practices, such as reducing the use of pesticides and promoting organic gardening techniques. This helps create a healthier environment for both wildlife and people.

## IMPACT AND FUTURE PLANS:

Ecological Health: The creation of pollinator zones and other biodiversity initiatives contribute to the ecological health of the Palace Grounds. They help increase the population of pollinators, which in turn supports the growth of various plant species.
