1. **Confirmation of Minutes of an Ordinary Meeting of the Municipal District of Conamara held on Friday, 11th June 2021** **CMD 21048**

On the **PROPOSAL** of Comh. T. O'Curraoin, **SECONDED** by Cllr. N. Thomas the members **AGREED** the minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Municipal District of Conamara held on Friday 11th June 2021.

Matters Arising

Cllr. E. Mannion noted that Clifden Beach had excellent monitoring results recently and commented that she hoped it would continue for the September results.

Comh. P. Mac An Iomaire queried available parking spaces for caravans in Ros a Mhíl, he stated it would be good if they could be ready for next years' season. Mr. D. Mitchell advised that he was waiting on a response from the Municipal District.

Cllr. A. McKinstry questioned whether the contract was appointed for the Clifden Flood relief scheme. Mr. D. Mitchell confirmed that tenders had been issued but that he would need to clarify if the contract was awarded.

On the **PROPOSAL** of Cllr. E. Mannion, **SECONDED** by Cllr. A. McKinstry a vote took place to determine whether Item 4 from the agenda should be deferred to allow more time to consider the report.

2. Confirmation of the Minutes of a Special Meeting of the Municipal District of Conamara held on Monday, 21st June 2021 **CMD 21049**

On the **PROPOSAL** of Cllr. E. Mannion, **SECONDED** by Cllr. N. Thomas, the minutes of the Special Meeting of the Municipal District of Conamara were **AGREED**.

Matters Arising

Cllr. N. Thomas raised a query in connection with a comment at a previous meeting in relation to the Causeway Bridge inspection and the manner in which the inspection was undertaken.

Comh. D. Ó O'Cualáin requested clarification on whether the funding allocation for the Causeway Bridges needed to be spent by the end of the year. He stated that it was very important that there is an opportunity to review the report prior to the commencement of works.

Comh. P. Mac An Iomaire questioned when the report would be finalised.

Mr. D. Mitchell confirmed that he was in receipt of the report, however a number of queries were raised arising from same and he awaited a response and clarification. He advised that he currently didn't have a date for its completion. He indicated that the Causeway Bridge funding was a multi-annual program and there was an expectation to use the funding allocation this year due to safety concerns. He also stated that he expected the funding to be rolled over into the following year if it had not been used and it would be part of the roads program.

Cllr. E. Mannion praised the Local Area Offices for their work over the summer season, she commented on the public toilets, bins, beaches, and the additional provision of lifeguards during the heatwave, she hoped to see the work continue and a plan for a busy summer season next year.

Cllr. G. King seconded Cllr. Mannion's comments, he also queried when the Beach Bye-laws would be updated.

Mr. M. Owens confirmed that the current Beach Bye-laws dated from 1997 and it would be a significant piece of work to update. He stated that it would be added to the following years' work program and would be advanced by the SPC with an opportunity for input by the Members of the Municipal District.

3. Declaration of Roads to be Public Roads – Section 11 of Roads Act 1993 at: **CMD 21050**

On the **PROPOSAL** of Cllr. N. Thomas **SECONDED** by Cllr. A. McKinstry the Members **APPROVED** the declaration of the following road to be a public road, the statutory procedure having been complied with:

- (b) Road commencing at junction with L-52330-O (53.25840, -9.65552) in the townland of Tír an Fhia and extending south east for a distance of 190m in the townland of Tír an Fhia and finishing at (53.25706, - 9.65412) in the townland of Tír an Fhia.

On the **PROPOSAL** of Comh. D. Ó Cualáin **SECONDED** by Comh. P. Mac An Iomaire the Members **APPROVED** the declaration of the following road to be a public road, the statutory procedure having been complied with:

(c) Road commencing at junction with L-53955-0 (53.25367, -9.27740) in the townland of An Sián Rua and extending North for a distance of 235m in the townland of An Sián Rua and finishing at (53.25524, - 9.27528) in the townland of An Sián Rua.

On the **PROPOSAL** of Comh. T. Ó Curraoin **SECONDED** by Comh. D. Ó Cualáin the Members **APPROVED** the declaration of the following road to be a public road, the statutory procedure having been complied with:

(d) Riverfall, Clifden

1. Road pavement and footpath, commencing at public road N59 and extending North for approximately 60m and ending at house No.7 The Spires (all in the townland of Clifden).
2. Road pavement and footpath, commencing with house No. 7 Riverfall and extending westwards for a distance of approximately 60m and ending at house No.1 Riverfall (all in the townland of Clifden).

On the **PROPOSAL** of Cllr. E. Mannion **SECONDED** by Comh. P. Mac An Iomaire the Members **APPROVED** the declaration of the following road to be a public road, the statutory procedure having been complied with:

e) The Spires, Clifden

1. Road pavement and footpath, commencing at house No. 7 The Spires and extending North for approximately 180m and ending at house No.26 The Spires (all in the townland of Clifden).
2. Road pavement and footpath, commencing with house No. 11 The Spires and extending westwards for a distance of approximately 40m and ending at house No.6 The Spires (all in the townland of Clifden).
3. Road pavement and footpath, commencing with house No. 16 The Spires and extending eastwards for a distance of approximately 55m and ending at house No.24 The Spires (all in the townland of Clifden).

On the **PROPOSAL** of Cllr. E. Mannion **SECONDED** by Cllr. G. King the Members **APPROVED** the declaration of the following road to be a public road, the statutory procedure having been complied with:

(f) Racecourse Lawns, Clifden

1. Road pavement and footpath, commencing at house No. 1 Racecourse Lawn and extending North for approximately 105m and ending at house No.10 Racecourse Lawn (all in the townland of Clifden).
2. Road pavement and footpath, commencing with house No. 8 Racecourse Lawn and extending eastwards for a distance of approximately 40m and ending at house No.13 Racecourse Lawn (all in the townland of Clifden).
3. Road pavement and footpath, commencing with house No. 11 Racecourse Lawn and extending southwards for a distance of approximately 105m and ending at house No.20 Racecourse Lawn (all in the townland of Clifden).

On the **PROPOSAL** of Cllr. G. King **SECONDED** by Cllr. E. Mannion the Members **APPROVED** the declaration of the following road to be a public road, the statutory procedure having been complied with:

(g) Racecourse Hill, Clifden

1. Road pavement and footpath, commencing at public road L- 5124 and extending south for approximately 46m and ending at house No.10 Racecourse Hill (all in the townland of Clifden).
2. Road pavement and footpath, commencing with house No. 5 and extending eastwards for a distance of approximately 97m and ending at house No.18 (all in the townland of Clifden).

On the **PROPOSAL** of Cllr. G. King **SECONDED** by Cllr. E. Mannion the Members **APPROVED** the declaration of the following road to be a public road, the statutory procedure having been complied with:

Cllr. E. Mannion welcomed the taking in charge of the estates acknowledging the various issues that gave rise to the timeframe for the process to be undertaken and successfully completed.

Cllr. T. Welby queried the length of time involved in the Taking in Charge process. Mr. D. Mitchell explained that the Clifden estate was a large estate with various issues to be addressed.

Cllr. S. Walsh commented that Taking in Charge was a reserved function of the Elected Members and accordingly was exercised at the discretion. Mr. D. Pender clarified that if a vote was taken in relation to Taking in Charge by the members then the road/estate would be taken in charge,

(4) To consider the report under Part 8 of Planning & Development Regulations 2001 (as amended), proposal for the construction of 31no. new dwelling houses at Bóthar an tSléibhe, Maigh Cuillinn, Co. Galway consisting of 27no. two storey two bed dwellings, and 4no. two storey three bed dwellings. Proposals include new junction with existing road L-1320, relocation of existing bring bank, associated CCTV and parking; relocation of access and parking area for existing playground; site clearance works, hard & soft landscaping, roads, footpaths/cycle tracks, boundary treatments, public lighting, parking, new connections to existing services and all associated site development works – as detailed in LA 10/21.

CMD 21051

Ms. R. Lowe introduced the proposal for the construction of 31 new dwelling houses at Bóthar an tSléibhe, Maigh Cuillinn, Co. Galway. Mr. L. Hanrahan gave details of the Conamara housing waiting list, detailing the numbers on the list in the localities of Maigh Cuillinn, Conamara Central and Bearna. He also outlined the potential for more basketball courts in the area if the construction of the 31 dwelling houses went ahead. He stated that the Mountain Road flooding would be dealt with by the Infrastructure & Operations department before the housing estate would be built. He confirmed that 5 mature trees would need to be removed from the area and he commented that there were no trails/paths for walking through the site. He believed that the tenants in the proposed estate would have the option to buy their homes in the future which could lead to long-term owner-occupied properties.

Cllr. N. Thomas referred to recent private planning applications in the area, which were refused for different reasons, but which included flooding and drainage issues, designs characteristics and roads. He mentioned one of the conditions of the Part 8 which indicated that the flood issues in the area would need to be dealt with and he believed that permission would not be granted for a private development on a similar basis. He commented that there was no overflow or oversized attenuation tank in place and he advised that the area was flooded the previous day and he stated it was almost impossible for traffic to pass. He also expressed the view that the design was not in character with the area and was not sensitive to the typography of the site which is mentioned in the Maigh Cuillinn Local Area Plan. He believed that building a retaining wall could create problems, that the design was an issue, and it wasn't supporting the biodiversity plan. He noted that the planning file itself was not on Galway.ie which was a serious flaw, providing no access to the documentation. He pointed out that the proximity to the bring banks caused a lot of nuisance for residents. He mentioned that the woodland area was good for biodiversity in the area, a recent report stated that the

trees had a high value. He concluded that he didn't think the Part 8 plan addressed any of the issues in the area.

Cllr. A. McKinstry supported the Part 8 but with slight amendments. He expressed that the country was in the middle of a housing crisis, and this was the first direct build of social housing in Maigh Cuillinn. He stated that the location of the proposed estate was the best area to choose, 150 metres from the center of Maigh Cuillinn. Cllr. McKinstry suggested that housing needs to be condensed to towns and villages as otherwise, the Council will have to purchase one off dwellings for relatively elderly people, and that will increase reliance on motor vehicles. He raised some issues with the design of the houses and he referred to them as very traditional and carbon dependent. He noted the compromise of removing trees to provide housing and stated that the housing was desperately needed, as more people are going on the social housing list rather than being removed from it. He stated the drainage and resurgence problem should be resolved and further works on sewerage management should be addressed before construction goes ahead and added that more community services should be included. He expressed that he would like to see the plan to fix flooding before a decision was made to go ahead with the development.

Cllr. S. Walsh commented that he had the same level of passion for retaining the right to build one-off dwellings in Conamara as his colleague Cllr. McKinstry expressed for the proposed development.

Comh. D. Ó Cualáin requested confirmation of the number of elderly persons and persons with disabilities that would be housed in the proposed estate.

Mr. Hanrahan confirmed that there were 26 households over the age of 65, 25 between 58-65 years and between 30-40 individuals with physical and mental disabilities. He clarified that the people on the top of the list would be allocated the homes.

Ms. Lowe briefed the members on the technical matters they had queried. Regarding the drainage matters; the estate is designed specifically to eliminate the requirement to discharge to the existing surface water drainage system. An extensive attenuation system is proposed. This is in recognition that the existing surface water system in the adjacent local road requires works, and the Infrastructure and Operations Unit has given a firm commitment that works will be completed in this area prior to the houses being occupied. In response to comments regarding road design; Ms. Lowe advised that the relevant stage Road Safety Audit had been completed, and that the roads and junction were designed in accordance with the appropriate standards.

Ms. Lowe also indicated that several 'green measures' were included in the proposal; permeable lawns would permit natural filtration and houses would be designed to NZEB standard (Nearly Zero Energy Building standard). The NZEB standard means that houses will not be reliant on fossil fuels for heating, and houses will be constructed to an A2 energy rating – resulting in highly insulated warm, comfortable, energy efficient homes. Ms. Lowe

also stated that the proximity of the development to the town centre can be expected to be a key factor in reducing reliance on car transport.

Ms. Lowe in response to issue raised acknowledged that bring banks can cause noise issues. The bring banks however, are already in this location – they are proposed to be relocated only a short distance. Ms Lowe said if another suitable site could be identified – that might be welcome, and the Council would be open to considering that.

In response to the loss of biodiversity/ woodland, Ms Lowe acknowledged that trees would be loss due to this proposed development but stated that the majority of the Galway County Council-owned land in this area would remain unaffected by this proposal, and the landscaping plan has been designed to include native planting. She suggested that the proposed housing estate road could be utilised to gain access to the woodland to the rear and perhaps over time community woodland trails could be developed.

Ms. Lowe updated the members on the technical matters they had queried and advised that she was aware of the drainage issue, that the estate is designed on a self-contained water drainage system for infiltration and attenuation and that the Infrastructure & Operations department were currently working on a solution for the issue. Ms. Lowe indicated that permeable landscaping would be used to allow for natural filtration and that a road safety audit would be carried out. She noted that bring banks can cause noise issues, however the current location is very convenient, but a possible other site could be identified in the future if required. She stated that the proximity to the town centre was the greatest advantage for the estate as it is within walking distance, she commented that in the design of the development there is no solid fuel, air to water would be used, and she assured that standards are high which will create warm, comfortable and energy efficient homes.

Cllr. N. Thomas commented that social housing must be built responsibly. Cllr. S. Walsh added that an integrated housing scheme would work better than a social housing scheme. Cllr. Walsh emphasised that a housing emergency is not an excuse for irresponsible development.

Cllr. A. McKinstry noted that the proposed development was imbedded beside existing estates, and that it was not a huge development. He reiterated that building houses further up the Mountain road was not suitable.

Comh. T. Ó Curraoin commented that there was no mention of communities in the development plans, he suggested that every area needs between 20-30 acres of community land. He explained that he didn't agree with 5-year plans, he believed that there should be a 40-year plan, reviewed every 5 years. Comh. T. Ó Curraoin expressed the view that Maigh Cuillinn is a great area, and that development needs to be moved outward, to not crowd people together. He stated that the location should be kept for a community area and an alternative site for the development.

Cllr. S. Walsh acknowledged and agreed with Comh. T. Ó. Curraoin comments. Cllr. E. Mannion stated that she was shocked by the comments, she stated there was very little consideration being given to the people on the housing waiting list. She drew attention to the members helping people who want a one-off dwelling but stated that the members need to help here also. She mentioned that there were several social housing estates in Clifden, and good, fine people live in them, she challenged that there was more anti-social behaviour in private estates. She mentioned another social housing estate in Roundstone and explained that the development was welcomed in the area. She concluded that social housing provides security for people which schemes like HAP cannot provide, she hoped that the Council could give 31 families hope and agree the Part 8.

Comh. D. Ó Cualáin stated that if these homes were for elderly persons and people with disabilities that they were not well-designed. He noted that the bedrooms were upstairs and there was no shower facility downstairs which raised big concerns. He indicated that it was not accurate that these houses were for the elderly and people with disabilities.

Mr. Hanrahan indicated that not all people with disabilities on the waiting list had physical disabilities. He commented that he was not against rural/once off dwellings and there were over 50 people on the waiting list in the area.

Cllr. T. Welby agreed with the comments Cllr. Mannion raised. He mentioned a story of a constituent; a single parent with a 12-year-old child, who has lived in 11 different properties in their lifetime. He reaffirmed that County Galway needs housing, and that he had received several emails in relation to this development. He addressed some of the comments of the other members; in relation to the site being used as an amenity for Maigh Cuillinn. He stated the area was too big and is completely open which makes it difficult to rule out anti-social behaviour. He claimed that a facility during the day can become a den for night-time use and that it may not be safe after 6p.m. He stated the ground is in a desperate condition and needs significant work. Comh. P. Mac An Iomaire commented that since July he had received calls from four different individuals that have had to move because landlords are selling.

Ms. R. Lowe reminded the members that the location is a 14-acre site, and only 30% would be used for this development. She advised there would be available land remaining after the development and it could be used as amenity and recreation area, she stated that the Council had already been approached about adding basketball courts to the area.

It was **PROPOSED** by Cllr. N. Thomas **SECONDED** by Comh. T Ó Curraoin not to proceed with the proposed development. As the motion was not agreed the Cathaoirleach called for a vote and the result was as follows:

(5) Municipal District of Conamara Director's Business.

CMD 21052

No items were raised for discussion under Director's Business.

(6) Municipal District of Conamara Cathaoirleach's Business.

CMD 21053

(a) To consider and if deemed appropriate request the commencement of the statutory process for the extinguishment of the public right of way on the L-52452 Cill Chiarán.

Cllr. S. Walsh requested that the Infrastructure & Operation department prepare a report as soon as possible in relation to the extinguishment of the public right of way on the L-52452 Cill Chiarán to include consideration of alternative access and the declaration of the alternative access as a public road. Mr. D. Mitchell replied that the department had no difficulty in engaging with the relevant people to investigate the process. He aimed to have an update for the next meeting.

(b) To consider a report on Probable Cause(s) of the Pollution Incident(s) in Bearna (Mag's Boreen Beach)

Ms. A. Dolan updated the members in relation to recent water quality issues in Bearna. She referred to last year's submissions – the areas that were identified were Mags Boreen/Bearna pier, inlet stream. She informed the members that HSE monitoring took place between the 1st June – 15th September, with several samples having high levels of bacteria which is an issue for concern.

She outlined that Mags Boreen had a high level of bacteria but is now back in compliance. She advised that Bearna Pier was an area for concern as youths jump off the pier, and there had been a number of high bacteria results, she commented that this is to be expected as the stream flows into Bearna Pier. Ms. Dolan advised the members that bathing time ends on the 15th September and the Environment department would review the results in order to make a decision whether to continue monitoring the areas the following year. Ms. Dolan indicated

that she thought monitoring should continue for another year. She explained that Bearna beach was not included as there are only so many resources available. She further advised that a lot of work was being carried out to determine the cause of bacteria, that they wanted to confirm if there was any physical discharge in the area but noted that there was no evidence of such yet. She stated that there was only one discharge licence in the area, she confirmed that the Environment section is to complete septic tank inspections in the area, to rule out any issues. She indicated that a technician noted in an inspection that there was livestock in the area; cattle using the stream as a water source, she said they may need to remove access if it causes a problem. She concluded that safety of the sites is the most important matter and access to the bathing areas for the public.

Comh. T. Ó Curraoin outlined he received complaints in relation to Mags Boreen and Bearna Pier. He queried how many households were attached to the sewerage system in Bearna and commented that there was no quick solution to the problem, but it was good that it was being investigated.

Ms. A. Dolan couldn't confirm how many households were attached to the sewerage scheme, she believed that it could be an issue with septic tanks and noted that problems like this are usually caused by discharge.

Cllr. A. McKinstry commented that year-round swimming had become popular and could be key to the development of tourism. He stated it would be good if monitoring could continue in those areas.

Ms. A. Dolan explained there wouldn't be much traction to monitor all year round as the cost analysis was not good but confirmed there was an expert bathing water group assessing the idea.

The Cathaoirleach was joined by the members in commending the work of Mr. Sean Groarke as Meetings Administrator for the Conamara MD who had recently retired from the Council, they commented that they appreciated his time and effort over the years.

Mr. M. Owens on his own behalf and on behalf of the executive and staff also added his best wishes for Sean on his retirement, he said that he was a pleasure to work with, with special note for his dedicated service to the Conamara Municipal District.

(8) A.O.B.

CMD 21055

Comh. D. Ó Cualain informed the meeting that he was contacted regarding a serious concern from the Principal in Scoil Salerno, he stated that there had been several near misses on the road in front of the school as there is no pedestrian crossing. Mr. D. Mitchell replied that the Council were unsuccessful in securing a crossing at the school in the past, however he indicated there was a new initiative, and it could be looked at again.

Cllr. N. Thomas spoke on behalf of Cllr. G. King regarding the works on N59, he queried if the works were completed in relation to verge trimming on the N59 and the surrounding local roads.

Comh. T. Ó Curraoin inquired about the bus-shelters and if there was a timeline to spend the allocated funding. Mr. D. Mitchell confirmed that the bus-shelter funding can be carried over to the following year. He stated that the National Transport Authority have a fixed design for the bus stops and advised that they would carry out any maintenance works. He outlined that to receive funding for a shelter a bus must stop at a location at least 5 times each day.

Comh. P. Mac An Iomaire queried if the spraying of invasive species on the side of the road, and hedge trimming would commence in the upcoming few weeks. Cllr. E. Mannion mentioned that the N59 road was overgrown.

On the **PROPOSAL** of Cllr. S. Walsh and **SECONDED** by Comh. T. Ó Curraoin it was **AGREED** to review the public lighting in the vicinity of Padraicins Pub , Na Forbacha.

Mr. Mitchell advised that he would refer the matter to his colleague Ms. Holland who is responsible for public lighting.

Cllr. S. Walsh asked Mr. M. Owens if he could look at the change in the members pay and expenses, he specifically mentioned the vouched expenses. Cllr. N. Thomas agreed with Cllr. Walsh, he stated that members were entitled to expenses for office equipment as along as it was reasonable. He claimed that the advice from the Department and Galway County Council was different.

Mr. M. Owens said that the members expenses were updated from 1st July, 2021 and the Council awaited further instruction and the changes would be implemented retrospectively to that date. He stated that Corporate Services would issue advice, and that the previous vouched expenses would be clarified.

It was noted that the next scheduled meeting would be held in October.
